
- 1. PhotoVision Pro must be distributed in its entirety and without any modifications.

PhotoVision Pro provides amazing special effects such as: pixelize, posterize, blur, edge enhancement and detect, vibrate, charcoal, negative, erode, dilate, noise reduction, and much more. You can also define your own filters of up to 10x10 matrix each.

You can rotate at any angle (in 100-th degree increment), flip, mirror, resize, crop, and even cut images or regions.

PhotoVision Pro can convert between any image format to any other image format. It can even convert an image to grayscale, it can change its color resolution from 1 bit per pixel all the way up to 32 bits per pixel (with the option of applying any of 7 dithering methods.) It can even convert an image to its halftoned representation for printing.

You can convert images from one format to another. PhotoVision Pro can read and write bitmap images in these formats: PCX, TIFF, PCD, JPEG, JFF, JTF, JIF, GIF, BMP, PVC, CMP, TGA, CAL, MAC, MSP, WPG, RAS, PCT, EPS, WMF, DIB.

PhotoVision Pro can also handle vector images (drawings) in these formats: CDR (CorelDRAW), DXF (Auto-CAD), DRW (Micrografx), PIC (Lotus), WPG (WordPerfect vector), PLT (HPGL graphics language), CGM vector, and GEM vector.

Draw shapes such as lines, boxes, or ellipses into the image. You can even insert text in your images using any Windows font.

PhotoVision Pro can compress JPEG, PVC, or CMP images by as much as a factor of 1 to 200. For example, you can easily compress a 5 Megabyte JPEG, PVC or CMP file to a file of 25K or less. PhotoVision Pro lets you specify exactly the amount of compression versus quality to apply. This feature is great if you have to transmit large images by modem. (Normally, generic file compression programs (such as PKZIP or LHARC) cannot compress 24-bit images significantly.)

You can change or optimize an image's palette or its color representation. You can change the colors of an image among 1, 4, 8, 16, 24, or 32 bits using these dithering methods: Burkes, Floyd-Stein, Sierra, Stucki, Stevenson-Arce, Jarvis.

Capture screens, areas, entire windows or client areas and bring them into a PhotoVision Pro window.

You can even scan images directly into PhotoVision Pro using any TWAIN supported scanner.

PhotoVision Pro allows you to work on multiple images at the same time in separate windows. You can view an image at any magnification level between 5% and 2000%.

PhotoVision Pro also provides a magnification by which the image is automatically scaled to fit in the window.

PhotoVision Pro is very easy to use, with an easy to use icon bar, a status line, and fly-over hints. PhotoVision Pro also has a pop-up menu invoked with the right button on your mouse. PhotoVision Pro has detailed on-line help covering every feature of the program.

PhotoVision Pro includes a powerful slideshow feature. You select which images to show, and then PhotoVision Pro does the rest. You can even apply anyone of the 20 different transition effects when displaying the image (for example, you can have your image spiral into the screen, or have it appear as random pixels of customizable size, just to mention only two of the 20 different effects.) You also have precise control over the screen location of each image, screen background color.

PhotoVision Pro's slideshow feature is more powerful than most dedicated slideshow programs, and combined with PhotoVision Pro's image capabilities it will make your slideshow presentation really stand out!



Lesson 1: Opening an Image in PhotoVision Pro

In this lesson we will open a sample image named TUTOR.JPG. The image you are about to open is a drawing of an owl.

- 1. Click on the File menu and select the Open Image command.
- 2. When the Open Image dialog is on the screen select the image file named TUTOR.JPG.
- 3. An image of an owl will be shown on the screen. You should see the name TUTOR.JPG in the title bar of that image.

Note: The image will be brought in on its side, and we will change it later in these lessons.




Lesson 2: How to Rotate an Image in PhotoVision Pro

- 1. Click on the Image menu, and select the Rotate command.
- 2. The Rotate dialog will display on the screen. Select 270 degrees in the Rotation angle section, the rotation direction should be set in the clockwise direction.
- 3. Now click on the OK button, your image should be right side up, and no longer on its side.



Lesson 3: How to Mirror an Image in PhotoVision Pro

- 1. Make sure that the TUTOR.JPG is selected, then click on the Image menu, and select the Mirror command.
- 2. The image of the owl will be automatically mirrored in the horizontal direction, and it will look like this:




Lesson 4: How to Turn an Image into Grayscale in PhotoVision Pro

Sometimes you may need a grayscale image instead of a color image, here are the steps:

- 1. Make sure that the image you want to work on is selected, in this case TUTOR.JPG.
- 2. Click on the Color menu, and select the Grayscale command.
- 3. Your color image will automatically turn into Grayscale, and it will look like this:

Lesson 5: How to Emboss an Image in PhotoVision Pro

- 1. Make sure that the TUTOR.JPG is selected, then click on the Image menu, and select the Emboss command.
- 2. When the Emboss command is selected a submenu will drop down and you will be presented with various light source directions.

 3. Select the North-East direction.
- 4. Your TUTOR.JPG image will be automatically embossed, and it will look like this:



Lesson 6: How to Save an Image in PhotoVision Pro

Most of the time you will use the Save As Image command instead of the Save command. The advantage of the Save As Image command is that it does not overwrite the original image automatically, and allows you to change the name or format of the image.

- 1. Make sure that the TUTOR.JPG is selected, then click on the File menu, and select the Save As Image command.
- 2. When the Save As Image dialog is shown on the screen, in the File Name section of this dialog, type in: EMBOSS1.JPG and click OK.
- 3. Notice that the TUTOR.JPG name in the title bar of the image will now be automatically replaced with EMBOSS1.JPG.

Please note that the original TUTOR.JPG image is not altered and is still left intact on your hard disk, as it was when it was first opened for this tutorial.



Welcome to PhotoVision

PhotoVision provides all the tools you need to create great special effects, and it also comes with a super efficient image compression format. You can of course load and save practically any type of graphic, and convert your favorite images into many of today's popular graphic formats. Imagine 24-bit images that can be compressed an average of 7 to 1 without loss of quality. And if quality is not as important, then you can compress your images with an unheard of average of 200 to 1 using the program's "lossy" technique. PhotoVision also supports TWAIN scanners and Kodak PhotoCD directly.

The PhotoVision Screen

The PhotoVision screen consists of the following items, from top to bottom: the Menu, the Speedbar, the Workspace Area, and the Status Bar.

The Menu

The top most part of the screen is the PhotoVision Pro Menu, which has the following items: File, Edit, View, Image, Color, Slideshow, Capture, Window, and Help.

Speedbar

Below the menu is the Speedbar which contains 23 helpful icons for improved productivity. All the Speedbar icons have a corresponding menu item. To learn more about what each icon does, read the description associated with the particular menu item. You can also hide the Speedbar from within the "Window" menu or from "Preferences" in the "File" menu.

The Speedbar icons in order from left to right are: (1) Open File icon, (2) Save File icon, (3) Convert Image icon, (4) Select Compression rate icon, (5) Print Image Icon, (6) Undo icon (7) Copy Current Image, (8) Paste Current Image icon, (9) Fit Image in Window icon, (10) Display image at 100%, (11) Image Info icon, (12) Rotate Image icon, (13) Horizontal Mirror Image icon, (14) Vertical Flip Image icon, (15) Color Depth icon, (16) Grayscale icon, (17) Negative Image icon, (18) Image Contrast icon, (19) Image Brightness Icon, (20) Histogram Equalize icon, (21) Cascade Windows icon, (22) Tile Windows icon, (23) Help icon.

Workspace Area

Right below the Speedbar is the Workspace area. The Workspace area is the user workspace where the user may open images in windows and manipulate them.

You can open as many image windows as will fit in memory. These windows can be minimized (iconized), maximized, or set to any size you wish. If image windows are moved off the workspace, then you can scroll the workspace to get to the image.

Status Bar

Below the client area is the Status line which shows such information as available memory, current image view magnification (like fit in Window), and "fly-over" helpful hints and help. You can also hide the status line from the Window menu, or from Preferences in the File menu.

Getting Around In PhotoVision

Mouse Techniques

Most of the time you will be using your left mouse button when selecting items from within the program, such as clicking on menus or icons.

Additionally, PhotoVision makes use of the right mouse button to bring up a pop-up menu. When your mouse cursor is directly over an image window, clicking on the right mouse button will open a menu containing some of the most widely used commands. Note that the mouse cursor must be over an image for the right mouse button menu to work.

Clicking on the right mouse button while directly over an image will bring up a menu that contains the following items: Open Image, Save Image, Save As Image, Revert, Convert Image, Undo, Copy Image, Copy Area, Paste, Duplicate, Actual Size 100%, Fit in Window, Zoom In, and Zoom Out. Just like the Speedbar, the Right Mouse Button menu contains the most popular menu selections found in the main menu of the program, and is meant to improve productivity. For example, selecting the Open Image selection from the Right Mouse Button menu displays the same Open Image dialog as if you selected the Open Image command from the File menu.

Note: Your mouse cursor must be over an image window to access the Right Mouse Button Menu.

The Menu System

When selecting a menu item such as the File menu, you will see that some of the items have three dots following the name of the command (such as Open Image...). The three dots signify that there is a dialog for this command which will require additional user input.

When you see a small triangle pointing to the right, on the right side of a menu command, it signifies that there is another submenu.

Open Image

You must first open an image before you can use any of the features and special effects available in PhotoVision. To open an image, select the Open Image command found in the File menu. You can also select the type of image to open, or simply let the program show all the importable images. PhotoVision supports both bitmap image formats and vector image formats.

To Open an image:

Select the Open Image command from the File menu, press CTRL-O on your keyboard,

or,

select the Open image icon,



the first icon from the left in the Speedbar.

The BMP or Bitmap is an image format created by Microsoft Corporation for Windows and OS/2.

CALSThe CALS format is a United States government image standard. The graphics are 1-bit CCITT Group 4 CALS raster files.

GIF

The GIF format was created by CompuServe and stands for Graphics Interchange Format. This format was designed for storing and exchanging color raster images. The GIF format uses LZW compression. PhotoVision reads 1-bit, 4-bit, and 8-bit GIF images.

EPS

EPS stands for Encapsulated PostScript, and is used primarily for PostScript printers. PhotoVision can open raster PostScript files.

IMGThe IMG format was originated with Digital Research's GEM, and its files are mostly 1-bit B&W images.

JFIF (JPEG)

The JFIF format, also referred to as JIFF and JPG is a JPEG format (Joint Picture Experts Group). This format supports the compression of 8-bit grayscale and 24-bit true color images. JPEG compression is ideal for high resolution images (like 24-bit color). Compressing a 24-bit image will result in a smaller file size & higher quality than compressing an 8-bit image. So if you want to save any 8-bit image as JPEG, you might want to first convert it to a 24-bit image with the Color Depth command found in the Color menu. Select Preferences or the Compression Factor command from the File menu to set the compression factor for this format.

JTIF (JPEG)
The JTIF format also referred to as JTF is a new extension to the TIFF format. It is becoming an industry standard and supports compression of 8-bit grayscale and 24-bit true color images. Select Preferences or the Compression Factor command from the File menu to set the compression factor for this format.

MSP

This format was originated by Microsoft Paint software, and are usually 1-bit files.

MAC

This format is used by MacPaint and its files are generally 1-bit.

PCD

PhotoVision can read PCD files which is the Kodak PhotoCD format, but does not write to it.

PCT

The PCT format is used by Microsoft Pict files. PhotoVision can read and write in the PCT format in 1-bit, 4-bit, 8-bit, and 24-bit.

PCX

This popular image file format was created by ZSoft Corporation and was popularized by the PC Paintbrush paint program. The PCX format is available in 1-bit, 4-bit, 8-bit, and 24-bit color images.

PVC and PV1

The PVC format stands for PhotoVision Compression. The PVC format can read and write 4, 8, 16 and 24 bit PVC image files, with varying compression rates depending on the selected "lossy" factor. The PV1 format is used with 1-bit files. Select Preferences or the Compression Factor command from the File menu to set the compression factor for this format.

RAS

The RAS format is a SUN raster format, and is available in 1, 4, 8, 24, and 32-bits.

TGA

The TGA file format is also referred to as TARGA, and was created by TrueVision Inc. TGA image files can be in 32-bit, 24-bit, 16-bit, and 8-bit formats. PhotoVision supports both the RLE compressed TGA and the uncompressed TGA file formats.

TIFF

TIFF stands for Tagged Image File Format and there are many variations of the TIFF format. PhotoVision supports TIFF files that are LZW compressed, 24-bit RLE compression format, 8-bit color and grayscale, 1-bit uncompressed, MacPaint, and CCITT group 3 and 4 TIFF. There are a tremendous amount of variations and flavors of TIFF files, but overall, PhotoVision handles most of the popular TIFF variations.

WPG

This is a WordPerfect raster format. PhotoVision reads these files in any bits per pixel, and writes to 1, 4, and 8 bits per pixel.

WMF

The WMF format stands for Windows Metafile and it is a vector format. PhotoVision converts the vector WMF file to a bitmap prior to displaying it on the screen.

Save Image

Select Save Image from the File menu to save your newly altered image. Note that selecting Save Image after making changes to your original image will automatically overwrite the original image file. If you want to save the changed file to another file, use the Save As Image command found in the File menu instead. The Save As Image command allows you to save your newly altered image to a file with a different name, and thus prevent overwriting of the original image.

To Save an image:

Select the Save Image command from the File menu, or press CTRL-S on your keyboard,

or,



click on the Save Image icon, located in the Speedbar (it is the second icon from the left).

Note: Another way to prevent unwanted overwriting of the original image is by working on a copy of that image. To make a copy, select the Duplicate command found in the Edit menu. Next, select the Save image command, and rename the file to another name and/or format.

Note: If you used the Capture utility, the Paste command, the Crop command, or the Duplicate command, your image will be named "untitled" by default. When you select the Save Image command for these type of images you will get the Save As Image dialog box. The Save As Image dialog will allow you to name your image and to select an image format desired.

Save As Image

Selecting Save As Image from the File menu will open the Save As dialog and allow you to save your image to a file and path of your choice. You can also access the Save As Image command by pressing Ctrl-A on your keyboard. You need to choose what graphic format you want your image to be from the Save File as Type combo box in the Save As dialog. If you are looking to convert an image from one format to another you can do it in the Save As dialog but is recommended that you use the Convert Image command found in the File menu, as it is especially designed for this purpose. For additional information about file image conversion please search for the keywords "Convert image" in this help system.

Hint: To figure out the number of colors a format supports, take two to the power of the number of bits. This means that an 8-bit file has 256 colors (2 to the eight power). Thus, 24-bit files have 16,777,216 colors.

Revert

The Revert command is found in the File menu, and can also be accessed by pressing Ctrl-R on your keyboard. Selecting the Revert command will open the last saved image for the currently selected image.

Delete Image File

To delete an image, select Delete Image File from the File menu. The Delete Image File dialog will appear on the screen allowing you to select any image file that you would like to delete. Click on the file that you want to delete in order to highlight it, then click on the OK button, the selected file will be deleted.

Note: If you deleted an image file that was opened on the screen prior to deletion, the image window will still be displayed until you close it.

Close Image

Select this command when y	ou want to Close the	current image window.
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Close All Images

This selection closes all image windows. If there were any changes made to any images, then you will be prompted by PhotoVision to save your changes.

Convert Image

The Convert Image selection converts images from one format to another. When the Convert Image command is selected the Convert: Source Image File dialog will appear on the screen, where you can select a file to convert, click OK when done. The next dialog to appear on the screen is the Convert: Target Image File dialog. In this dialog you specify the new image format to convert to, the drive and path where the new image will be placed, as well as the new name of the converted file. The newly converted file will be written to the specified path. To display the newly converted image, select Open Image from the file menu, and select the name of the converted file.

Accessing the Convert Image Command

To access the Convert Image command, select it from the File menu, or press CTRL-N on your keyboard,

or,

select the



Convert Image icon, which is the third icon from the left, in the Speedbar.

Some standard things about images you should know are:

- If you start with an 8-bit, 4-bit, or 1 bit image and convert it to a 24-bit image, the internal format will be 24-bit, but the newly converted image will still look the same, it will not look better or worse. However, if you start out with a 24-bit image, and then convert it down to an 8-bit, 4-bit, or 1-bit image, the newly converted image will be of lesser quality, and contain less colors then the original 24-bit image.
- 1-bit images are B&W monochrome images.
- Grayscale images are 8-bit.

Note: Some of the filters available with PhotoVision will work faster on 24-bit images. It will save you time to convert an image that is less than 24-bits (like an 8-bit image) to a 24-bit image prior to applying any special effects on it.

A Note About JPEG and PhotoVision Compression

Both PhotoVision and JPEG compression is ideal for high resolution images (like 24-bit color). Compressing a 24-bit image will result in a smaller file size & higher quality than compressing an 8-bit image. As a result, a compressed 4-bit image might actually be larger than the original.

We recommend PhotoVision compression because it is the highest compression rate available, with an average compression rate of 7 to 1 with no quality loss. If image quality is less important, the program offers a lossy compression rate of as high as 200 to 1 (higher than JPEG).

To set the compression rate for JPEG and PhotoVision, select the Compression Factor selection from the File menu, and then select a value between 2 and 255, the lower the value, the lower the compression rate, the higher the image quality.

Please note that even though both PVC and JPEG offer high compression rates, the actual rate achieved depends on the image, so some images will compress more than others.

Note: The value set in this dialog is automatically used when an image is converted or saved to the JPEG or PhotoVision format.

Batch Convert Images

The Batch Convert Images command is found in the Files menu, and opens the Batch Convert Dialog box. This command lets you convert more than one file at a time.

Selecting Files to Convert in a Batch

To add images to your list of files to be converted select the Add File button. The Add File button opens the Batch Convert: Add File dialog where you select a file that you would like to add to your batch conversion list.

Deleting a File from the Batch Convert List

If you decide that you don't want to convert a certain file, select the file, then click on the Remove File button.

Selecting the Output Directory

Click on the Select Output Directory button to select the directory where you want the newly converted images to be placed.

Note: If your target image format is JPEG or PVC, don't forget to set the compression factor. To set the compression rate for JPEG and PVC, select the Compression Factor selection from the File menu, and then select a value between 2 and 255. The lower the value, the lower the compression rate, but the higher the quality of the image.

Preferences

The Preferences command is found in the File menu and opens the Preferences dialog. Select the Preferences command when you want to change some of the program options, such as disabling the Undo feature, disabling the Speedbar or the Status Bar, setting the Compression Factor, etc. There are six sections in the Preferences dialog they are from top to bottom, and left to right: Screen, Preview, Other, Undo, Compression, and Multipage.

Preferences options:

Screen Options
Preview Option
Other Options
Disable Undo
Compression
Multipage

Screen Options

The available screen options are Speedbar and Status Bar. Both of these screen options are turned ON by default. When a checkbox is unchecked, it means that the screen option will not be displayed. In some cases you may not want the Speedbar or the Status Bar to display if you need more space for your image windows.

Speedbar

The Speedbar is located right below the menu, and contains icons that correspond to common menu items, for better productivity.

Status Bar

The Status Bar is located at the bottom of the screen and shows such information as the current available memory, current image view (like fit in Window), and "fly-over" hints.

Preview Option

PhotoVision has a Preview option that allows you to Preview an image effect prior to actually changing the image itself. Previewing an image gives you a very good idea of what the final image will look like, and gives you the option of not applying that particular effect to it if you decide that you don't like the effect after all. Some of the effects take time to apply on large images, so a preview will save you time.

Preview Set to Prompt

The Preview option can be set to one of these three settings: Always, Prompt, or Never. By default the Preview option is set to Prompt. When you apply a certain effect to an image, and the Preview option is set to Prompt, you will always be prompted by the program if you would like to see a preview of the image prior to applying the effect to the actual image. If you select Yes, a Preview window will pop-up on the screen with a preview of the image. If you select NO, the preview window will NOT pop-up, the effect will be applied to the image directly. Selecting "Cancel" will abort the effect.

Note: If you don't like an image effect, selecting Undo from the Edit menu, will undo will revert the image to its state prior to applying the effect.

Preview Set to Always

When the Preview option is set to Always, it means that you will always get a preview of your effect, before it will be applied to the actual image.

Preview Set to Never

When the Preview option is set to Never, it means that you will not get a preview for an effect - the effect will be applied directly on the actual image.

Other Options

The Other section found in the Preferences dialog of the File menu contains three different options.

BGR Video

This selection is normally set to ON, and can be toggled ON or OFF by clicking on the checkbox. The selection is ON when there is a checkmark in the checkbox.

BGR or not BGR?

We recommend that you leave the BRG Video command ON in most cases. The general guideline is that if your screen driver is 256 colors or less, the color order is not important, and it does not matter if BGR is selected or not. If the screen driver that you are using is more than 32000 colors, then BGR should be turned ON. If this command is not ON then when opening certain images the color palette will be changed, and you will see color changes like the color red appearing as blue, etc.

Display During Open

When this selection is toggled to ON (there will be a checkmark on the left side of this selection), the image will be shown as it is being opened. If the image being opened is very large, it may appear as pouring slowly in its own image window. The reason it may appear this way is because it is displayed as soon as it is read. This will be more noticeable on a slower computer and/or a very large image.

If the Display During Open is toggled OFF, then the image will show instantly on the screen, AFTER all of it is read and loaded into memory.

Note: Display During Open is not available if the screen bits per pixel are less than or equal to 4 bits (16 colors graphic display), or when the Open as Original command is set to ON.

Open as Original

This selection is set to OFF by default. This option can be set to ON when the real screen bits per pixel are 8 (256 color graphic display). This affects the speed with which an image is opened.

Note: "Display During Open" and "Open As Original" can be mutually exclusive or can be unavailable on certain types of displays. In this case, the program will take default settings.

Disable Undo

When Disable Undo is selected the Undo feature will be turned OFF (and there will be a checkmark to the left of the "Disable Undo" command.) When working with large images, it is a good idea to disable the undo, thus saving a great deal of memory and also speeding up any operations performed on the image.

You can also have PhotoVision automatically disable the Undo feature based on the size of an image. The minimum size to automatically disable the Undo feature is set to 2 Megabytes by default. You may change that value if you wish, to a higher or lower value. The value is specified in Kilobytes (there are 1000 Kilobytes per Megabyte).

Compression

The Compression option settings can be set between 2 and 255. PhotoVision has the compression factor set to 2 by default (for the highest quality, and lowest compression rate).

For additional information regarding the Compression factor settings, read the section entitled, Compression Factor.

Important Note: The Compression Factor set in the Preferences dialog will ONLY apply to PVC and JPEG formats. The reason that the Compression factor does not apply to other formats is because not all formats offer the ability to compress images, and some formats have standard preset compression mechanisms, (i.e.: PCX, GIF, TIFF, etc.)

Multipage

The Multipage option in the Preferences dialog applies ONLY to TIFF files that have multiple pages. The default value for the Multipage option is set to 1. If you are viewing multi-page TIFF files, set the number of pages needed prior to opening the TIFF image.

Compression Factor

The Compression Factor selection is found in the File menu and is used with JPEG and PhotoVision images only.

You can also select the Compression Factor found in the Speedbar.



by selecting the fourth icon from the left,

Very high compression can be achieved if the image quality is not that important. This can be very useful when transmitting image data by modem.

The available settings are between 2 and 255, and the program is set to 2 by default (for the highest quality, and lowest compression rate). The general guideline is the higher the compression factor setting, the lesser the quality of the resulting image.

Note: Both PhotoVision and JPEG compression is ideal for high resolution images (like 24-bit color). Compressing a JPEG or PVC 24-bit image will result in a smaller file size & higher quality than compressing an 8-bit, 4-bit, or 1-bit image. With 1-bit images you can use the PV1 format.

Acquire

This selection brings up a dialog box that allows you to interface directly with a TWAIN standard device (such as a scanner) from within PhotoVision.

Note: When you select the Acquire command from the File menu, the resulting dialog may look different depending on the TWAIN device in use. Also, some devices may have more options available for their own use than others.

To scan (acquire) an image follow these guidelines:

- 1. Make sure that your image-acquisition device is ON and ready.
- 2. Choose the image (acquire) source by first selecting the Select Acquire Source command from the File menu, and selecting the desired source.
- 3. Select the Acquire command from the File menu.
- 4. You may have to choose a standard image input driver here.

 The driver can be found in the TWAIN subdirectory of the Windows directory, or in a subdirectory of that directory.
- 5. In many case you will be able to enter values for location, width, height, and resolution. You may also be able to set values for units, colors, halftones, and paper size.
- 6. Read your device documentation for details on how to set the image acquisition dialog.
- 7. Now you are ready to acquire the image, select the OK, Scan, or Acquire button to begin. The name of the button will vary depending on the device used.

Select Acquire Source


This selection allows you to select the TWAIN standard device for image acquisition into PhotoVision. For more information about image acquisition read the section entitled Acquire.

Print Image

The Print image command found in the File menu opens the Print dialog, and allows you to print the currently selected image.

You can also access the Print Image command by pressing CTRL-P on your keyboard,

or,



Important Note: PhotoVision automatically assumes that the current printer in use is the same printer as the printer selected in the Windows Control Panel.

Please read the following on how to print an image from within PhotoVision, use the scroll bars to access all information pertaining to this topic.

Printing Location Options

There are separate selections for the Vertical and Horizontal directions. The recommended selection is Center for both the Vertical and Horizontal. If you select the Other option, then you would type in a value in pixels, which is hardware dependent.

For Example: if you have a laser printer it may print at 300 DPI (Dots per Inch), while if you had a dot matrix printer it may print at 216 x 120 Dots per Inch. Thus a value for one printer, will work differently on a different type of printer.

Thus a Vertical value of 200, printed on a laser printer will move the image down 2/3 of an inch from the top. This is because in the case of the laser printer, there are 300 dots (pixels) per inch. Then we take 200 and divide it by 300 and get 2/3 of an inch. While a Vertical value of 300 would print the image 1 inch from the top, likewise a value of 900 will print the image 3 inches from the top. If the image is large to start with, then it will be moved down on the page, and some of the bottom of the image may be cut off.

The Horizontal values works the same as the Vertical, but the image will be moved from left to right. You can for example have your Horizontal value set for Center, and the Vertical set for a custom pixel value.

Image Size at Print Time

You also have the option of changing the size of the image when printing.

When the Best Fit option is selected for both the Vertical and Horizontal planes of the paper, the image will print to fit on the entire paper, and keep its aspect ratio.

You can select the Other option, at which time you can type in a custom pixel value. Thus, a 600 Vertical value, on a laser printer with 300 DPI (remember its dots per inch) resolution will make the image 2 inches tall. And if you leave the Horizontal value set to Best Fit, then the program will calculate what the Horizontal value needs to be in order to keep the image aspect ratio preserved.

Squeezing or Stretching an Image

There may be times when you will want to print an image where it looks stretched or squeezed. To get these special effects the values to use will be dependent on the original size of the image, as well as on the type of your printer.

If for example your original image is wider than it is tall, then you can assign a Horizontal value that is the same as your Vertical value, and the result will be a squeezed image effect. On the other hand if your image is taller than it is wide, to get a stretch effect, make the Horizontal several times larger than the Vertical.

For those of you who are mathematically inclined, you can figure out the ratio between the height and width, and then make the width as large as you need - to get as much of the stretchy look desired.

Exit PhotoVision

The Exit command found in the File menu exits PhotoVision.

EDIT MENU

The Edit menu has the following commands: Undo, Disable Undo, Copy Image, Copy Area, Paste Image, Duplicate, and Empty Clipboard.

For detailed information about the commands found in the Edit menu, select the command desired below:

Undo

The Undo selection cancels the last action done on an image. Most of the effects can be undone. The undo will not work after certain actions, like after Cropping, where it is not necessary. If you plan on doing some complicated maneuvers on an image, you might want to work on a copy and not on the original. You can make a copy of the image with the Duplicate command.

The Undo command is also available from the right mouse button pop-up menu, as well as by pressing Ctrl-Z on your keyboard,

or,

by selecting the Undo icon, found in the Speedbar.



Disable Undo

When Disable Undo is selected the Undo feature will be turned OFF. When working with very large images, it is a good idea to disable the undo, thus freeing a great deal of memory and speeding up any operations performed on the image.

You can also disable the Undo feature from within the Preferences dialog, accessed through the Preferences command found in the File menu. In addition, you can also have the program automatically disable undo when opening images over a certain file size.

Note: To enter the maximum size of an image, to disable the undo feature, select the Preferences dialog.

Copy Image

The Copy Image command copies the entire image into the clipboard. To copy an image, simply click on the image to be copied, then select the Copy Image command from the Edit menu. Use the Paste command in the Edit menu to paste the image back into PhotoVision or into another Windows application.

The Copy Image command is found in the Edit menu, it can also be accessed by pressing the Ctrl-C keys on your keyboard,

or

by selecting the Copy Image icon found in the Speedbar.



Note: In addition, you can also access the Copy Image command from the right mouse button pop-up menu.

Copy Area

The Copy Area command is found in the Edit menu. When you select this command, the mouse icon turns into a cross with which you draw a rectangle around the area you would like to copy. The copied image will then be automatically placed into the clipboard.

Note: Use the Paste command to paste the image back into PhotoVision. If you want to paste the image into another Windows application, convert the image to a DIB format prior to copying it.

Paste Image

When an image is pasted you will actually see the word "paste" in the title bar of the particular image. The newly pasted image will be in PhotoVision's internal format until it is saved. Specify the format and name desired when saving your image.

Selecting the Paste Image Command

The Paste Image selection is found in the Edit menu, as well as by pressing CTRL-V on your keyboard,

or,

by pressing the Paste Image icon found in the Speedbar.



Note: You can paste images placed into the clipboard by other Windows applications, as long as the other applications store their images in the DIB format.

Duplicate

The Duplicate command is found in the Edit menu and can also be accessed by pressing Ctrl-D on your keyboard. This command allows you to copy and paste the image in the current window, all in one step.

Empty Clipboard

Use this selection when you want to clear the clipboard. This feature is useful if you are low on memory and need to free up some memory.

VIEW Menu

The View menu contains the following menu selections: Actual Size, Fit in Window, Zoom In, Zoom Out, View Perspective, and Image Information.

For detailed information on any of the View Menu commands, select the command desired from the list below:

Actual Size

The Actual Size command shows the image without any magnification (100%). This command is available in the right mouse button pop-up menu, as well as by pressing Ctrl-1 on your keyboard,

or

by selecting the Actual Size icon



found in the Speedbar.

Fit in Window

The Fit in Window selection found in the View menu displays the image so that it is entirely fitted into the window, while maintaining the aspect ratio.

This command is also available in the right mouse button pop-up menu, as well as by pressing Ctrl-F on your keyboard,

or

by selecting the Fit in Window icon, und in the Speedbar.



Zoom In

The Zoom In command lets you increase the magnification of an image. When the Zoom In command is chosen a submenu pops-up with all the available choices ranging from 200% to 2000% in increments of a 100.

Zoom Out

The "Zoom Out" command lets you decrease the magnification of an image. Another sub-menu will appear showing the various zoom out choices between 50% and 5%.

Image Perspective

Select the Image Perspective command to view an image from the Top or from the Bottom. This selection is useful if the image that is opened is brought in upside down (as is the case with some older JPEG files), or if you want to view it from a different direction. The Image Perspective selection does not change the actual image in any way, but is meant for temporary screen display only.

Note: The Image Perspective command is only used for display purposes. If you wish to actually flip the image, use the Flip command in the Image menu.

Image Information

When you need to know additional information about an image like what format it is in, how many bits, or how much size it takes up on disk, select the Image Information selection found in the View Menu.

You can also click on the Info Icon found in the Speedbar.



IMAGE MENU

The Image Menu contains the following image commands: Rotate, Mirror, Flip, Resize, Crop, Mosaic, Vibrate, Charcoal, Emboss, Posterize, Erode, Dilate, Sharpness, Blur, Remove Noise, Edge Enhance, Edge Detect, Line Segment, and User Defined Filters.

Rotate

To rotate an image in PhotoVision you can type-in any angle desired, even as accurate as a hundredth of a degree. Rotation can be set in clockwise or counter-clockwise direction.

Accessing the Rotate Command

If you want to rotate an image, select Rotate Image from the Image menu, or press Shift-Ctrl-R on your keyboard,

or

select the Rotate icon from the Speedbar.



When rotating the same image more than once, the rotation angle will be cumulative. This means that if you rotated the same image 40 degrees the first time, and then went back and rotated the same image 7 degrees, the final image was actually rotated a total of 47 degrees.

It is best to rotate the same image only once, rather than to rotate the image several times until you arrive at the correct angle. The more an image is rotated the more detail is lost in the image, you may want to work on a copy of the image.

Resize Checkbox

At rotation angles other than 90, 180, 270, and 360 degrees, more room will be needed to accommodate the newly rotated image than what was available in the original window. If the Resize Window checkbox is checked, the image window will be resized automatically. If you don't want the image to be resized automatically leave it unchecked. However, if you uncheck this box, parts of your image will be clipped.

When the Resize Window checkbox is not checked, the selected image will be rotated, but some corners may be cut off (depending on the rotation angle selected).

Frame Color

Frame Color applies to the new corner areas created when the image is rotated at angles other than 90, 180, 270, and 360 degrees.

You can change the frame color of your image to something other than black if both of these are true: (1) You rotate an image in anything other than 90 degree increments, and, (2) The Resize Window checkbox is checked.

Note: Assigning a frame color to an image that is not a 24-bit image may cause the frame color to become dithered when applied to the image, so that the color you originally selected will look different in the image. The reason for the color discrepancy is because the frame color you select is being matched to the low bit color palette of your original image.

The way around this situation is to convert your original image to 24-bits PRIOR to rotation.

You can convert your image to 24-bits by selecting the Color menu, and then selecting the Color Depth selection. From within the Color Depth dialog, set the Bits-per-pixel option to 24-bits and set the Dithering option to "None". If you still need a low bit image after rotation, you can convert the image down again.

Mirror

The Mirror selection makes a mirror image of the current image.

Accessing the Mirror command

The Mirror command can be accessed in the Image menu, by pressing Shift-Ctrl-M on your keyboard,

or

by selecting the Mirror icon



in the Speedbar.

Flip

If you need to flip an image 180 degrees then you need the Flip command found in the Image menu.

Accessing the Flip Command

The Flip command can be selected from the Image menu, by pressing Shift-Ctrl-F on your keyboard,

or

by selecting the Flip command icon from the Speedbar.

Resize

If you need to make the original image larger or smaller, select the Resize selection found in the Image menu, or press Shift-Ctrl-Z on your keyboard.

The Resize dialog box shows the current size of the image, and allows you to type in a new width and a new height. If you check the Maintain Aspect-Ratio checkbox, then you only need to type in the width, the program will automatically figure out the height so that the size ratio is maintained with that of the original.

If the Maintain Aspect-Ratio checkbox is not checked and you type in your own width and height, the resulting image may look distorted. Of course there may be times where image distortion may be desirable for special effect.

Crop

Select the Crop command found in the Image menu when you only need to cut a part of an image. You can also access the Crop command by pressing Shift-Ctrl-C on your keyboard.

When you select the Crop command your mouse cursor will change shape to a cross. Position the cross-shaped mouse cursor at the top corner where you would like to select a rectangular area of the image, and drag the mouse cursor while holding down your left mouse button. Release the mouse button when you are finished selecting the rectangular area. As soon as the image is cropped it will pop-up on the screen in its own image window, with the word "crop" in parentheses (in the title bar) to signify its origin.

If you are not satisfied with the first try, close the window and try again.

Hint: To delete the cropped image, select it, then select Close Image from the File menu. You will be prompted to save your image, just select NO.

The newly cropped image will be automatically named "Untitled" and will be in PhotoVision's internal format until it is saved with the Save command.

Mosaic

This selection makes the image look like it is made out of squares or tiles. The possible mosaic effects are: 2×2 , 4×4 , 8×8 , 16×16 , 32×32 , and 64×64 . The larger the number the larger the tiles. However, if you select the Custom selection from within the Mosaic command, you can go as high as 128×128 . Generally, we don't recommend going over the 8×8 selection as anything larger makes it difficult to discern the image details.

Vibrate

When you select the Vibrate filter the available vibration directions are: Horizontal, Vertical, Diagonal Left, Diagonal Right, and All Directions. The effect of this filter is that the image looks like it is vibrating.

Charcoal

The Charcoal effect filter will convert a color image into a charcoal-look drawing. In some cases the result may be in black background with white detail. To correct this effect, simply select the Negative command from the Color menu, or click on the Negative icon (the seventh icon from the right).

There are four degrees of line thickness to select for the charcoal effect: Extra Thin, Thin, Medium, and Thick.

Emboss

The Emboss gives the image the appearance of being stamped in metal. There is a choice of possible light sources shining on the image from the following directions:

North

North-East

East

South-East

South

South-West

West

North-West

You can improve on the Emboss effect by selecting Grayscale from the Color menu right after embossing your image, this will remove any left over color. However, if you do not wish to convert the image to grayscale, you can achieve a similar result by selecting a value of -100 from the custom Saturation command.

Posterize

This is a feature that reduces the color levels to less than the original to create a poster effect. The Posterize effect offers several levels ranging from 2 to 64 levels. The smaller the number the less colors an image will use. For example if 2 levels are selected that means the image will have 2 shades of red, 2 of blue, and 2 of green, etc.

Erode

This effect shrinks black areas in an image, making the white areas larger. There are four available direction styles: All directions, Horizontal, Vertical, and Diagonal. The style you select is dependent on the image and the effect desired.

Dilate

This effect enlarges black areas in an image, making the white areas smaller. This effect is available in four styles: All directions, Horizontal, Vertical, and Diagonal.

Sharpness

This effect enhances detail in the image. The sharpness effect is done by making certain pixels brighter than the neighboring pixels. There is a choice to increase or decrease the sharpness of the image that ranges from 10% to 100%.

Blur (Smooth)

The Blur effect also known as smoothing, has 5 selections to choose from:

3 x 3 neighborhood 5 x 5 neighborhood 7 x 7 neighborhood 9 x 9 neighborhood Custom

This means that a 3×3 neighborhood for example, is the size of an area that is averaged, and then used to replace each pixel in the graphic, causing a blurring effect. The larger the neighborhood, the larger the area that will be used to generate the average, to be used for pixel replacement. This effect may take a while to apply on some images, because of the many calculations involved, it is a good idea to see the preview of this effect prior to applying it to the image.

The custom selection is available from 1x1 up to a 16x16 neighborhood.

Remove Noise

The Remove Noise selection is similar to the Blur effect. Noise is removed by replacing each pixel with the median of it and those in its neighborhood. The neighborhood choices are:

3 x 3 neighborhood (3 pixels by 3 pixels)

5 x 5 neighborhood

7 x 7 neighborhood

9 x 9 neighborhood

Custom

This effect is useful if you have one or a small amount of pixels that don't quite match with the rest of the image, thus blending it into the image. This effect may take a while to apply on some images, because of the large number of calculations involved.

The custom selection allows you to select from 1x1 up to a 25x25 neighborhood.

Edge Enhance

Edge Enhance detects steep color transitions and accentuates changes in the image. There are five available filters for edge enhancement: the Gradient Method, Laplacian Method, Sobel Method, the Prewitt Method, and the Shift in Difference. Some of these filters are better suited on certain images than others, the best course of action is to experiment until you find one that achieves the desired effect on your image.

Gradient Method

The Gradient Method offers edge enhancement from a user selected light source.

North

North-East

East

South-East

South

South-West

West

North-West

Laplacian Method

The Laplacian Method offers edge enhancement where the light source can be Horizontal, Vertical, or Diagonal.

Sobel Method

The Sobel Method offers Horizontal or Vertical edge enhancement. Some images will work better with the Horizontal, while others may work better with the vertical direction.

Generally the Sobel method offers slightly more detailed edge enhancement than the Laplacian method because it is not affected as much by image noise.

Prewitt Method

The Prewitt Method offers edge enhancement in the Vertical or Horizontal direction.

Shift in Difference

The	Shift in	Difference	offers	edae	enhancer	ment in	the	horizontal.	vertical.	and o	diagonal	direction.

Edge Detect

The Edge Detect filter is useful in highlighting the edges of an image. The available styles of the Edge Detect filter are: Light, Medium, and Heavy.

Line Segment

This is an effect that emphasizes line segments in an image. The Line Segment effect is available in four directions: Horizontal, Vertical, Left to Right, and Right to Left.

User Defined Filters

This selection allows you to define your own custom filters. When the User Defined Filters dialog is on the screen the available selections are Apply, Edit, New, Delete, Save, and Close.

To edit an existing filter, first highlight it from the list, and then click on the EDIT button.

To start a new filter, click on the NEW button, and you will be presented with a new matrix, ready for new input.

To Save your new filter select the SAVE button. The filters are saved to a file called PHOTOVIS.FLT in the PhotoVision directory.

Some of the special effect filters in the program use a 3×3 matrix, but you can use up to a 10×10 matrix. For example, the emboss filter which typically has a Divisor of 1, a Bias of 127, a -1 in the top left grid, and a 1 in the bottom right grid (all other grids have zeros in them), when it is extended to a 7 x 7 matrix, the resulting image shows thicker lines, and slightly more detail.

When it comes to user-defined filters the best thing to do is to experiment.

Note: When working with different sizes of matrices, don't forget to type in the matrix width and height in the Matrix Size text box. For example, if you make a matrix of 10 x 10, and the number in the matrix text box shows 3, when you click on the OK button, the other matrices will be automatically erased.

COLOR MENU

The Color menu contains the following commands: Halftone, Color Depth, Grayscale, Negative, Psychedelic, Brightness, Contrast, Hue, Saturation, and Histogram Equalize.

Halftone

The Halftone menu option allows you to create a halftone for the screen (if you intend to use it for display purposes), or for the printer (if you eventually intend to print your image).

When the image is halftoned for the printer, the image is converted to a 1-bit image, and a grayscale effect is achieved by making varied densities of black dots.

When an image is halftoned for the screen, the image is converted to a 1 bit image, but the effect is that of more detail, and the effect looks like a line screen. In general the dots are finer for the screen then they are for the printer.

If you convert a 4, 8, 16, 24, or a 32-bit image to halftone, that image will be converted to a 1-bit Black and White image.

Color Depth

The Color Depth command allows for adjusting the number of bits, the type of dithering, and the selection of the color palette desired. Additionally, when an image is opened and the Color Depth Option is selected, the Palette section displays the available palettes.

Accessing the Color Depth Command

The Color Depth command can be accessed from the Color menu, as well as by pressing the Shift-Ctrl-D keys on your keyboard,

or

by selecting the Color Depth icon



from the Speedbar.

Note: Some of the special effects in the program take longer on images that are less than 24 bit. To speed up the process, convert the image (that is originally less than 24 bits) to 24 bits, before you apply the special effect.

The available Bits per Pixel options are: 1, 4, 8, 16, 24, and 32.

The available Dithering options are:

None

The above dithering options are somewhat similar, but some may produce better results on a particular image. Dithering is useful if you want the original image to be as close as possible to the original when reducing the number of bits in an image. It is not necessary to dither an image when increasing the bits per pixel.

The available color palettes are:

Fixed

Optimized

BGR

RGB

BGR stands for the Blue-Green-Red color palette, while RGB stands for the Red-Green-Blue color palette. For additional information on BGR read the BGR Video section discussed in the Preferences... section.

When an image is opened the format of the image is not automatically selected in the color palette. Some of the above color palette options will show as grayed out, when they are not available, or when they do not apply to that image.

Grayscale

Selecting the Grayscale option from the Color menu will change the currently selected image to an 8-bit Black and White grayscale image.

Accessing the Grayscale Command

You can select the Grayscale command from the Color menu, as well as by pressing the Shift-Ctrl-G key combination,

or

by selecting the Grayscale icon from the Speedbar.

Hint: If the original image that was changed to grayscale was originally less than 24 bit, select the Histogram Equalize icon (fourth icon from the right), to get more detail.

Negative

Selecting the Negative selection from the Color menu, gives a photo-negative look to a currently selected image. This effect reverses all colors with their inverse color.

Accessing the Negative Command

You can select the Negative command from the Color menu, as well as by pressing the Shift-Ctrl-N key combination on your keyboard,

or

by selecting the Negative icon from the Speedbar.



Psychedelic

The Psychedelic filter changes colors in the image so that the resulting image looks psychedelic. This effect is designed for use with color images and can be very dramatic.

Brightness

The Brightness selection has three options: Increase, Decrease, and Custom. Both the Increase and Decrease options are available from 10% to 100%, in 10% increments. The Custom option allows you to type in a brightness factor between -100% to 100% (you can also use the scroll bar to make your selection.) Negative values in the custom dialog correspond to a decrease in brightness.

Accessing the Brightness Command

by selecting the Brightness icon I from	the Speedbar.								

Contrast

The Contrast selection has three options: Increase, Decrease, and Custom. Both the Increase and Decrease options are available from 10% to 100%, in 10% increments. The Custom option allows you to type in a Contrast factor between -100% to 100%, (you can also use the scroll bar to make your selection.) Negative values in the Custom dialog correspond to a decrease in Contrast.

Accessing the Contrast Command

You may select the Contrast command from the Color menu, and by selecting the Contrast icon from the Speedbar.

Hue

The Hue selection changes the hue of colors in a bitmap by rotating the color wheel starting from the most dominant color. The color wheel can be rotated between 30 and 360 degrees in increments of 30 degrees. If you select the Custom selection from the Hue command, then you can type in a custom degree range, or you can slide the scroll bar to the desired value.

Saturation

Saturation is the intensity of a color. If the saturation is increased the colors in the image will look more vivid. The reds will be more red, blue will be bluer, causing a surreal effect. If the saturation is reduced, colors will be pale, creating an effect similar to a grayscale image. Try experimenting with your images for the optimum saturation level.

The Saturation selection has three options: Increase, Decrease, and Custom. Both the Increase and Decrease options are available from 10% to 100%, in 10% increments. The Custom option allows you to type in a Saturation factor between -100% to 100%, you can also use the scroll bar to make your selection. Negative values in the Custom dialog correspond to a decrease in saturation.

Histogram Equalize

The Histogram Equalize selection linearizes the number of pixels per gray level. This effect is useful in bringing out detail in darker areas of an image.

The overall effect is that the picture looks brighter and clearer. Many images benefit from this effect, especially if they appear too dark.

Accesssing the Histogram Equalize Command

You can also access the Histogram Equalize command from the color menu, as well as by pressing the Shift-Ctrl-H key combination on your keyboard,

or

by selecting the Histogram Equalize icon from the Speedbar.



DRAW MENU

There are four commands found in the Draw menu: Text, Line, Box, and Ellipse.

For detailed information about any of the commands found in the Draw menu, please select the command name below:

Text

You may add text to any image by selecting the Text command from the Draw menu. You can also access the Text command by pressing the CTRL-T key combination.

Type in your text in the Text dialog, and select the font, font size, the style (bold, italic, underline, strikethru), and color attributes of your text. There is a sample text window that displays a sample of the text selected. When you click on the Draw button, the Text dialog will close, and your mouse cursor will change to a Text Draw mouse cursor. Position the mouse cursor where you would like your text to begin, then click OK and the text will appear on the image. Once you are sure of the position of the desired text on the image, you may then save your image.

Line

The Line command allows you to draw lines on your image. You have the ability to select the line thickness desired (in number of pixels), and the color. When the Draw button is selected the mouse cursor changes to a Line Draw cursor. Position the mouse cursor where you would like your line to begin, then click on your right mouse button for the line to be drawn immediately.

Diagonal lines

As you draw your line with the Line Draw mouse cursor, a rectangular box will be formed on the screen, with the label "line" in the center. If you need a diagonal line, take into account that the angle of your line will be measured by the distance and position of opposite corners in the rectangle. Thus for a straight line, you would not want to draw any rectangle with the Line Draw mouse cursor, but should keep the rectangle as thin as a line, or an invisible line.

Straight Lines

For a straight line, you would not want to draw any rectangle with the Line Draw mouse cursor, but should keep the rectangle as thin as a line, or an invisible line.

Box

The Box command is found in the Draw menu and can also be accessed by pressing the CTRL-B key combination. You can select a fill pattern, a fill color, an optional background color, the thickness of the outline, and the outline color. If you choose not to use the background color, the background color will be see-through.

Ellipse

The Ellipse command is found in the Draw menu and can also be accessed by pressing the CTRL-E key combination. You can select a fill pattern, a fill color, an optional background color, the thickness of the outline, and the outline color. If you choose not to use the background color, the background color will be see-through.

SLIDESHOW MENU

PhotoVision has a comprehensive built-in slideshow. You can select from among 20 transition effects, the location where you would like your image on the screen, even if you would like to move between slides on a key-press, or after a user-selected time period. You can also show multiple images on the screen at the same time, and even show the slideshow backwards. There can be a maximum of up to 220 images in a slideshow.

There are four items in the Slideshow menu: New Slideshow, Open Slideshow, Play Slideshow, and Delete Slideshow.

New Slideshow

From the Slideshow menu select New Slideshow, this will open the Slideshow dialog. To begin selecting the images to be included in your slideshow select the "Add" button.

When the "Add" button is selected the Add Slide dialog appears on the screen and allows you to select an image file. Click OK after selecting the image desired. To add another image to the slideshow select the Add button again, and then repeat the above steps.

The images will be shown in the order selected, this means that the first image on the list will be the first image to display when the slideshow is played.

How to Remove an Image from the Slideshow

If you decide that you don't want a certain image in your slideshow, select the Open Image command, and then select the unwanted image file by clicking on it, (the image file should become highlighted). Next, select the Remove button from the Slideshow dialog, the image will be removed from the slideshow list (of course this will not affect the actual image file).

Saving a Slideshow

To save your slideshow select the Save button from the Slideshow dialog (the Slideshow dialog appears after selecting the New Slideshow command from the Slideshow menu). The Save Slideshow dialog will open allowing you to type in a name for your slideshow. The program will automatically add the extension of .SLD to the name selected.

If you are working on an existing slideshow, and want to save your new changes, click on the Save button. When the Save Slideshow dialog is on the screen, click OK from the Save Slideshow dialog, or type in a new name if you want to save it under another name.

Adding Effects to Your Slideshow

In the Slideshow dialog there is a section entitled Transitions. In the Transitions section itself there is the Effects, Color, and Clear Screen Options.

The Color option is where you select the background color for each image. To assign a color to an image, select the image from the slideshow list (the image should become highlighted), then click on the Color button. When the Color dialog appears on the screen, select a color from the Color dialog. You can select one of the basic colors or make your own customized color from the color chart. Click on the OK button to assign the selected color to that image. Repeat this process for any image whose background color you would like to change. If you want the same color for all your images all you need to do is select a color for the first image.

Note: The color option is applied only if "Clear Screen" is checked.

Creating a Custom Color

To make your own custom color, position your mouse cursor on the color chart (the rainbow color box on the top right of the Color dialog), and while holding the left mouse button down, drag the mouse cursor around the color chart. The different colors that you create will be shown in a separate color box right below the color chart. When you are happy with the custom color created, click on the Add to Custom Colors button. You should also change the pointer next to the vertical color chart to the far right of the dialog.

Selecting a Transition Effect

Normally when you first select a new image from a new slideshow, the transition effect shown will be "No Effect". The "No Effect" simply means that the image will pop-up normally during the slideshow. There are a total of 20 different ways in which the image can be opened on the screen (transition effects). Some of these effects are more suited for smaller images, others for larger. It is a matter of what type of computer and images are in use. The best way to find out what works for you is to experiment.

The available transition effects are:

Spiral Out

To use one of these effects select an image from the list of selected images in the Slideshow dialog, then select an effect out of the transition effects list.

Clearing the Screen After Opening an Image
You can also choose to clear the screen before an image is displayed. The screen is cleared to the color shown in the box next to the Color button.

If however, you want your image to overlap the prior slide on the screen, or if you want to display more than one image on the screen, then leave the Clear Screen option unchecked.

Slideshow Image Placement Options

You can also select the vertical and horizontal position of your images. The available options are:

Vertical: Center, Top, Bottom, and Custom. **Horizontal:** Center, Left, Right, and Custom.

The end result is that you can mix and match one selection from the horizontal and one from the vertical. For example: to center your image on the screen select Center for both the Vertical and Horizontal options. If you select the Custom selection, you can type in the image placement in pixels. *Note:* If you choose to place your image by pixel location, keep in mind that the image placement will vary depending on the type of graphic display is in use, for example: a VGA display is 640x480 pixels, an EGA display is 640x350, etc.

Hint: If you choose not to clear your screen after certain images you can try this special effect (works best on small images): have one image that is Top-Left, the next image Center-Center, and a third image that is Bottom-Right. Make sure that all of the three images have the Clear Screen option unselected.

Moving Between Slides

You can select to have your images display automatically at preset times (in seconds), or you can switch to the next image with a keypress or a mouse click. You can also mix and match so that some of the images pop-up automatically, while others require a key-press.

To see your slideshow, select the Play button from the Slideshow dialog box. You can also select the Play Slideshow menu item from the Slideshow menu to play an existing slideshow title.

Moving Forward and Backward in the Slideshow

To move to the next slide press Space bar, DownArrow, RightArrow, or press the Left button on your mouse. To move to the previous slide press Backspace, UpArrow, LeftArrow, or press the Right button on your mouse. To Abort a slideshow press the ESC key.

Note: You can force a move to next/prior slide even if the slide is set to "Time Delay" by pressing one of the keys listed above.

Open Slideshow

The Open Slideshow command opens an existing slideshow, allowing you to make changes to it. You can also access the Open Slideshow command by pressing Shift-Ctrl-O on your keyboard.

Play SlideshowThe Play Slideshow command lets you select an existing slideshow to play. You can also access the Play Slideshow command by pressing Shift-Ctrl-P on your keyboard.

Delete Slideshow

To delete an entire slideshow, select Delete Slideshow from the Slideshow menu. The Delete Slideshow dialog will display on the screen allowing you to select the slideshow to delete. Note that slideshows have the extension of .SLD. By deleting a slideshow, you are not deleting the original image that was used in the slideshow, only the slideshow information.

CAPTURE MENU

PhotoVision has a comprehensive screen capture utility which is found in the Capture menu. The application from which the screen capture is desired should be running beneath PhotoVision, this way, when PhotoVision's screen capture is invoked, the other application will be readily available.

Important Note: PhotoVision capture utility will only work with Windows versions: 3.1, 3.11, and Windows for Workgroups (prior to Windows 95).

The available commands found in the Capture menu are: Window (capture), Client Area (capture), Rectangle (capture), Active Window (capture), and Screen (capture).

CAPTURE MENU commands:

Window Client Area Rectangle Active Window Screen

Window

This command lets you select the desired window to do a screen capture, when there is more than one window open on the screen. You can also select the Window capture command by pressing Shift-Ctrl-W on your keyboard. Immediately after selecting this option, PhotoVision becomes hidden and the mouse cursor changes to a small hand pointing to a window. Move the cursor over the window desired, and click once to capture it.

Client Area

This command captures the client area of a selected window. Immediately after selecting this option, PhotoVision becomes hidden and the mouse cursor changes to a hand pointing to a small window. Move the cursor over the window desired, and click once to capture it.

Rectangle

This selection will allow you to draw a rectangle around the desired screen capture area. When the Rectangle selection is selected from the Capture menu, PhotoVision becomes hidden, and the mouse cursor changes its shape to a cross. The cross shaped mouse cursor is used to select the desired screen capture area. During selection of the capture rectangle, the dimensions of the selected area are shown.

Active Window

This selection will automatically capture the currently active window of the currently active application.

Screen

This selection will automatically capture the entire screen. You can also access the Screen capture command by pressing Shift-Ctrl-S on your keyboard.

When an image is captured, its format is set to PhotoVision's internal format. You can select an image file format when saving the image to disk.

Note: Right after an image is captured, PhotoVision will no longer be hidden, but will be restored on the screen just as before the capture process. The newly captured image will be automatically placed in its own window, and have the name "Untitled" in the title bar, until it is saved under another name. The word "Capture" will also be displayed in the title bar.

The screen capture utility can be used to make an image ONLY from another application, but not from within PhotoVision itself.

Hint: If you run two copies of PhotoVision you can capture from one PhotoVision while running the other.

WINDOW MENU

The Window menu shows the standard window options such as: Cascade, Tile, Arrange Icons, Close All.

For detailed information on any of the Window menu commands found in PhotoVision, please select the command name desired from the list below:

Switching between images

Cascade

The Cascade selection is useful when you have more than one image opened on the screen. Selecting the Cascade selection will shuffle the images on the screen so that they are in cascading order, and that only one image is fully visible at one time, while only the caption bars are visible from the other images.

Accessing the Cascade Command

You can access the Cascade command from PhotoVision's Window menu, as well as by pressing Shift-F5 on your keyboard,

or

by selecting the Cascade icon from the Speedbar.



Tile

The Tile selection displays all the images side by side, and if there are many images on the screen, then the entire screen is filled with small windows. The more windows there are on the screen the less of the image is immediately visible, the scroll bars must be used to see the rest of the image.

Accessing the Tile Command

You can access the Tile command from PhotoVision's Window menu, as well as by pressing Shift-F4 on your keyboard.,

or

by selecting the Tile icon from the Speedbar.



Arrange IconsArrange Icons will arrange all icons of minimized windows (if any) at the bottom of the workspace. This is useful when icons are scrolled off the workspace or when they are obscured by other windows.

Note: PhotoVision's virtual workspace lets you have many open windows that can even extend off the screen. Use the workspace scroll bars to bring them into view. You can also use the Cascade or Tile commands to bring them all into view.

Close All

The Close All selection closes all images in PhotoVision. If there were any changes made to any image that is on the screen, a dialog will pop-up on the screen and prompt you if you would like to save your changes.

Note: The Close All Images command found in the File menu works the same way as the Close All command found in the Window menu.

Speedbar

When there is a checkmark to the left of the Speedbar command found in the Window menu, it signifies that the Speedbar will be displayed on the screen. This command is toggled ON or OFF by selecting the command from the Window menu. The Speedbar is located right below the menu, and contains 23 icons that correspond to widely used menu items, for better productivity.

Note: This option can also be activated in the Preferences dialog found in the File menu.

Status Bar

When there is a checkmark to the left of the Status Bar command found in the Window menu, it signifies that the Status Bar will be displayed on the screen. This command is toggled ON or OFF by selecting the Status Bar command from the Window menu. The Status Bar is displayed at the bottom of the screen and shows such information as the current available memory, current screen view (like fit in Window), and "fly-over" hints if any.

Note: This option can also be activated in the Preferences dialog found in the File menu.

Switching Between Images

If you have more than one image file displayed on the screen, you can switch between them by clicking on the desired filename shown at the bottom of the Window menu. This is especially useful if you have several images that may be overlapping. The currently selected image will be the one with a checkmark to the left of the filename. If there are more than nine images on the screen, the last selection to show in the Window menu will be "More windows...". Selecting the "More windows..." selection will bring up the Select Window dialog which will list the filenames of all the opened images (when there are more than nine images on the screen). Of course you can also switch between images by simply clicking on the respective window.
