Can a user-generated encyclopedia revolutionize the Web?

The encyclopedia salesman must be having a tough time these days. First, people decided they could replace their bulky, out-of-date encyclopedia books with a single disc in 1993, the year Microsoft's Encarta was introduced. Then, in the late 90s, the Internet made huge amounts of information – albeit in scattered form – available instantly via easy-to-use search engines. Certainly, encyclopedia salesmen rued the day Google became more than a number. No longer did users need to sacrifice a bookshelf to vinyl-bound books to be “in the know.” They just needed a phone line and a little will.

Even then, though, a true replacement for the encyclopedia was not available. The easy categorization and authority of text that, for generations, made the encyclopedia the beacon of knowledge for so many young Americans could not be replicated in digital form. That is, until, almost everyone got involved. In what may be the ultimate expression of the networked world, the final nail is being driven for the lost art of door-to-door sales.

A few years ago a movement, some would say a revolution, started to take hold on the Internet. Depending on how broadly you define it, a movement of collaboration is taking over the Web. What started with the Open Source software movement has moved into a more mainstream vehicle for cooperative expression – the wiki.

More than a new product, wikis could represent an extraordinary step forward for the Internet and its place in the Information universe. Whereas thus far the Internet has been a place of almost hyper-individualism, a place where one person, with little technology or start-up capital could build an empire, wikis represent the opposite phenomenon. Wikis show us what many people, contributing just a little, can build through sheer numbers.

What is a wiki? Well, the name makes it confusing, if only because it really has nothing to do with the process. Basically, a wiki is a Web site (or possibly software program) where anyone who visits (or is allowed

to visit) may add, remove, and otherwise edit and change any available content on that site. So imagine if the New York Times Web site was a wiki. As a reader, you would be able to add stories, edit stories, delete stories, whatever, and it would affect what everyone sees when they visit the site. Sounds like a bad idea doesn't it? You like your content controlled by professionals, not Joe Sixpack tapping away at his computer? Remarkably, although it may sound like pie-in-the-sky thinking, for one major Web site, at least, the concept has worked like a charm.

THE SUM TOTAL OF ALL HUMAN KNOWLEDGE

The idea that the Internet might be the cauldron to hold all human knowledge isn't really a novel concept, at least in Internet guru circles. There's a reason they call it the Information Revolution. The ability for us, as individuals, to reach out and find even the smallest bit of information using just one computer linked to billions of other computers, strains even the most fervent of imaginations with its possibilities. And yet, something comprehensive, something that doesn't require hours of searching, failed to materialize in the first ten years of the Web. Sure there were very good Web sites, many that could lay claim to "best and most comprehensive site" about X subject. But no one site, no one place, held all the information like an encyclopedia. Was it even possible?

Jimmy Wales thought it was possible. But first, Wales took the old route. He developed a free encyclopedia in 2000 called Nupedia. Designed as a Web-based encyclopedia that would be distributed for free, Nupedia was to be written by so-called experts. It would have the features of a great encyclopedia, with all the benefits of an online presence, including quick and easy search and hyperlinking. But while the concept was grand in idea, it was limited in execution. To build a comprehensive database, even to rival book style encyclopedias would take years, if not decades. To expand it to something that more properly represented the scope of the Internet could take centuries, and it would be an enormous organizational task. Even with an innovative peer-to-peer design, Nupedia failed to draw major support, and Wales was stuck looking for a better way to grab and hold information. In the end, Nupedia created only 24 articles that passed through its rigorous peer-to-peer review system. It was too laborious, and it taxed too much the people charged to create.

Sometime in late 2000, Wales was introduced to the concept of Wiki. As originally designed, wiki was a way to create large public and private databases. The name derives from one of

the first collaborative software programs called WikiWikiWeb. The name for that program came from the developer, Ward Cunningham, who said he remembered a trip to Hawaii in which he was directed to take the Wiki Wiki shuttlebus from the airport. He said he thought it sounded better than his second choice, quick web.

Wales liked the idea behind the Wiki as a way to cheaply supplement Nupedia. But, because he didn't want to pollute the peer reviewed Nupedia with just anyone's input, they created a new site and Wikipedia was born. Wikipedia launched on January 15, 2001 with little fanfare. But within six years, more than 1.5 million articles have been posted to Wikipedia, almost exclusively by people who have never met Wales. While the road hasn't always been smooth, the result may be the most successful collaborative process since the Great Wall of China.

PUTTING THE NET BACK IN NETWORK

Wikipedia is not without its critics. Just as so many people have praised the site for its result and method, just as many are criticizing the open structure that produces it. As mentioned, Wikipedia allows anyone to edit any article that is contained on the site. Take an article about Abraham Lincoln, for example. If you didn't believe that Abe was responsible for the end of slavery, for example, you could write that. You could also write that Abe Lincoln invented the light bulb. You would be wrong, but until someone corrected it, that's what anyone who accessed the site would read. With 1.6 million articles and growing, how many of the sites are subject to both purposeful vandalism (particularly those on controversial subjects) and bad data? And how can anyone keep up with all of that?

In addition to bad facts, there have also been complaints that some Wikipedia articles are written with a particular bias. This has been a particularly potent subject during heated political seasons, as candidate biographies are altered by those who wish not to see them in office. Claims of bias extend throughout the network, but the same claims arguably would

taint almost any encyclopedia, even those written by experts.

The Wikipedia creators claim they have instituted measures that curtail many of the biases and vandalism that harm the site, including a strict policy that writers approach each subject with a neutral point of view. Today, a casual search through Wikipedia, particularly to topics that seem less controversial, reveals a remarkable database of knowledge on all manner of subject, from the arts to science, from technology to popular culture. Perhaps the new measures have taken hold. Perhaps not. But, the willingness of readers and editors around the world to share their knowledge is enough to make even the most fervent cynic stand up and cheer.

IS IT A REVOLUTION?

Creating a comprehensive encyclopedia seems an appropriate first step for a wiki-like venture. But can it be applied to other ventures. So far, success has been limited. But some exciting other projects are popping up. Wikitionary, a wiki dictionary, is almost as comprehensive as Wikipedia. Wikitravel is a pretty solid travel guide, but there are better sites online. Wikibooks is an ambitious sister project for Wikipedia that attempts to create full books on various subjects, as opposed to simple articles. Not surprisingly, in the first four years, few books have been completed.

But the Wiki may yet have better and greater applications outside of writing. In essence, a wiki is about sharing, and about contribution. It has gained some traction in the software development field, but that is mostly a result of the open source software movement, which is a little different. Science, in particular science that requires huge datamining projects like the Human Genome project, might benefit greatly from a Wiki-like model - if done on a closed market scale. But the surprising ability of Wikipedia to create a vast knowledge database in less than six years has opened a lot of eyes. And, and the very least, may entice some individual entrepreneur to look beyond herself and imagine the possibilities of the many. ♦
