1.3 Overview

Lock-Out Professional v2.9

Welcome to Lock-Out Professional v2.9 - the very best in security and User Management for your Amiga.

This is an unregistered, **cut-down version** of Lock-Out. (v2.9)

Lock-Out Pro. enables you to prevent unauthorised access to your computer and simultaneously set up your own database of users with their own identities, passwords and security levels. You may decide which users can write data where and which users have access to which files on your hard disk(s).

There are many other facilities, including e-mail between users, noticeboards, User Logging and much more. So what are you waiting for?!!

1.4 Installation

INSTALLING LOCK - OUT PRO :-

First decide whether you wish to use the HD-Install program to install Lock-Out Pro. automatically (recommended) or whether you wish to install the program manually:

1.5 Automatic Installation

Auto-Installation

Installing Lock-Out Pro. is easy! Just use the supplied

Installation program:-

- Boot up your computer from your hard drive to WorkBench.
- Make sure that Helvetica font is present in your FONTS: directory.
- Double click on the icon that reads `HD-Install`.
- Follow the instructions on screen.

< M O R E > (scroll down)

It is VERY IMPORTANT that you do not delete any of the files that Lock-Out Professional puts on your hard disk - it may well stop your computer booting if you do! This includes any files in the root of your hard disk, such as files with .DAT or single-letter filenames such as I or R.

You have been warned! Even if these files seem to be duplicates of ones in SYS:C, please leave them there!

You will then need to alter the file **S:STARTUP-SEQUENCE** to add in the lines that the installation program gives you. To do this, enter the **CLI** (by double-clicking on the CLI/Shell Icon from Workbench) and type:

```
ED S:STARTUP-SEQUENCE
```

With any luck, a window will appear with some text in it. Press RETURN twice to add an extra two lines at the beginning and enter the lines that you were told, in other words:

```
ASSIGN LOCK-OUT: <followed by the name of the directory where  
you have installed the lock-out main files>
```

```
LOCK-OUT:LOCK-OUT
```

Then, press ESCAPE, press X and press RETURN to complete the process.

Before going any further, it is important that you remember the default user identity and password for the manager (you) which are:

User Identity: MANAGER

Password: PASSWORD

Once you have installed Lock-Out in this way, you should **re-boot** your computer to enter the program. If you have any problems, please write to us at our **address** stating exactly what you have done and what is going wrong, including a phone number if possible.

Running the Program

1.6 Entering your ID and Password

Entering your ID and Password

When the program has loaded, you will have a screen in front of you inviting you to enter your **User Identity** and **Password**. This is the Log-On screen. Type in MANAGER and press RETURN. Next, enter your password (PASSWORD is the default password) and press RETURN. You should be put through to the **Lock-Out MAIN MENU...**

(You are allowed three attempts at entering your password, after which the computer will reset. Your failed attempt will also be **recorded**)

1.7 The Main Menu

The Main Menu

This is the menu that ALL **USERS** of your computer will be put through to from the Log-On Screen having entered their IDs and passwords. It consists of 7 buttons in a vertical row:

User Mailbox - Use this option to send e-mail to other users or view/edit the bulletin board

Notices - Display the current notices/info. from the manager. You may edit this.

Launch - In a future version of Lock-Out Pro., this will allow users to run progs.

Personal Details - This shows you your ID, name, and lets you change your password.

Statistics - This also displays bits of useless information.

Log Off - Logs Off and resets the computer.

Exit - Leaves the program and continues to boot the computer as normal.

Click on the buttons above for much more detailed information on the various options.

There is, however, one other menu which only you, the manager (and any other managers you may choose to create) can use. This is the cunningly-titled **Manager Menu** and is accessed by clicking on the small button in the top-right hand corner of the Main Menu - the one with "Lock-Out Pro" written on it.

Clicking on this brings up the **Manager Menu**

1.8 The Manager Menu

The Manager Menu

This is probably the most important part of the program, accessed by clicking on the button in the top-right-hand corner of the Main Menu. From here, you can add new users, delete users, change password/security, change your security options, check the security levels, view the user log and much more. The menu is split into four parts:

1.9 Add / Change Users

Add / Change Users

When you click on this, a full list of all current users is displayed on-screen, along with their passwords. If you have a large amount of users, use the PAGE button to cycle through the pages of users.

UNREGISTERED VERSION - limited to three users.

(Full version only costs £4.00! -

If this is the first time that you have used the program, there should only be one user on the list - yourself.

Your very first task will probably be to change your own User ID and password - after all, MANAGER and PASSWORD aren't entirely hard to guess!

Click on your User Identity (the word Manager). An arrow should appear to the left of it. This shows that it is currently selected, in other words any of the buttons that you now click on, such as Delete User or Edit User will apply to THIS USER.

To edit your details, click on your name as described in the above paragraph and click on "Edit User". The screen changes to display your Identity, Password, Full Name and Security Level.

Use the keyboard to change your details as you see fit - click in a box to edit the information there and then press RETURN / TAB to move to the next box.

Note that you will not be able to change your security level. This is because you are the TOP MANAGER - your security must remain at "Manager" Level. If you cannot see why, imagine that you were to change your security

to "Standard" level and re-boot. If you were the only user, how would you ever get back to the Manager menu again now that you weren't a manager?!

Thus, there are several **rules** governing what you can and can't change. These are there purely for your own protection.

When you have changed your details, click on Accept and you will be returned to the list of users.

To add a new user, simply click on "Add User". You are put through to the same screen as before - enter the details for the user, clicking in a box to change the information there and pressing RETURN (or TAB) to move onto the next box. Click on one of the four boxes to set his/her security level. Note that any users without "Manager" security do not have to have a password - if you leave this box blank then they will be taken straight to the main menu once they have entered their User Identity on the Log-On screen. Before adding new users, you should choose your options on the "Options" screen to get the best out of Lock-Out (see "OPTIONS" below)

To delete a user, select the user and click on "Delete User". To delete all the users, you should use the button in the "General" screen. (see "GENERAL COMMANDS" below)

To return to the **Manager Menu** click on "Exit".

1.10 **crules**

Rules Governing User Changes

- THE TOP MANAGER, I.E: THE FIRST USER ON THE LIST CAN NOT CHANGE HIS/HER SECURITY LEVEL.
- ALL THOSE WITH SECURITY LEVEL OF "MANAGER" MUST HAVE PASSWORDS.
- PASSWORDS MUST BE OF AT LEAST 4 CHARACTERS IN LENGTH.
- NO ONE EXCEPT THE TOP MANAGER MAY EDIT THE TOP MANAGER'S DETAILS.
- THE TOP MANAGER MAY NEVER BE DELETED.

INFORMATION ON USERS, PASSWORDS, SECURITY LEVELS

Most of the reasons behind these rules are obvious - it is also inadvisable to have passwords that are identical to the User's Identity - these are too easy to guess.

1.11 Options

Options

It is here that you decide which users may write to different partitions of your hard drive, which directory (if any) you are going to hide to users of lesser-security and also determine various other options:

1.12 Write Access To Devices

Write Access To Devices

Down the left-hand side of the screen is a list of five devices, which are by default HD1, HD2, HD3 and DF0 (I think - this may vary.)

The idea is that you change these device names to resemble the partitions on your own hard drive and any other devices that you may wish to prevent users writing data to, e.g: the floppy disk drive.

Click on each name and replace it (if necessary) with the device name you wish by typing in the name (no colon at the end is necessary but they are acceptable) and pressing RETURN.

Next to each device is a cycle gadget containing the four security levels that lock-out offers - Standard, Advanced, High and Manager. Click on this button to set the security level ABOVE WHICH USERS MAY WRITE DATA TO THE DEVICE.

For example, suppose the list looked like this:-

WITH THE ABOVE EXAMPLE:-> All Users may write data to the partition

- HD0: on your hard drive and to the floppy
drive.

|
|-----> Only those with Advanced security level or
| above (i.e: this includes managers) may
| write data to the partition HD1: on your
| hard drive.

|-----> Only managers may write data to the
partition HD2: on your hard drive.

It is important to realise that in the above example, the devices
DF0: and HD0: could have been left out of the list and it would not have
made any difference to the result, because in the above example all users
were allowed to write to these devices anyway. Don't worry if you don't
really understand this concept - the important thing to remember is that
if you put a device name in the list and choose a security level then ONLY
USERS WITH THAT SECURITY LEVEL OR ABOVE WILL HAVE WRITE-ACCESS TO THIS
DRIVE. Others will be able to read data from the device, but not save
anything or delete anything to it.

1.13 Hidden Directory

Hidden Directory

If you click in the box at the bottom-right end of the screen and
type in the full pathname of a directory on your hard disk, e.g:

HD1:GRAPHICS/DPAINT/

then this directory will be hidden from workbench to all users without
security levels HIGH or MANAGER.

1.14 Allow Unsigned Mail

Allow Unsigned

If this is ticked, users may send
mail and request for the recipient

NOT to receive the identity of the sender. If abusive mail is sent or you simply do not want this facility, then remove the tick from this box.

1.15 Check For Bad Language In Mail

Check For Bad Language

This checks for the most common swear words and obscenities in mail and replaces them with asterisks. The mail is checked as it is sent.

1.16 General Commands

General Commands

This screen contains two commands:-

[Delete All Users](#)

[Security Check](#)

Click on Exit to return to the [Manager Menu](#)

1.17 Delete All Users

Delete All Users

Fairly obviously, this deletes all the current users except the manager and all corresponding mail files and data.

Only the top manager may perform this option; you will be asked to confirm that you wish to do this.

The program then returns to the [General Commands Menu](#)

1.18 Security Check

Security Report

This delivers you with a report concerning the current state of security with your users. The report will warn you of things such as:

- Users with easy passwords
- Users that are Managers
- Users with security, but no password

and any other information that may be of use.

After the report, click to return to the [General Commands Menu](#)

1.19 User Logging

About The User Log

The User Log is a full log of events since Lock-Out was installed or the Log was last cleared. The following events are logged, along with the user that performed them, and the time/date on which they occurred:

- Users logging on.
- Users logging off.
- A User failing to enter his/her password correctly.
- A Change of Password.
- A Change of Security Level.
- Bad Language used in mail by a user (if enabled - see "Options")
- A User being Deleted.
- Anything Suspicious.

A small number of other events are also logged.

The user log can be [viewed](#) from the manager menu

1.20 Viewing the User Log

User Log

This options allows you to move through the various pages of the [user log](#) to see what has happened since you last 'visited'!

Use the < and > buttons to move through the pages of the Log (You are initially shown the LAST page of the log) and click on Exit to return to the [Manager Menu](#)

1.21 User Mail Facilities

The User MailBoxes

(THIS FEATURE IS DISABLED IN THIS [UNREGISTERED VERSION](#))

All users can use this facility, which allows you to send notes to other users that they can then collect when they log-on at a later date.

1.22 Send Mail

Send Mail

- This sends a note to another user.

A dialog box will appear when you click on "Send Mail"

Enter the name of the user you wish to write to, and press <RETURN>.

You may also click in the box marked "Urgent", beforehand in which case the user will be notified as soon as he/she logs on that an urgent note is waiting. If the manager has enabled this option, you may also click "Unsigned" in which case the recipient will not be told who has sent the note.

Next, type in your note. Notes may be up to 6 lines in length. Use the arrow keys to move around. Click on Send to send the note to the postbox, or Abort to cancel the operation.

(Future versions of Lock-Out Pro. will allow you to reply to notes directly as opposed to writing an entirely new note to reply to someone!)

[MailBox Main Menu](#)

1.23 Collect Mail

Collect Mail

- This displays any mail that is waiting.

Notes are displayed in the order that they have been sent to you. Any urgent notes are also highlighted in order to draw your attention to them.

This option is disabled if there is no mail waiting.

After all your mail has been collected, you are returned to the [Mailbox Main Menu](#)

1.24 The Bulletin Board

The Bulletin Board

- This screen is open to all users, who may edit the entire screen, i.e: they can add their own text and delete text written by others. Use the keyboard to edit the bulletin

board and then press the Left Mouse Button to save your changes and exit.

If you are unhappy with your changes and wish to revert to how the board was before you arrived, press the Right Mouse Button.

After pressing the Left Mouse Button, you are returned to the comfort and safety of the [Mailbox Main Menu](#)

1.25 Return To Main Menu

Exit / Return To Main Menu

This button returns you to the Lock-Out [Main Menu](#)

1.26 Notices Screen

Notices

Users with "Manager" security level can edit this screen to inform the normal users of current events, points to watch out for when using the computer, etc...

Users without security level of "Manager" will be presented with the notices but will be unable to edit them.

The [Main Menu](#) button is rather obvious.

1.27 The Personal Details Screen & Statistics Screen

Personal Details & Statistics

These screens contain info. such as your full name, how many times you have logged on, your security level, which devices you may write data to, etc...

You may change your [password](#) from the "Personal Details" screen by pressing the button entitled [Change Password](#) (As you may have noticed by now, Lock-Out Pro. is fairly user friendly, so writing this manual is not hard work!)

There is also a button entitled [Return to Main Menu](#)

1.28 Logging Off

Logging Off

When the "Log-Off" button is clicked, the computer notifies the

User Log of your Log-Off and re-boots.

This option on the main menu is only really useful if you are the manager and wish to test out other users or if a user wishes to log-on just to collect his/her mail or read the notices.

Much more useful is the **Seperate Log-Off Program** included with Lock-Out Pro.

1.29 The Log-Off Program

The Log-Off Program

Included with Lock-Out Pro. is a separate program entitled "Log-Off". This is installed to the root directory of whichever partition your hard drive boots from, in most cases HD0:

When the program is run, the computer records your Log-Off in the User Log and re-boots the computer.

Thus, if you wish to charge your users for the time they spend on your computer, you should tell your users to Log Off when they have finished using the computer.

1.30 Exiting Lock-Out Pro.

Leaving Lock-Out Professional

When the "Exit" button is clicked, these events occur in rapid succession:-

- **Devices** that the user is barred from writing to are locked. (see **Options**)
- Your computer continues to boot from the rest of your **startup-sequence**

You are asked to confirm that you wish to leave Lock-Out.

1.31 Notes and Credits

1.33 glossary

You have clicked on a term defined here in the GLOSSARY. Look up the term in the glossary below, and then click on "Retrace" (above) to return to the text that you were reading beforehand.

Glossary:-

ASCII

A standard way of storing text data in files, composed of hexadecimal bytes. Each number in each byte corresponds to a different letter of the alphabet, or symbol.

ASCII is used as the format for AmigaDos scripts, such as the startup-sequence.

DEVICE

Something in your computer that the Amiga Can read from and/or write to, such as the floppy disk drive, a hard drive, a keyboard, a credit-card slot, etc...

`Devices' referred to in this documentation usually refer to physical storage devices such as Hard Drives or Floppy Drives.

Devices have Device Names attached to them, such as HD0: or DF0:

CLI

An interface through which you communicate with AmigaDos, to tell it to load programs, etc... by typing in commands. Similar in many ways to MS-DOS on a PC.

To access the CLI on an Amiga from WorkBench, find and double-click on the CLI icon, or if you have Workbench 2.0 or above, you can execute a single CLI command from the Workbench menu.

LICENSWARE

A Program that is not free; a small amount of money is payed for it, all or some of which goes to the author.

PASSWORD

Every user may have a password, although passwords are not compulsory, except in the case of those with Manager Security Level.

Remember that passwords must be of at least 4 characters in length. Capital letters and lower-case letters are not distinguished between, as was the case in previous versions of Lock-Out. This simply leads to confusion.

RE-BOOT

To re-boot your computer is the equivalent of turning it off and then on again. You can do this by holding down the CTRL key and the two

keys on either side of the SPACE bar at the same time.

SECURITY LEVEL

Each user has a security level which determines which partitions on the hard drive he/she may write to, as defined by the manager on the **Options** screen.

STARTUP-SEQUENCE

A file, held in the S directory of the disk that your computer boots up from, which tells the computer which programs to load and what to do as it starts up. The file is in ASCII

USER

Someone entered in the list of Users as defined by the manager. You may have as many users as you want, memory permitting. Each user may have a full-name defined (if desired), a security level and a password.
