

# **The Graphics Factory**

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## **Introduction**

The Graphics Factory is a fascinating and useful way to create and explore patterns and graphics that can be used for hundreds of applications. Explore the infinite world of fractals or experiment with artificial life with cellular automata. Create marble backgrounds or cloud textures. Generate repeatable patterns that can be tiled. Employ modules which randomly build entire landscape pictures. Interactively control the flow of drawing or let your module run overnight to produce hundreds of patterns automatically.

The Graphics Factory can be used at two distinct levels. At one level you as the user can load existing modules and use these modules to create the images. But the second level is where the real power is. At the second level you modify or create your own modules, controlling each factory in the module by setting the numerous parameters available for each.

You can consider The Graphics Factory as a procedural drawing program. So rather than drawing each stroke of a picture, advanced algorithms are employed to do the work for you. But don't be alarmed, no programming is needed. All options, settings and parameters are set with dialog boxes.

## Features

### General Features

- Save modules to disk.
- Save individual factories to disk.
- Number of factories in a module limited only by memory.
- Save bitmap image of your current drawing area.
- Randomize factory location.
- Module drawing size up to 1024 X 768.
- All drawing performed in high quality true color graphics using 16 million colors.
- Interactive controls allow dynamic control of effects in real time.
- Debugging tracer allows viewing internal values of modules as they run.
- Hide or show factories while module is running.
- Selectable screen refresh rate to improve performance.
- Automatically reset the module at set time intervals or on set cycle intervals.
- Automatically save a sequence of bitmaps to disk on set cycle intervals.
- Option to automatically start running a module when it is loaded.
- Option to automatically show the interactive controls when a module is loaded.
- Module designer credit dialog can optionally appear when a module is loaded.
- Extensive popup hints which dynamically change when needed.

### Factory General Features

- Assign names and descriptions to individual factories.
- Selectable number of factory draws per cycle.
- Control starting, interval and ending life of factories.
- Factory control points can be repeated symmetrically, horizontally mirrored, vertically mirrored in any combination.

### Factory Color Features

- All 16 million colors available per factory.
- Seven programmable color control points to design custom color gradients for each factory.
- Selectable random variance levels for each color control point.
- Blend color for smooth gradients or set for hard edge color changes.
- Selectable interval of color range table.
- Special selected highlight color used for certain drawing effects.

### **Factory Color Point Features**

- Each factory has two independent control points used to drawing coordinates.
- Selectable minimum and maximum velocity of control points.
- Selectable minimum and maximum tethering distance to factory location.
- Selectable minimum and maximum tethering distance to other control point.
- Definable starting location to control points, in absolute position or relative to factory location.
- Selectable friction of each control to add or remove power from control point each cycle.
- Define for each control point its starting velocity.
- Select control point reaction at the edge of the draw surface. Choose from bounce, random bounce, wrap, drift, clockwise edge or counter clockwise edge.
- Powerful control point path correction feature each with programmable values.

### **Factory Magnetics Features**

- Any factory or combination of factories can generate magnetic effects.
- Selectable magnetic channel. ( Allows selecting which objects will be effected by the magnetics )
- Definable strength of magnetic pull.
- Strength can fade over distance or remain constant.
- Controllable life intervals for the magnetic pull.
- Attract to the factory location or a control point.
- Option to pull to the distance radius of the factory.
- Allow negative pull values.

- Allow pull beyond the center point.
- Option to evenly distribute the pull across the x and y axis.
- Magnetic pull can effect the location of other factory control points or effect drawing effects for other factories.

## Quick Hints

This section will give you some helpful hints to get you up and running as quick as possible.

1. Use existing modules by selecting Load Module from the File menu, and then selecting one of the files shown in the list box on the left.
2. Most modules that come with The Graphics Factory will automatically start running when loaded. You can stop the running of the module by selecting Stop from the Module menu.
3. To start or restart loaded modules select Run or Restart from the Module menu.
4. To get to the settings for a factory double click on the factory. This will bring up the Setting Dialog with six buttons to access various parameters for the factory.
5. To change the colors that an existing factory is generating go to the Settings Dialog by double clicking on the factory and then press the Color button. This will show the Color dialog. Double click on each color box to select a new color.
6. Make good use of the popup hints on all dialogs. Leave the mouse cursor over each control for a second to get a popup hint that describes what the control does.
7. Within the various factory setting dialogs any control with the aqua color background can be double clicked to bring up the Advanced Value Control dialog.

## Overview

This section is designed to give you a general understanding of how The Graphics Factory works. This understanding is important to successfully edit or create modules.

The Graphics Factory is a software application which is designed to create graphic images. The largest logical unit upon which this application operates is a module. A module can be saved and loaded to and from disk. A module contains all the information that can be configured by a user. A module can be broken down into two parts. The first are module settings. These are general settings which effect the overall operation of a module. The second part is the factories. A module can contain any number of factories. Each factory operates independently from each other.

Factories can also be saved and loaded to and from disk, but when loaded they are always part of a module. Factories are where the actual work is done. Factories have a large number of programmable settings, that can be broken down into the following areas; general settings, draw settings, color settings, control point settings and magnetic settings. You can visualize a factory as consisting of a base, this is what you see on screen as a box, and two control points. You do not directly see the two control points. The control points of a factory often move with each drawing cycle. The control points in most cases determine where drawing will occur during that cycle. For example, if a box drawing type is select for a factory, the box upper left point will be at the location of control point 1 and the lower right point will be at the location of control point 2.

A module when loaded into The Graphics Factory can either be running or idle. When idle no drawing will take place. When running each factory has an opportunity to draw each cycle. A cycle is the process in which each factory is processed one at a time and preforms one drawing operation. At the start of each cycle programmable values that are configured with advanced value control are set, otherwise they remain constant.

A factory when asked to draw will first determine its generat drawing type, such as a line, box or cicle. The color table for the factory will be accessed to get the current color to draw with. Now each pixel of the drawing type will go through the effects processor. Up to 10 levels of effects can occur before a pixel is actually plotted to screen. During this time it may be moved, replicated, blended, rotated, waved, filtered out, or any number of different effects. Once all effects have been preformed on this pixel it is plotted to the off screen bitmap and the next pixel is processed. This continues for all pixels for all factories. When all factories are processed the screen will be updated with all factory actions for that cycle. Now the next cycle can begin.

This is simplification of the process but should give you a general idea about the structure and flow of things.

## Menus

This section gives a brief overview of the menu choices.

File | New Module

Close any current module and start a new one.

File | Open Module

Load a saved module from disk.

File | Save Module

Save a currently loaded module to disk.

File | Save Module As

Save a currently loaded module to a new name.

File | Open Factory

Loads a saved factory from disk into the current module.

File | Save Factory

Save the currently highlighted factory to disk.

File | Save Image

Save a copy of the current image on the canvas to disk in 24 bit BMP format.

Factory | Add

Add a new factory to the current module.

Factory | Duplicate

Makes a copy of the currently selected factory and places it in the current module.

Factory | Change

Shows the Settings dialog for the currently selected factory.

Factory | Delete

Deletes the currently selected factory.

Module | Run

Starts the execution of the current module.

Module | Stop

Stops a currently running module.

Module | Clear

Clears the current canvas. This can be used both if the module is running or not.

Module | Restart

The same as selecting stop and then start.

Module | Randomize Locations

Randomly place each factory of the current module on the canvas.

Module | Resize Canvas

Allows changing the size of the canvas. The current image on the canvas will be lost when this is done.

Module | Interactive Controls

Show the Interactive Controls dialog.

Module | Show Trace

Show the Trace dialog.

Module | Show Factories

Show all factories that were previously hidden. Does not affect the running status of a module.

Module | Hide Factories

Hide all factories for the currently loaded module. Running status is not affected.

Module | Setting

Brings up the Module settings dialog.

Module | Credits

Brings up the Module credits dialog.

Module | Update Wallpaper

Changes your Windows wallpaper to the current canvas image.

Help | Help

Starts up this help file.

Help | Catalog

Starts up the Kamyran Software Product Catalog / Order Form.

Help | Order Form

Starts up the Kamyran Software Product Catalog / Order Form.

Help | About

Brings up the About dialog for this product.

## **Creating Your Own Modules**

Currently due to lack of documentation on creating your own modules the best approach would be to look at existing modules as examples. Experiment until you get the results you want. Be sure to read all other topics in this help file including the full feature list.

Double click on factories to bring up the factory settings dialog. Double click any control with a aqua color background to bring up an additional Advanced Value dialog ( when you want a value to change over time ).

When creating a module it is very easy to select a value within a dialog box which can cause an error. Most errors will occur while running the module. In many case when an error occurs a message box will display on screen indicating the problem, along with the factory name. At this point the factory will be disabled until the module is restart.
