
BRIGHTNESS ADJUSTMENT

Use the brightness adjustment pattern.

The brightness control should be used to adjust the low level light output from your monitor for different ambient light conditions.

Use the control to increase the brightness, until you can see the background (the areas intended to be black) and all the dark grey squares marked 1-9%. Decrease it again until you can just distinguish the dark grey squares brighter than 1-3%.

If you set the brightness control too high the monitor cannot produce black.



If you set the brightness control too low (blacker than black), then the dimmer grays will be lost and will be reproduced as black.






The brightness control determines the black level of the picture.





BRIGHTNESS AND CONTRAST RECOMMENDATIONS

The light output of your screen can under certain conditions be affected by the resolution you are using. This means that you might have to use different settings for the brightness and contrast controls if you use more than one resolution.

It's better to set the black level a little too low, and lose some of darkest gray tones, than too high, and lose a black background and a good contrast between black and white.

In Windows you shouldn't set the Contrast control too high, as your eyes will the tire more quickly!

HOW LIGHT IS PRODUCED ON YOUR MONITOR

A so called video signal is sent from the control-circuitry in your computer to the monitor, telling the monitor both where on the screen to place the light dot, and the intended light output ranging from zero (black) to maximum light output.

In the monitor this signal is converted to light on the monitor screen.

Before you start

The monitor must have been on for at least 20-30 minutes before you start to make any comparisons

; If you increase Brightness to high, it will cause the beam to spread and if this spreading is excessive, the monitor will lose sharpness.






The first step consists of feeding the monitor a signal which is black. You should then adjust the brightness so that you can only just see the background (2 cd/m2, if you have a colour analyser for this). The second step consists of setting the red, green and blue cut-off controls of the monitor, until the colour analyser indicates that the colour is at "daylight" at low level.



What we are doing is to adjust the position of each of the individual curves up and down, until we get the correct balance at low level. In other words: all three lines cross each other at low level.

Adjust high level


Feed the monitor a white signal. Use a colour analyser to check if the colour is "daylight" at the correct level, e.g. 100 cd/m2 (adjust by means of the contrast control). Adjust the red, green and blue gain controls of the monitor until you have that colour.



What we are doing is to adjust the position of each of the individual curves up and down, until we get the correct balance at low and high level. In other words: all three lines cross each other at low level and at the maximum light output level.

REPEAT THE CUT-OFF ADJUSTMENTS, FOLLOWED BY THE WHITE LEVEL ADJUSTMENT, UNTIL YOU GET THE SAME COLOURS ON "BLACK" AND ON "WHITE".


Degauss the screen

Stray magnetic fields, and various external magnetic fields, will affect the colour purity of colour monitors. Whenever the monitor is moved or rotated in place it is subjected to a change in the earth's magnetic field, which also affects the colour purity. Degaussing removes the effects of all magnetic field changes.

How does the monitor make colours?

Monitors use what is called "additive colour mixing".



This is due to the fact that if we add red, green and blue light together we get white. This is exactly what happens in a colour monitor. When we want white on the screen we turn on the electron guns hitting the red, green and blue phosphors. Together the phosphors will then emit white light.

How many colours?

16-colour modes

To produce 16 different colours on your screen 4 bits/pixel of video memory is needed.

If you are running Windows in a 16 colour mode you will see dithered patterns.

Switch to a 256 colour mode, which doesn't use dithering.

256-colour Modes

To produce 256 different colours on your screen 8 bits/pixel of video memory is needed.

In 256 colour modes the video board can display any 256 colours, from a palette with a total of 262 144 available different colours. Each primary colour has 64 intensity levels.

High colour

To produce 65K different colours on your screen 16 bits/pixel of video memory is needed.

In "High Colour" modes the video board can display either 32 768 colours or 65 536 colours.

Each primary colour has 32 intensity levels, except for green, which in the 65K mode has 64 levels.

To be able to use this colour mode you need at least 2M of video memory at a resolution of 1024×768 (or 1152×882).


True colour

To produce 16.8M different colours (more than the eye can readily distinguish) on your screen 24 bits/pixel of video memory is needed. Each primary colour has 256 intensity levels.

To be able to use this colour mode you need at least 2M of video memory at a resolution of 800 x 600.






This is for testing of red uniformity, colour purity and flickering





Nearby equipment

Any nearby equipment which generates a magnetic field, such as speakers, computers, old-style telephones, external disk drives, CD-ROM units, etc., can affect the colour purity.

Make sure that you do not have any fans, external power transformers (fluorescent lights), or motor-driven or solenoid actuated appliances near your monitor.



Badly aligned colours



What are colours?

Colours are just something that we see with our eyes. This something constitutes rays of light, i.e. electromagnetic waves with wavelengths of between 380 nm and 780 nm.

Your eyes pick up the electromagnetic waves, and your brain then translates them into that which we call "colour".

In other words: Colours only exist inside our brains. This means that one person may conceive colours slightly different from another.

Change the monitor's direction

Monitors are generally adjusted at the manufacturing facility facing east. The monitor should therefore have it's best colour purity when facing in that direction.

CONTRAST ADJUSTMENT



Use the brightness adjustment pattern.

The contrast control should be used set a comfortable light output from your monitor. This level depends on your application (program) as well as on the ambient light. If the ambient light has changed you should always start with adjusting the brightness control.

You can use this test pattern to set the contrast control to a default position (the best position for all the information for which you use your screen). When you run new programs you should then use the contrast control to set the light output from the screen to a comfortable level.


Adjust the contrast control so that all big squares are visible, sharp, and clearly distinct, and have graduated intensities.





CONVERGENCE TOOLS



How are convergence errors measured?



Change image position

The convergence is generally worst on the periphery of the image (one side or corner).

Shift the image away from the worst side or corner. This will reduce the problem.

Change image size

The convergence is generally worst on the periphery of the image (one side or corner).

Resize the image so that it moves away from the worst side or corner. This will reduce the problem.

Change resolution

The same convergence error is not as visible at a low resolution, as at a high one, because the theoretical pixel size is then bigger.

Example: A convergence error of 0.30 mm is clearly visible if your pixel size is

0.25 mm,

but the same error is not so bad if your pixel size is

0.40 mm.

Colour combinations

You can use different colour combinations, depending on what kind of convergence error you have on your monitor.

These combinations are:



If you have a <u>RED-BLUE</u> convergence error


Do not use <u>magenta</u>, <u>red and blue</u> together, but instead use <u>cyan</u>, <u>green and blue</u> or yellow, green and red together.







Degaussing

Stray magnetic fields can affect the convergence.


Press the manual degaussing button once. If your monitor does not have a manual degaussing function degaussing will be performed automatically. This however only takes place if the monitor is powered on after having been off for half an hour.


Adjustment of dynamic convergence

The dynamic convergence is usually adjusted by means of various internal potentiometers, which will vary the voltages to the deflection coils in the yoke assembly.


Some monitors have dynamic convergence controls. These normally divide the screen into zones, and make it possible to set the convergence for each of these zones individually.

START BY ADJUSTING/CHECKING ANY STATIC CONVERGENCE FOR PERFECT CONVERGENCE AT THE CENTRE OF THE SCREEN.


CONVERGENCE / "Measure convergence error"

- 1. Use the white crosshatch test pattern
- 2. Adjust the contrast to near maximum
- 3. Adjust the brightness so that the background just disappears

These instructions have been for the Klein CM7AR convergence gauge, but other types of gauges can also be used.




- 4. Place the gauge on the line, with the mark 'Y' facing upwards, when measuring a horizontal line.
- 5. Place the gauge on the line, with the mark 'X' facing upwards, when measuring a vertical line.
- 6. If the line has a convergence error, the line in the window appears to be broken.
- 7. Use knobs A and B to adjust the line so that it becomes continuous.



8. If the readings are on opposite sides of zero the convergence error is A+B (e.g. 0.2+0.1->0.3).

9. If the readings are on the same side of zero the convergence error is equal to A if A>B, and equal to B if B>A.







Nominally misconvergence is specified in this way: less than 0.25 mm (centre) and less than 0.35 mm (elsewhere).

CENTRE here means the big circle in the middle of the test picture It is highly recommended to aim for a misconvergence that is less than the theoretical pixel size.





Adjustment of static convergence

The static convergence is usually set by means of convergence magnets, which are mounted on the yoke assembly on the neck of the picture tube. Some monitors also have one or two convergence controls, which have influence on the convergence over the entire screen. Each of these controls is used to converge the red and blue lines onto the green line, as closely as possible. If the monitor has two controls, one of these is for the vertical convergence and the other for the horizontal convergence.

Use different colours

You can use different colours, to achieve a good contrast, as the convergence error is not as visible at a lower contrast (and brightness) level.



WHAT IS CONVERGENCE (MISCONVERGENCE)?

A white line on the screen consists of three coloured lines: Red, green and blue. If the screen does not have any convergence error the lines are exactly overlaid each other, and the resulting colour is white.



NO MISCONVERGENCE

In case of a convergence error separate red, green and blue lines can be seen, instead of one white. It is similar to an out of FOCUS image, except that you will see thin coloured fringes around the edges of image detail.






The convergence error will vary for different locations on screen, and will also be different for each of the primary colours. Generally the convergence will be best near the centre, and worst in the corners. As you can see misconvergence also has a bad influence on FOCUS.



Decrease the contrast

Decreasing the contrast will sharpen the image, by reducing the thickness of the beam.





Use different colours

You can use different colours, to achieve a better contrast than is possible using the contrast control. It is then possible to use a lower contrast level and have better FOCUS. Use for example blue and cyan.




Monitors with good and bad focusing respectively

A badly focused monitor gives rise to beam spread, especially in the corners. Focus is not the only effect that influences the image sharpness, other main reasons are <u>convergence</u>, <u>blooming</u>, <u>the video amplifier's bandwidth</u>, and <u>resolution</u>.









The focus tools display special patterns in each corner of the screen, and in the centre. The patterns are displayed in black on white, followed by the main colours on white. This is a difficult test for most monitors when close to their rated resolution. In particular, watch out for differences between the centre and the corners.




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
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
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


GEOMETRY TOOLS

The geometry parameters are affected by the resolution you use on your monitor. This means that you will have to adjust your monitor for all the different resolutions you use. If your monitor has the capability to store more than one set of adjustments you shall use this program to adjust and store these adjustments for all the different resolutions you use. If your monitor can not store such adjustments you should try to use only one resolution, if possible. If this is not possible you can choose between either adjusting your monitor for your most critical or most commonly used resolution, or readjusting your monitor when you change the resolution.






Adjust the size and position controls, so that the broken line almost disappears behind the screen bezel. If the shape of the broken line is distorted, try to adjust other parameters (trapezoid, tilt, pincushion etc.) The inner circle should be perfectly round. Measure the picture width and height. The aspect ratio should be 4/3 (width/height). If it is not, readjust the picture size slightly.

If focus adjustment is available on your monitor, defocus the image, but only slightly. Check the picture focusing by means of the focus tools and/or the readability tools.

Change the image size
Make the picture smaller or bigger, to make moiré less noticeable.







Some external "low radiation" give rise to moiré. Check your monitor both with and without filter.





What is moiré?


Moiré is a natural interference phenomenon that appears on all colour CRT monitors.

It is due to an interference between the shadow mask (or aperture grill) and the resolution used.



This is an example of pure video moiré. Normally you can also see some ripples, waves, and wisps of intensity fluctuations superimposed on the screen. They mostly occur in **displays that use finally focused beams.**





Use this pattern to check whether text is readable across the screen. The text should be readable, and all parts of each letter should be clear. If there are alignment problems you might notice colour fringing or bad focus; in any case the text will not appear sharp, possibly even unreadable.

Note: If you have too high a resolution on a small screen, it will be extremely difficult to get readable text as the alignment tolerances are too tight.




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




"Dot pitch" is a measure of the shortest distance between identically coloured grills. The most common dot pitches are 0.31 mm, 0.28 mm, and 0.26 mm.



The amplifier bandwidth is specified in -3dB points. Bandwidth: Fmax - F min (-3dB). It is however more realistic to talk about video dot frequency and rise/fall times.




If your picture looks like this you have a problem.

- 1. Check all cables between the monitor and the computer.
- 2. You have a poor video board in the computer. This is quite a common problem for cheap video boards. Even the best monitors can not solve this problem. The correct solution is to buy a new video board. A cheaper solution is to use a lower resolution.
- 3. You have a poor video amplifier in your monitor, or you try to use the monitor outside of it's specified properties. The solutions are the same as above (item 2).




The CRT size is measured as the diagonal dimension of the TUBE



The visible area is always smaller than the CRT's face value. A 15" CRT, for example, gives you a visible area of 13.7" diagonally.



Overshooting problem



If you have picture like this one you might have an "overshooting" problem, and will see "shadows" behind the white line (or black line, if you have a white background, as for example in Windows). Normally this problem is due to the video card. The manufacturer has tried to increase the output of the video card, whereupon it starts to oscillate.

- 1. Check all cables between the monitor and the computer.
- 2. You have a poor video board in the your computer, this is quite a common problem for cheap video boards. Even the best monitors can not solve this problem. The correct solution is to buy a new video board. A cheaper solution is to use a lower resolution.
- 3. You have a poor video amplifier in your monitor or you try to use monitor out of it's specified properties. The solutions are the a same as above (section 2).

Recommendations

We recommend that the following maximum resolutions are used:


Note: Using a high resolution on a too small screen makes the characters illegible at normal viewing distances. A viewing distance closer to the monitor can cause eye-strain or musculoskeletal fatigue.

This is one most important properties of a video amplifier. The factor between rise/fall times and bandwidth: 0.35/(rise time) -> bandwidth.

Example:

0.35/3.5 ns -> 100 MHz

RESOLUTION / What is it?



This is a number of picture elements or pixels, that are used to produce an image on the display. The pixel resolution of the image is specified by means of (a) the number of pixels in each horizontal row, which is the same as how many vertical lines it is possible to see (if the horizontal resolution is 800 it is possible to see 400 white/black lines [1pixel/1pixel]),



and (b) the number of pixels in each vertical column on the screen, which is the same as how many horizontal lines it is possible to see (if the vertical resolution is 600 it is possible to see 300 white/black lines) [1pixel/1pixel]).

The nominally used formula is H x V. Examples:



This tool is useful for checking whether the CRT is capable of displaying finely spaced lines across the entire CRT image area. Both the horizontal and the vertical resolution can be checked.

Note: This is an extreme test for CRTs running in high (800x600 +) resolution modes (especially monitors of 15" or less). Because of the way in which the electron beams scan the CRT screen, the beams must be turned completely on, and then completely off, within the span of 1 pixel. This puts a strain on both the electronics of the video adapter card and on the monitor. If you can't see the individual white lines you might see interference patterns, which indicates that the dot pitch is probably too coarse, or you might see a grey screen, which indicates that either the video adapter or the video amplifier of the monitor is probably too slow for this combination of resolution and image size. The solution to problems of this kind is either to run your monitor at a lower resolution, or to get a monitor with a larger image area.



If the white line moves less than is visible you have a very good monitor (screen regulation).


If the white line moves less than 1 mm your screen regulation is quite good. If the white line moves between 1 and 2 mm your screen regulation is "fair". If the white line moves between 3 and 5 mm your screen regulation is unsatisfactory, and if it moves more than 5 mm it is either catastrophic or your monitor is malfunctioning.

Reduce the brightness and contrast
Reduce the brightness and contrast. This decreases the beam current level and reduces the effect.

Reduce the background intensity
Use Windows' Control Panel to change background intensity, for example from white to grey.



What is screen regulation?




On some monitors the image expands in bright areas and contracts in dimmer areas. This happens because the monitor has a poor high-voltage regulation. This effect is more or less visible in all monitors, but normally more so in very cheap monitor models, as it is not inexpensive to design and manufacture a very good high-voltage regulation system. If your monitor has a very bad screen regulation, the picture "zooms" when you adjust the brightness control. **Examples of where this often occurs are bar graphs and Windows' title bars.**


How to use the screen regulation tools



Click on the right mouse button to go to the following picture(s). When the picture starts to blink, check the white lines on the left and right sides.





Use primary colours

White is made up of all the three primary colours, and will therefore load the beam current three times more often than only red, green or blue. Secondary colours like magenta, yellow, and cyan loads the beam current twice as often as the primary colours.

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WHY USE BRIGHTNESS AND CONTRAST CONTROL?

There are normally two controls for setting the light output of a monitor. They are called the BRIGHTNESS and CONTRAST controls respectively. The brightness control is used to adjust the video signal's zero-level to equal black on the monitor screen.

The contrast control is then used to set the amplification of the video signal, or in practice to set the light output on the monitor screen to a comfortable level.

The brightness control is used to adjust the low light output levels, and the contrast control to adjust the ratio between the low and high level light outputs. Both of these adjustments are influenced by the ambient light, the application (program) being used, as well as by the operator's personal preferences.
