Guidelines for Choosing Chores/Behaviors

When deciding which tasks and/or behaviors your children should be responsible for, involve them in the process. Sit down with them and generate a list of chores they can perform and/or desirable behaviors they can learn or improve.

Note: You can use StarCharts to make the list(s) by performing the first five steps of Getting Started.

Things to consider when making your lists:

- 1) The task or behavior should be age-appropriate
- 2) The task or behavior should be well defined
- 3) Training may be required
- 4) Have the right equipment
- 5) Set a good example

1) The task or behavior should be age appropriate

The abilities of children of a certain age group vary widely. Click on one of the following age groups for suggestions of task/behaviors that may be appropriate for your child.

2) The task or behavior should be well defined

A task should have a definite, measurable goal. This is especially true for younger children. A task such as "Put dolls in toy box" is an example of a task with a definite, measurable goal. The goal is to have all the dolls in the toy box. The measure is that there are none remaining in other parts of the room. A task such as "Clean the living room" may be too general. It could be broken down into several, more definite tasks such as: "Vacuum living room", "Straighten magazines on coffee table", "Dust coffee table & piano". The same principles can be applied to behaviors. "Have good manners", for instance, is really a whole set of behaviors which can be broken down into: "Says Please & Thank You", "Speaks when spoken to", "Sits straight at the table", "Says Hello/Goodbye", etc.

3) Training may be required

Most children cannot be expected to perform a task or exhibit a behavior if they have never been shown how. You must take the time to show your children what to do. A good approach is to first do it yourself while your children watch. Then, let them try it while you watch. Assist them where necessary but try to resist the temptation to "take over". Praise them lavishly for all sincere attempts. By training your children you also communicate to them your expectations of what constitutes satisfactory completion. Be careful, however, that your expectations do not exceed their abilities.

4) Have the right equipment

If one of the assigned tasks for a child is to "Sweep the Kitchen" make sure that the child can handle the broom. A smaller broom may be required. If you require that the toys in a child's room be picked up, make sure there are enough accessible toy containers to accommodate them. If "Setting the Dinner Table" is on a child's task list, make sure that he/she can reach the dishes.

5) Set a good example

As you know, children are very observant. Please do not expect them to keep their rooms immaculate if you're in the habit of leaving your clothes on the floor and your bed un-made.

Ages 2-3 Up to two tasks a day

2. Hang pajamas on low hook
3. Dress with help
4. Simple grooming - wash face, brush hair
5. Help with bed making
6. Tidy bedroom with help
7. Empty bathroom wastebasket

10. Bring in newspaper
11. Keep pillow straightened on sofa

8. Place items for school by the door
9. Switch off unused lights

16. Wash bathroom sink

Ages 8-10 Up to five tasks a day

7. Clear the table and do dinner dishes
8. Bring in wood (winter) or pick fruit (summer)

GETTING STARTED

To begin using **StarCharts** follow these steps:

- 1) Create a StarChart File
- 2) Create a StarChart
- 3) Define Assignment/Award Tokens
- 4) Define Tasks/Behaviors
- 5) Make Assignments
- 6) Print the Chart
- 7) Evaluate/Reward progress

Create a StarChart File

Select "File" from the menu and choose the "New" option. The "New File" dialog box will appear. Move the cursor inside the "Charts For" edit control and click the left mouse button. The text entry cursor will appear. Enter the name of the person to which the charts will belong. As you enter the name, a filename will be constructed in the "Filed In" edit control. After entering the person's name, you can change the filename by moving the cursor into the "Filed In" edit control, clicking with the left mouse button and using the editing keys. (For more tips on editing see the "Working with Text" section in the Window's 3.1 Users Guide.) If the directory name displayed to the right of "Of Directory" is not correct, change it by selecting the appropriate drive from the "Drives" combo box and the appropriate directory from the "Directories" list box. When the chart owner's name, filename and directory are all correct, click the "OK" button. Having created a new file, the "New Chart" dialog will now automatically appear. This dialog allows you to perform the next step which is to [Create a StarChart](#)

Create a StarChart

If you have just created a new file, the "New Chart" dialog will automatically appear. If however, you are working with a file that already exists and you wish to create a new chart, select "Chart" from the menu and choose the "New" option. When the "New Chart" dialog box appears, move the cursor into the "New Chart Name" edit control and type in the name of the new chart. If you are working with a new file, choose the "EMPTY" radio button in the "Initialize" box. If you are working with an old file and wish to base your new chart on an existing chart, choose the "USE PREVIOUS" radio button in the "Initialize" box, then choose the name of the existing chart from the drop-down list. After all selections have been made, choose the "OK" button to create the new chart. A row of dates should appear at the top of the chart grid beginning with last Sunday's date and ending with Saturday's date. The next step is to Define Tokens

Define Tokens

To define tokens, choose "Tokens" from the menu and select the "Choose..." option. A dialog box with the title, "Tokens", will appear.

When defining tokens, you must first decide if they will have value. If you don't wish to give the tokens value, then choose the "Units = NONE" radio button in the "Value" box. When this option is chosen, the "Units" edit control next to the token picture does not come into play. If you wish to use a point system, choose the "Units = POINTS" radio button in the "Value" box. When using a point system, you can give each selected token a different point value by changing the number in the "Units" edit control next to the token picture before adding it to the "Selected Tokens" list. Tokens with higher values can be awarded for exceptional performance. If you wish to tie the StarChart to allowance or monetary rewards, choose the "Units = DOLLARS" radio button in the "Value" box. If you choose this option you must also decide the value of a unit and type it into the "One Unit = Dollars" edit control (decimal values such as 0.01 are permitted).

Tokens will be placed on the StarChart when you are making daily task assignments or showing that daily tasks have been accomplished. The more tokens you choose, the more interesting the chart will appear.

To select a token, choose its name from the list of "Possible Tokens". Upon clicking the name of the token, a picture of it will appear below the "ADD >>>" button. If you wish to add it to the list of "Selected Tokens", click on the "ADD >>>" button. Its name will be removed from the "Possible Tokens" list and placed on the "Selected Tokens" list. Another way to add a token to the "Selected Tokens" list is to double click on its name in the "Possible Tokens" list. Make sure that the "Units" edit control contains the desired number before you add a token using the "double click" method. To remove a token from the "Selected Tokens" list, select its name from the list, then click on the "<<< REMOVE" button, or simply double click on its name. To change the order of the tokens in the list, simply select the name of the token you wish to move, then click the UP or DOWN button. Having chosen the desired tokens, the next step is to [Define Tasks/Behaviors](#)

Define Tasks/Behaviors

To define a task or behavior, select "Task" from the menu and then choose either "New Text Task" or "New Symbol Task". The "New Text Task" option should be used for older children who can read, since it only permits you to type a description of the task or behavior. An example of a text task might be, "Puts the yard toys away". The "New Symbol Task" option can be used for children who cannot read. This option allows you to choose a picture from a pre-defined selection to represent the task or behavior. A short description can also be included for the symbol task.

To define a text task, select the "New Text Task" from the menu. An "Edit Task" dialog will appear. Click in the "Task Name" edit control and enter the text for the task. If you enter more letters than can fit in the control it will scroll so that the new letters you type will be visible. After entering the text for the task, click in the "Goal" edit control and enter the number of units that will serve as a goal for the task. (As an example of setting a goal value, suppose you are using a point system and have determined that performing the specified task on any given day will be worth 1 point. If the goal is to get your child to perform the task every day of the week, then set the goal value to 7. The total value displayed at the end of a row on the chart will be red until the goal is achieved or exceeded at which time it will be black.) If you wish to be more descriptive about the task you are defining, you can add extra comments in the edit control provided for that purpose (click in the "Comments" edit control and enter your comments). The comments will not show up on the main chart window, but they will appear anytime you edit the task. Click the "OK" button to complete the text task definition.

To define a symbol task, select the "New Symbol Task" from the menu. An "Edit Task" dialog will appear. Select a task from the "Task Name" combo box. To do this, click on the down arrow next to the "Task Name" control. A drop down list will appear. Choose one of the tasks from the list. A picture will appear under the "Task Symbol" field for the selected task. Enter the number of units that will represent the goal for this task by clicking in the "Goal" edit control and typing in the number of units. To enter a short description of what the picture represents, click in the "Label" edit control and type in the description. This description will be displayed on the main chart window under the picture that it describes. Click the "OK" button to complete the symbol task definition.

A newly defined task will appear at the end of the task list in the main chart window. If more tasks are defined than can fit in the main window, the new task will not be displayed. You can view the new task by scrolling to the end of the chart.

Having defined all the tasks and/or behaviors the next step is to [Make Assignments](#).

Make Assignments

Having defined the tasks and/or behaviors, the next step is to decide when they should be performed. Tasks/behaviors can be divided into two categories; those that can be scheduled and those that must be performed when the opportunity presents itself. An example of a task/behavior that can be scheduled is bed making. An example of the other type is saying "please and thank you". Both types can be placed on a chart. For each task/behavior that can be scheduled, decide on what days of the week it must be performed and put a token in the columns for those days. Tasks/behaviors that cannot be scheduled should be left blank. (Note: It is not necessary to schedule the whole week in advance. You may prefer to schedule one day at a time.) To place a token on the chart, move the cursor to the appropriate row, column location and click the left mouse button. The first token that you defined in the tokens dialog will appear on the chart. To remove it, click the middle mouse button. If you click the left mouse button twice without pressing the middle button, the second token will appear. Each click of the left mouse button will display the next token in the list. Each click of the right mouse button will display the previous token in the list.

When the list of tasks is complete and assignments have been made, the next step is to Print the Chart and hang it in a conspicuous place in the child's room. You may also want to print another copy of the chart and hang it on the refrigerator or some other central place.

Print the Chart

To print the chart, select "Chart" from the menu and choose the "Print..." option. A dialog labeled, "Printout Sizing" will appear. Choose either the "All On One Page" radio button or the "Tasks Per Page" radio button by moving the mouse pointer into the appropriate circle and clicking the left mouse button. If you choose the "All On One Page" radio button then press the "OK" button, all of the tasks defined for the current chart along with header information and column totals are printed on a single page. All task symbols and tokens are scaled appropriately. If you choose the "Tasks Per Page" radio button, you can control the number of tasks printed on a page by entering a number in the edit control next to the radio button. The more tasks you specify per page, the smaller the tasks will appear on the printed chart. As you enter a number in the edit control, a caption at the bottom of the dialog will show the number of pages required to print the chart. Keep in mind that the header information at the top of the chart requires the same amount of space as two tasks and that column totals requires the same amount of space as one task. To print a sixteen task chart all on one page using the "Tasks Per Page" radio button would require that you enter a value of nineteen in the edit control (2 for header + 16 for tasks + 1 for column totals = 19).

Evaluate/Reward Progress

Keep a crayon or marker near the chart. When the child completes a task, he/she should make a mark in the appropriate box on the chart to indicate that it is done. You may wish to set aside a few minutes each day to determine how well your child is performing his/her assignments. Look at the marks on the chart and perform any necessary inspections. Have your child accompany you and talk to the child about what is expected. Remember though, to keep your expectations in line with the child's abilities. It is very important to include the child in this activity. If you wish, you can sit down with your child at the computer, open his/her chart file and allow him/her to replace the assignment tokens with award tokens for tasks/behaviors that have been successfully completed for that day. If you find daily evaluation too time consuming, you may wish to make them less frequently, relying on the children to mark their charts as they accomplish their tasks.

File|New

Create a new StarChart file. The StarChart file may contain any number of StarCharts with the only limitation being the amount of available disk space. In the dialog box that appears when this option is selected, you specify to whom the charts will belong and the name and location of the file in which they will be stored. After you have completed the fields in the "New File" dialog and selected the "OK" button, the "New Chart" dialog will appear. It is in this dialog that you will begin to define your first StarChart. After you have specified the name of the first StarChart and selected the "OK" button, a new StarChart will be added to the StarChart file.

File|Open

Open an existing StarChart file. A dialog box will appear that allows you to select the name and location of the file you wish to open. This option can be used in the event that the desired file does not appear in the list of four most recently used files found below the "Exit" option in the File Menu. Once a file has been opened, its name will be added to the top of the most recently used file list and the last chart in the file will be presented in the main window.

File|Save

Save the current StarChart file. This menu option allows you to save any changes to the current StarChart file without closing the file.

File|Save As

This menu option allows you to save the contents of the current StarChart file to a file with a different name and different owner. By using this option, you can use the same charts for more than one person.

File|Exit

Exit the StarCharts program. If a StarChart file is open and has been modified without being saved, you will be asked if you desire to save the changes. If your answer is "yes" to the save-changes-prompt, the file will be updated with your changes. If a file is open, it will be closed and the program will terminate.

File|Recent File List

The "Recent File List" appears just below the "Exit" option in the File Menu. The list is comprised of the four most recently used files. When you select any one of the four files in the list, that file will be automatically opened, provided it exists. Anytime a file is opened, its name will be added to the top of the list.

Chart|New

The New option under the Chart menu allows you to create a new StarChart. A dialog will appear in which you will specify the name of the new chart and whether or not you want to base the new chart on an existing chart. If you are basing the new chart on an existing chart, select the "USE PREVIOUS" radio button and pick the name of the existing chart from the drop down list. If you base the new chart on an existing chart, the new chart will initially have all the same task/behavior and token definitions as the existing chart.

Tokens|Choose

This menu option will present a dialog that allows you to define or change the list of tokens being used for the current chart. As well as permitting you to define or change the list of tokens, the Tokens dialog will let you assign point or monetary value to the tokens. Tokens are little pictures that indicate an assignment or an award for a task/behavior that has been accomplished. Once the list of tokens has been selected, they can be placed on the StarChart by moving the cursor into the appropriate box and clicking the left mouse button. Each click of the left mouse button will present the next token in the list. A click of the right mouse button will present the previous token in the list. Note: Tasks must be defined for the chart before tokens can be placed on it.

Chart|Open

The Open option under the Chart menu allows you to open a StarChart. If there is already a chart open and you have changed it, you will be asked if you wish to save the changes. If you answer "Yes", the chart will be updated in the chart file; a "No" will cause the changes to be discarded. After the current chart has been closed, you will be presented with a list of the existing StarCharts in the chart file. When you choose one and click the "OK" button, the selected chart is opened and displayed and becomes the current chart.

Chart|Delete

The Delete option under the Chart menu allows you to selectively delete charts in the current file. In the dialog that appears after choosing this option, select the chart you wish to delete from the list then click the "Delete" button. You will then be asked to confirm the deletion. If your answer is "Yes" the chart will be marked as deleted and finally removed when you select the "OK" button to end the dialog. Selecting the "Cancel" button to end the dialog will undo any chart deletions.

Chart|Print

The Print option under the Chart menu allows you to print the current chart. You can either print all of the chart information on one page by selecting the "Size To Fit" option in the print dialog, or you can specify the number of tasks you want per page by selecting the "Tasks Per Page" option. For the "Tasks Per Page" option, the chart header information counts as two tasks and the column totals counts as one task.

Chart|Print All

The Print All option under the Chart menu allows you to print all of the charts in the file. The setup for this option is the same as for the Print Chart option.

Task|New Text Task

The New Text Task option under the Task menu allows you to define a task/behavior by describing it in words. This option is needed to represent tasks/behaviors for which there are no pre-defined symbols. It is especially useful for older children who can read and have capabilities that go beyond the pre-defined symbol tasks. After you select the New Text Task option from the menu, a dialog will appear. Move the cursor to the "Task Name" edit control and click the left mouse button. Type a description of the task/behavior that your child should perform. If the text you type is longer than the edit control, the text will automatically be scrolled to the left allowing you to enter more. If you need to back up to correct something, use the left arrow key. The text you enter in the "Task Name" edit control should be fairly terse, since this is the text that will show up on the chart. If you need to be more descriptive (i.e. provide instructions) move the cursor into the "Comments" edit control and type in a more lengthy description. While typing text in the "Comments" section, you must use <Ctrl><Enter> if you wish to start text on a new line. Type a number in the "Goal" edit control if you are using a point or monetary system and you want to give your child a weekly goal to aim for.

Task|New Symbol Task

The New Symbol Task option under the Task menu allows you to choose from a set of pre-defined symbols to represent the task/behavior you wish your child to perform. This option is especially useful for younger children who cannot read and have limited capabilities. After you select the New Symbol Task option from the menu, a dialog will appear. Select the name of one of the pre-defined symbols from the "Task Name" combo box. The symbol representing the selected task will be displayed in the "Task Symbol" area. You may also enter a terse description of the symbol in the edit control labeled, "Label". Both the selected symbol and the label will appear on the chart. Type a number in the "Goal" edit control if you are using a point or monetary system and you want to give your child a weekly goal to aim for.

Task|Delete

When the Delete option under the Task menu is selected a dialog will appear that allows you to selectively delete tasks from the current chart. Choose the name of the task to be deleted in the "Chart Tasks" list box, then click on the delete button. Choose the desired response to the confirmation window that will be displayed showing the task to be deleted. Repeat the above steps for all the tasks to be deleted then click the "OK" button. If you click the "Cancel" button, none of the "deleted" tasks will be removed.

Task|Reorganize

The Reorganize option under the Task menu allows you to change the order of the items in the task list for the current chart. When you choose this option from the Task menu a dialog will appear with a list box showing the current order of the tasks. To move a task, select it by clicking on it with the left mouse button. Now click on the Up button to move the task towards the beginning of the list or the Down button to move it toward the bottom of the list. Once you are satisfied with the order, click on the OK button. The new order of the tasks will be reflected in the main window. If you decide not to change the order of the tasks, simply click the Cancel button.

Notes|Show Chart

To show all the notes currently defined for the current chart, select the Show Chart option from the Notes Menu. A scrollable window will appear containing the notes for the current chart.

Notes|Show All

To show all the notes for the entire file, select the Show All option from the Notes Menu. A scrollable window will appear containing the notes for the entire file.

Notes|Print Chart

To print the notes defined for the current chart, select the Print Chart option from the Notes Menu. The notes for the current chart will be printed on the system printer. If you wish to change the system printer, go into the Window's "Control Panel" and choose the "Printers..." option. Follow the instructions in the Windows user's manual for setting up printers.

Notes|Print All

To print the notes defined for all charts in the file, select the Print All option from the Notes Menu. The notes for all of the charts in the current file will be printed on the system printer. If you wish to change the system printer, go into the Window's "Control Panel" and choose the "Printers..." option. Follow the instructions in the Windows user's manual for setting up printers.

Define Notes

In addition to daily task/behavior assignments, you may wish to write daily notes/reminders. To do this, move the cursor into the column header with the appropriate date and click the left mouse button. A dialog will appear that allows you to enter notes for that date. Click the left mouse button in the box labeled, "Notes", and begin typing. (Note: "Working with Text" in the "Notes" edit control follows the same procedures as those called out in the Microsoft Windows User's Guide.) Things to include in the notes section might be appointment times, school sports and activities times, scout meeting reminders, etc. When you are finished entering the notes, choose the "OK" button to save them. Since all of this information gets saved in the StarChart file, you will have a permanent record that can be recalled instantly. By choosing the "Notes" option from the menu, you can view or print the notes anytime.

Use Sample File to Create New File

To create a new file from a sample file, first open the sample file. Make all of the changes you desire to the sample file and then select the "Save As" option from the File Menu. Specify the new filename and owner ("Charts For:" edit control) in the "Save As" dialog then select the "OK" button.

Tokens|Single Select

When this mode is set, one token will be added or removed from the chart each time you click in a box on the chart.

Chart|Clear

This option removes all tokens and notes from the current chart.

Tokens|Row Select

When this mode is selected, the box containing the mouse cursor and all boxes to the right in the current row will be filled with the same token.

Tokens|Row Increment

When this mode is selected and you click in a box to add a token, the box containing the mouse cursor will be filled with a token, the box immediately to the right of it will be filled with the next token in the list, the box to the right of that will be filled with the next token, and so forth until all boxes to the right of the cursor have been filled.
