My House

My house is a colonial-style ÿvilla in a noble residential area of San Francisco, with a magnificent view of the Bay. Originally, the facade of the house was painted in a light shade of yellow, but today, the side facing the street is now overgrown with wild roses up to the second floor windows. As you approach the house from the street, the carport comes into view. In the carport is a classic ÿold-timer, still in very good condition, and ideal for leisurely drives along the coast.

First Floor

The front door opens to a tiled entranceway. Other than a ÿcoat rack and a few plants for decoration, there isn't much else to see here.

Artists in the hallway: In the hallway, it begins to get a bit more interesting. Both walls are lined with a collection of modern art from artists such as Andy Warhol and the like. An extravagant lighting system provides for the appropriate atmosphere. Halfway to the living room, a 200 year old crystal mirror accentuates the stark contrast to the Popart.

Four tall archways open up to the various rooms on the ground floor. The hallway ends at the foot of a wooden spiral staircase, which leads up to the second floor.

Living Room

Upon entering the living room, the first thing to catch the eye is a full-size ÿpanorama window. Visitors are always impressed by the grandiose view of the Bay the window offers.

The large room is very sparsely furnished. The stained ÿhardwood floor is decorated only with a few small ÿoriental carpets. The leafy palms next to the window lend a certain exotic ambiance to the room.

Providing the desired contrast between old and new, are several antiques such as the chandelier hanging from the high ceiling, and the colorful Tiffany lamps. Next to the modern black leather furniture and clear glass coffee table, the opposition is strikingly

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appealing.

Fireplace

A crackling, burning fire brings a warm, cozy feeling into any room. The fireplace is a part of the original structure of the house, and its Early-American design also contrasts attractively to the modern furniture in the room.

Bookcase

My bookcase is filled with various works of literature. I still have the Dr. Suess books from my childhood, and a whole series of ÿAgatha Christie mysteries. On the other hand, "ÿCannery Row" from ÿJohn Steinbeck is just two years old, a souvenir from my last trip down to Monterey. Many classics can also be found here: "Romeo and Juliet" by ÿWilliam Shakespeare as well as works by ÿErnest Hemmingway and ÿEdgar Allen Poe to name a few. Among the books are also a few board games, as well as various knick-knacks, such as a wooden ÿxylophone from Africa.

Minibar

Martini Cocktail

Stir 5cl Dry Gin, 1cl Vermouth Dry and 2 or 3 icecubes in a stirring glass, pour into an iced cocktail glass. Garnish with an olive. I love longdrinks and ÿcocktails, and my minibar is accordingly stocked. Gin for a Gin and Tonic, Campari, various liqueurs and a few "hard" drinks make up the alcoholic portion. Grenadine and lime syrup are also available for non-alcoholic specialties. The necessary mixing utensils such as a ÿshaker and an ÿelectric mixer for ÿfrozen margaritas are also close at hand. My favorite drink is the same as James Bond's: a ÿmartini. However, it doesn't matter to me whether it's shaken or stirred.

The showpiece in my minibar is a ÿsoda siphon made of turquoise-colored glass, which I came across years ago at a flea market in New York. It's a wonderful place to find treasures, and takes place every Sunday at the corner of 6th Avenue and 26th Street.

Kitchen

Cutlery in the Dishwasher

Especially people who fill a dishwasher for the first time in their life tend to do it wrong: Cutlery has to be inserted with the handles down so there won't be stains when drying. My kitchen has all of the conveniences of modern technology. My most-cherished appliance is the ÿdishwasher. I still remember with horror my college days and the mountain of dirty dishes to wash after parties. Nowadays the main use for my kitchen sink is the built-in ÿgarbage disposal.

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	In the middle of the kitchen is a massive wooden table which serves as a cutting block, with copper pots and pans hanging above within easy reach. It's very convenient and spacious enough for more than one chef to work at the same time. There is a small table in the kitchen as well, in a sunny nook, perfect for breakfast for two.
	Next to the breakfast nook are the doors to the pantry and the laundry room. A large-faced ÿquartz clock hangs above the doors. On the right side is a window and a sliding door leading onto the ÿterrace.
Pantry	
	The pantry is a small compartment next to the kitchen, where all non-perishable foods are stored. This includes everything from ÿcanned goods to ÿcereals, ÿpasta, ÿpotatoes, etc. I like to keep a stock on hand so I don't have to run to the store at the last minute for something. There are conserves too, such as ÿjams and ÿjellies, and canned fruits and vegetables from my own garden. I also keep ÿcandles and a ÿfirst aid kit here just in case of emergencies.
Laundry Room	
-	Leading off from the kitchen is another door to the laundry room. In this room is a conventional ÿwasher and ÿÿdryer, along with a washbasin and clothes-rack for hand-washables. Bath towels, ÿdish towels and sheets are all stored here. The ÿvacuum cleaner, ÿbroom and ÿdustpan, ÿironing board, and other household appliances and cleaners are kept here as well.
Guest Bath	
	Directly next to the pantry is a guest bathroom. Such comforts were not standard at the time this house was built, so a portion of the pantry had to be removed to make room for it. The room is quite small, and sparsely furnished with only a toilet and a washbasin.
Dining Room	
	The most notable piece of furniture upon entering the dining room is a Victorian style table, bought from an antique dealer in

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England. Eight chairs, two of each of the four different styles, surround the large oval table. Since they are all from the same manufacturer, though, they match well.

You would expect to find expensive, antique ÿporcelain to match the expensive, antique table. But I generally prefer the modern style of the unpretentious, white ÿbone china, from England as well. The ÿsilverware isn't real silver, but timelessly elegant stainless steel cutlery. Real silver must be regularly polished, and is not particularly suited for the dishwasher either.

Second Floor

From the hallway on the second floor there are only two doors, one leading to the left and the other to the right. A wooden spiral staircase leads up to the attic.

Study

To the right, a hallway leads to my study. The most important piece of furniture in this room is the considerably large desk. Black and white photos of New York in the 20's and 30's hang on the walls. The Bay can also be admired from the window behind the desk. On the one hand, this can sometimes be distracting when I'm trying to work. But on the other hand, it can be exceptionally calming (and also promotes better concentration) to take an occasional break now and then to simply watch the ships and numerous sailboats criss-crossing the bay.

Writing Desk

I deliberately purchased a very large desk, since I am admittedly an easygoing person, but not a clean freak. I need a lot of space to spread out all my papers. Therefore, I don't have just a normal shaped desk; my desk forms a "U" shape around me. In front of me is plenty of room to write and I also have free access to my writing utensils and the ÿtelephone. To the right, I have a PC and an Apple Macintosh. Since I have the computers networked together, and often must transfer documents from one to the other, the first office suite to come into consideration for me was StarOffice.

The left arm of my desk can be used to heap, stack and pile papers to my heart's content. The actual color of the desktop can

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	only be ascertained after a thorough excavation.
Bedroom	
Beuroom	Further down the hall is my bedroom. This is the only room in the house that is carpeted. Hardwood floors are easy to care for and look nice, but carpeting is much more pleasant for bare feet.
	In my bedroom is a ÿqueen-size bed and two night stands, which takes up most of the room. On each side of the bed is a door, one leads to a walk-in closet, and the other to the bathroom. I also have a ÿtelevision in my bedroom, especially for watching the late-night movies. It's also possible to listen to music in my bedroom, as my ÿstereo system is integrated with the television. Using the remote control, I can operate the stereo system in the living room, and the tone is projected through the television speakers. A major advantage to this system is that all my CD's remain in one place, instead of being scattered all over the house.
Bed	
	Having a ÿwaterbed was always a dream of mine. However, because of various reasons and considering especially the energy use that goes into keeping the water heated at a constant temperature, I decided on a normal bed.
	In summertime ÿsatin sheets are pleasantly cool against the skin. My sheets are dark blue, my favorite color. In winter I have normal cotton sheets on my bed, but I especially like the warm ÿflannel sheets on very cold nights.
Night Stand	
	On my night-stand is just a single lamp, and nothing else. All the interesting things are kept in the drawers. In the top drawer are normal, everyday things such as ÿaspirin or Kleenex. In the bottom drawer I keep various reading materials such as boring ÿtrade journals, to put me to sleep at night.
Walk-in Closet	The walk-in closet is spacious enough to actually walk around in, and even has a window, as well. The closet is about 6 ft. wide and 8 ft. long.

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	On the right wall are two clothes rods, one above the other. On the left side, one rod runs along the entire length of the wall. Underneath is a cabinet of large drawers for storing ÿsweaters, ÿshoes, ÿÿaccessories or whatever. Next to the window is a full- length swivel mirror and in the corner is a hat and tie rack.
Master Bath	
	The only way to get to the master bathroom is through the bedroom. Therefore, it is a completely private room which is generally not used by guests.
	Marble tiles in the bathroom certainly look elegant, but are rather difficult to maintain. Therefore, I chose to tile the floor and walls with conventional ÿceramic tiles.
	The floor is terra-cotta and the walls are plain white. At about a height of 4 ft. there is a terra-cotta-colored border along the walls to match the floor. Of course, there are also two bath mats on the floor to keep those bare feet warm. The bathtub, shower, ÿtoilet and ÿwashbasin are all white. The fittings are black, adorned with a tasteful gold streak.
Bathtub	
	This is no ordinary, run of the mill bathtub here. The huge corner tub is also a ÿwhirlpool, complete with ÿwater jets. The perfect way to relax after a long day at work in front of the computer.
	On the edge of the tub are the usual things such as ÿsoap, ÿshampoo, ÿshower gel and ÿbath salts. My rubber ducky keeps an eye on everything when I'm not there.
Mirror	
Only a few years after its completion, the title "World's Tallest Building" went from the Chrysler Building to the Empire State Building.	Above the washbasin I have a huge mirror, 4 ft. wide and 5 ft. tall. On it's left side the ÿChrysler Building from New York is applied as an additional mirror made from tinted glass cut into the appropriate shape and glued onto the main mirror.
	I thought about having the shelf at the foot of the mirror shaped like Brooklyn Bridge but with wires it's difficult to access items on the shelf and without wires the bridge looks kind of naked. So the shelf is made of plain gray glass

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Gallery	
	A wooden spiral staircase leads upstairs to the gallery. On the second floor, the hallway does not go the whole length of the house as it does below, but instead covers only the back third of the house. This allows you to be able to look down onto the ground floor.
	An artistic ÿspiral banister forms the edge of the loft. There is a ÿpool table here and a full-functioning ÿjukebox which makes for a lot of fun when friends come over to visit.
Attic	

The attic has not yet been renovated, although I would like to expand it someday to include a ÿguest room. It would also be nice to add on a roof verandah overlooking the San Francisco Bay. But for the time being, it is mainly used to store ÿluggage and Christmas decorations.
