

Chat Options (Personal Info tab)

Provides a space for you to type your real name. Your name is displayed in the list of users on the chat server in the **User List** dialog box.

Provides a space for you to type your nickname.

Microsoft Chat uses your nickname to identify you to other people inside a chat room.

Provides a space for you to type information about yourself.

If other people ask Microsoft Chat for your personal profile, they will see this information.

Create Chat Room dialog

Provides a space for you to describe the room's topic.

The topic description appears in the **Chat Room List** dialog box next to the room's name.

Specifies whether the room is moderated.

In a moderated chat room, only a room host and the speakers the host designates can send messages. All other room members are spectators. Only a room host can select this box.

Specifies whether anyone, or only a room host, can set the room's topic. Only a room host can select this box.

Specifies whether an invitation from the room host is required to enter the room. Only a room host can select this box.

Specifies that only people in this chat room will see the room in the **Chat Room List** dialog box. Only a room host can select this box.

Specifies whether information about who is inside the room is available to people outside the room. Only a room host can select this box.

Specifies whether the number of people allowed into the room is limited. After selecting the **Set maximum users** check box, type the greatest number of people allowed. Only a room host can select this box.

Chat Options (Comics View tab)

Specifies the number of comic strip panels to be displayed in a single row.

Chat Options (Settings tab)

Specifies whether Microsoft Chat-specific information will be sent to the people you're talking to. This feature is useful when chatting with members using text-only chat programs.

Specifies whether you want to be prompted to save a copy of your conversation whenever you close a Microsoft Chat window.

Specifies whether you want to be able to receive whispers.

Whispers are messages that only you and the person who sent the message can see.

Chat Options (Character tab)

Lists the available cartoon characters. Click a character to see what he, she, or it looks like.

Displays the cartoon character you selected from the character list, with the expression you selected by using the emotion wheel.

Adjusts the cartoon character's expression.

You can drag the large black dot around the emotion wheel to change the character's expressions.

Chat Options, Text View tab, Set Font Text dialog

Lists the available fonts.

Lists the available styles for the selected font.

Lists the available point sizes for the selected font.

Displays what the text will look like after the selected font options are applied.

Lists the available foreign-language support installed on your computer.

Chat Options (Background tab)

Lists the available cartoon backgrounds.

Click a background to see what it looks like.

Displays the selected background.

Room List dialog

Provides a space for you to type words or a portion of a word that matches all or part of the room name you are looking for in the **Room** list.

Only room titles with words that match will appear in the **Chat Room List** dialog box.

Specifies whether you also want to search the **Topic** list for the words you typed in the **Display chat rooms that contain** box.

Only rooms that have titles or topics with words that match will appear in the **Chat Room List** dialog box.

Updates the Chat Room list by asking the chat server for a current list of rooms.

Takes you to the selected room.

Creates a new chat room.

You automatically become the host of rooms you create.

Chat Connection dialog (Connection tab)

Lists the available chat rooms you've added to your Favorites list.

Provides a space for you to type the name of a chat server you want to connect to.

Specifies that you want to enter a particular chat room and provides a space for you to type its name.

Specifies that you want to see a current list of every chat room that is available on the server.

Invite dialog

Provides a space for you to type the nicknames of people you want to invite into the room.

Kick dialog

Provides a space for you to type the reason you are removing someone temporarily from the room.

Microsoft Chat displays your reason to everyone in the room. "Kicking someone out" is effective only until the person rejoins the room.

Specifies whether you also want to ban the person you are kicking out of the room.

A banned person cannot re-enter the room until you remove the ban or until the room is recreated, at which time the ban list is cleared.

Provides a space for you to select or type the identity of the person you want to ban or readmit to the chat room.

Specifies that you want to ban the person whose name appears in the **Person to ban or unban** box. Only a room host can select this box.

Specifies that you want to remove the ban from the person whose name appears in the **Person to ban or unban** box. Only a room host can select this box.

Chat Options, Settings tab

Provides a space for you to type the locations of your sound files. Microsoft Chat can send or play only sounds it finds in these folders. You can list several folders, separated by semicolons—for example, c:\windows\media; c:\windows .

Specifies whether to show the arrival and departure of people from your room.

Chat Options, Text View tab

Specifies that a blank line should appear between each message in text-only mode.

Specifies that a blank line should appear between messages that are not of the same type in text-only mode. Actions, thoughts, and whispers are examples of different message types.

Specifies that a blank line should not appear between messages in text-only mode.

Click this to change the fonts used to display messages on your computer.

Resets the fonts used to display messages to their default settings.

Specifies whether to display room host message headers with a bold font.

Specifies whether to display room host messages with a bold font.

User List

Specifies that you want to search for every person connected to the server.

Lists the nickname and identity of every person that matches the search criteria you specified.

Specifies that you want to search for every person having a nickname that contains the text you type in the **Names containing** box.

Specifies that you want to search for every person with an identity that contains the text you type in the **Names containing** box.

Invites the person you selected from the Nickname list to enter the current room you are in.

Opens the **Whisper Box**, where you can whisper to the person you selected from the Nickname list.

Whispers are messages that can be seen only by the person sending the message and the person receiving it.

Set Text Font dialog (???)--not hooked up, or if hooked up, not exactly this text??)

Specifies whether a line is drawn through the selected font.

Specifies whether the selected font is underlined.

Lists the available colors for the selected font.

Shows how the different message and header types will look.

Lists the available message and header types.

Play Sound dialog

Lists the available sound files.

Provides a space for you to type a message that will be sent with the selected sound.

Plays the selected sound.

Chat Options, Settings tab

Specifies whether you want to be able to receive invitations to join other chat rooms.

Chat Options, Auto tab

Specifies that you do not want to automatically send greetings to people as they enter the room.

Specifies that you want to automatically send a whispered greeting to individuals as they enter the room. Type the message you want whispered in the text box.

Specifies that you want to automatically send a greeting as people enter the room. Type the message you want sent in the text box. Everyone in the room will see the greeting.

Provides a space for you to type a message that will automatically be sent to people as they enter the room. You can use variables for the name and room as indicated in the sample text.

Lists the available key combinations you can use to run a macro. Select a key combination, and then type the message you want to associate with it in the text box.

Provides a space for you to type a message you want sent whenever you press the key combination associated with it.

Provides a space for you to type a name for a macro you create. A macro consists of a message you type plus the key combination associated with it.

Saves the macro identified in the **Name** box. You must add the macro before you can use it.

Deletes the macro identified in the **Name** box. You need to select the macro in the **Key combination** box before deleting it.

Chat Options, Personal Info tab

Provides a space for you to type your e-mail address. The e-mail address must be in the format name@company—for example, someone@microsoft.com.

If other members want to send you e-mail, Microsoft Chat provides this e-mail address.

Provides a space for you to type the URL (address) for your World Wide Web home page.
If other members want to view your Web page, Microsoft Chat provides this URL.

Chat Options, Settings tab

Specifies whether to display the identity of each of the members when they enter the chat room (Text View only).

Specifies whether to play sounds sent by other members.

Specifies whether you want to be notified of incoming Microsoft NetMeeting calls. If you clear this check box, your computer ignores other members' attempts to place a NetMeeting call to you.

Room List

Specifies that you want to display only rooms that are registered.

Rooms are usually registered by the administrator of the chat server or the Internet service provider.

Administrators can choose not to register rooms that might contain objectionable or offensive names or topics.

By displaying only registered rooms, you might avoid objectionable or offensive chat rooms.

Provides a space for you to type the smallest chat room you want to display in the Chat Room list.

Provides a space for you to type the largest chat room you want to display in the Chat Room list.

Provides a space for you to type the name of the room you want to create.

Provides a space for you to type a password that others must use to access this chat room. The password is case-sensitive, so members must type the password with the same characters and the same case as you have typed them.

Specifies whether you want to be notified when someone attempts to send you a file. If you do, Microsoft Chat will ask you whether you want to receive the file and where you want to store it on your computer. If you clear this check box, your computer ignores other members' attempts to send you files.

Specifies whether rich text formatting (for example, color, bold, and italic) in a sent message is displayed in Comics view. If this box is selected and the message sent to you has been formatted, it will be displayed as such. Otherwise, all messages in Comics view are displayed in a uniform format.

Specifies that you want Chat to automatically ignore a person who sends a flood of messages (multiple lines of text sent in rapid succession). You define exactly what constitutes a flood by setting **Message Count** and **Interval**.

Specifies the number of messages that constitute a flood.


Specifies the interval in seconds at which the number of messages specified above must be sent to constitute flooding.

Connects you to the same chat room as the person whose nickname you have selected.

Displays a message published by the chat server you are connecting to. The message typically contains information about server status and other news.

Specifies that you want to display the Message of the Day from the chat server each time you connect to the server.

Specifies whether you want the speaker's name on one line and the message on the next. If you clear the check box, the speaker's name appears on the same line as the message.

Help is available for each item in this group. Click  at the top of the dialog box, and then click the specific item you want information about.

Provides a space for you to type a message that is sent to all of the rooms you are in, indicating that you are away. Your icon in the list of members changes to a teacup.

Provides a way to help you control the types of content that your computer can access on the Internet.

Click this to turn Content Advisor on and off.

Specifies whether your name appears in the list of all the users on the server.

New buttons or text boxes in Chat 2.5

Specifies whether a character not currently on your computer is automatically downloaded to it.

Note: The character must be created for Microsoft Chat version 2.5. If the user has a character that was created for an earlier version of Chat, it will not be downloaded.

Specifies whether a background not currently on your computer is automatically downloaded to it.

Note: The background must be created for Microsoft Chat version 2.5. If the user has a background created for an earlier version of Chat, it will not be downloaded.

Specifies whether you want to appear in other people's user lists. If you clear this option, your name will appear in your user list, but others will not see you in their user lists.

Brings up the directory listing, so you can choose to add a directory to the sound search path.

Opens the Windows folder specified in the path so that you can go to the folder that contains the sounds you want.

Displays the copyright information for the selected character or background.

Lists the members in the selected room. If the room is a private room, then none of the members will be listed.

Specifies that you want to connect to the server without joining a room.

Provides a space to type the nickname or identity text that you want to search for. Click **Nickname** or **Identity** to allow the entry of search text in this box.

Specifies that you want to search for all the members of the room entered in the **Room** box.

Provides a space to type the name of a specific room, all of whose users you want to search for. Click **Room** to allow text entry in this box.

Provides a space to type a sound file name (or a portion of it) that you want to search for in the list. Only the sounds that start with the letters in this text box will appear in the list below.

Chat Options, Servers tab

Specifies the name of the chat network that you want to create or modify. The user can select a network from the drop-down list or add a network to the list by typing its name in the box. You can add servers to the network by entering them in the **Servers** text box.

Specifies the names of the servers that comprise the selected network and whose settings you may want to modify. You can add a new server to the selected network by entering its name here and clicking **Add**.

Specifies the port number for the server selected in the **Servers** list. Most chat servers use port 6667 by default. If you cannot connect to the server, it could be for one of several reasons: The server may be down, the server may use a different port, or a firewall may not allow you to connect to the port number of the chat server. If you cannot connect to the chat server, you should contact your network administrator.

Removes the selected network from the network list.

Adds the network you typed in the **Network** box to the network list.

Adds the server you type in the **Server** box to the network displayed in the **Network** box.

Removes the selected server from the network displayed in the **Network** box.

Specifies that the user will log on anonymously to the selected server if possible. For some servers, you may be required to enter the user's name and password in a separate dialog box.

Specifies that the user must connect to the selected server with a username and password, which must be obtained from the server administrator. Most chat servers do not require a password and username.

Provides a place to type the username that the selected server will require.

Provides a place to type the password that the selected server will require.

Specifies whether Microsoft Chat remembers the password for you the next time you connect to the server.

Automation, Logon Notifications tab

Provides a place to type part or all of the nickname of the user whose presence on the selected server you want to be notified of. To see a user's logon information, on the **Member** menu, click **Get Identity**. The nickname is given first: "<Nickname>"s identity: <Username>@<netaddress>

Provides a place to type part or all of the user name of the user whose presence on the selected server you want to be notified of. To see a user's logon information, on the **Member** menu, click **Get Identity**. The username immediately precedes the @ symbol in the logon information: "**<Nickname>**"**s identity:**
<Username>@<netaddress>

Provides a place to type part or all of the net address of the user whose presence on the selected server you want to be notified of. The net address can be either an Internet service provider or an IP address from which the user connects. To see a user's logon information, on the **Member** menu, click **Get Identity**. The net address immediately follows the @ symbol: "<Nickname>"s identity: <Username>@<netaddress>

Specifies which server or network both you and the specified user need to be on at the same time for you to receive notification of the user's presence on the network. You can select from the list or type the name of a server or network.

Adds the notification definition to the list. At least one of the user identity fields must be something other than Any.

Modifies the selected current notification according to the changes you have made in the user identity.

Deletes the selected current notification.

Automation, Rule Sets tab

Saves the current changes without closing the dialog box.

Lists all active and inactive rule sets. Rule sets are used to group rules, allowing you to activate or deactivate a group of rules at once. For example, you can use one rule set for one room and another for another room. Click to check a rule set and make it active.

Click to rename the selected rule set.

Click to delete the selected rule set.

Click to move the selected rule set upward in the list. Rule sets are performed according to their order in the **Current Rule Sets** list.

Click to move the selected rule set downward in the list. Rule sets are performed according to their order in the **Current Rule Sets** list.

Click to save the selected rule set on your computer in a rule set file with a .crs extension.

Click to locate a rule set file and add it to the current list of rule sets.

Automation, Rules tab

Lists all the inactive and active rule sets.

Lists all the inactive and active rules in the selected rule set. Click to check the box next to a rule to activate it.

Specifies the number of times that a rule in general can be performed within the time you set.

Opens the **Edit Rule** dialog box, where you can define a rule to add to the selected rule set.

Opens the **Edit Rule** dialog box, where you can edit the selected rule.

Deletes the selected rule.

Duplicates the selected rule and adds it to the selected rule set.

Opens the **Add to Rule Sets** dialog box, where you can add the selected rule to one of your other rule sets.

Click to move the selected rule upward in the list. Rules are performed according to their list order in the **Rules of selected set**.

Click to move the selected rule downward in the list. Rules are performed according to their list order in the **Rules of selected set**.

Automation, Rules tab, Advanced Rules Settings

Specifies the number of times any rule will be performed within the time interval specified before it stops.

Specifies the length of the interval within which a rule can be performed the specified number of times before it stops.

Automation, Rules tab, Edit Rule dialog box

See the **Description** at the bottom of the **Edit Rule** dialog box for how to define a rule. For more information, refer to “Rules Reference” in the Help Topics.

See the **Description** at the bottom of the **Edit Rule** dialog box for a description of each parameter when you click it. For syntax information, refer to “Rules Reference” in the Help Topics.

Specifies the number of seconds that elapse between the event and its specified action.

Specifies that rules and rule sets subsequent to this action in the rules and rule sets lists will not be performed. Should this event occur again, the specified action will be performed, but the processing of rules stops with this one.

Specifies whether an event involving a message must match the message parameter typed in the **Message** box in case (uppercase and lowercase) or in whole words to trigger the event.

Select one or more rule sets to which you want to add the rule above.

Allows you to specify a user whose presence on the network you want to be notified of.

Opens the Whisper Box , in which you can “whisper” to the selected person.

Invites the person you selected from the notification list.

Connects you to the same chat room as the person whose nickname you have selected.

Updates the logon notifications list.

Clears the logon notifications list.

Introducing Microsoft Chat

Microsoft Chat is the only Internet chat program that gives you the option of conversing inside a comic strip. As with a standard chat program, you can enter a chat room on an Internet server and conduct real-time conversations with other people. But with Microsoft Chat, you can also pick a cartoon character to represent you, in which case your conversation appears as word balloons inside the frames of a comic strip. As a cartoon character, you can express a wide range of emotions, send "thoughts," whisper to a single recipient, and save the chat session for offline viewing.

You can also use Microsoft Chat to:

- Send hyperlinks—for e-mail addresses, Web pages, FTP sites, and newsgroups—in your conversation.
- Send and receive requests to play sounds.
- Send and receive files.
- Use another program, such as Microsoft NetMeeting, to communicate using video and audio outside the chat room with a chat room member, while also conversing in the chat room with them.
- Save or print your chat conversation for publication or offline viewing.
- Filter which chat rooms are displayed on your computer by size, content, or ratings.
- Host your own chat rooms, and control access, size, and content.
- Create rules that automate Chat's response to certain events.

Getting started with Microsoft Chat

Microsoft Chat provides a place for you to talk with other people on the Internet, using either text or cartoon characters to convey your thoughts. To get started, you must have an Internet connection, which links you to a computer (that is, a server) that contains chat rooms. You follow these basic steps to enter into a chat:

- Log onto a chat server.
- Select the room you want to go to on that server.
- Start typing a chat message.

To provide information about yourself

- 1 On the **View** menu, click **Options**.
- 2 In the **Nickname** box, type a name you'd like to be known by.
- 3 In the **Brief description of yourself** box, type something that you'd like other people to know about you.
This information appears when other people request your profile.

To choose a character

- 1 Make sure you are in comics mode. (On the **View** menu, **Comic Strip** must be marked.)
- 2 On the **View** menu, click **Options**, and then click the **Character** tab.
- 3 In the Character list, click the character you want. Your character appears in the Preview area.

- To see your character show different emotions, drag the black dot in the center of the emotion wheel to different positions.

To choose a comic background

- 1 Make sure you are in comics mode. (On the **View** menu, **Comic Strip** must be marked.)
- 2 On the **View** menu, click **Options**, and then click the **Background** tab.
- 3 In the Background list, click the background you want. The background you select appears in the Preview area.

To connect to a chat server

- 1 Establish a connection to the Internet via your modem or a local area network.
- 2 On the **Start** menu, point to **Programs**, point to **Internet Explorer**, and then click **Microsoft Chat**.
- 3 In the **Chat Connection** dialog box, type or select the name of the chat server or chat network in the **Server** box.
- 4 Choose the way you want to connect to the server:
 - To go directly to a chat room, click **Go to chat room**, and type the name of the chat room.
 - To select from a list of rooms on the server, click **Show all available chat rooms**.
 - To connect to a server but join a room later, click **Just connect to server**.

If this is the first time you are using Chat, you should indicate your personal information, your character choice, and a comic background on the other tabs in the **Chat Connection** dialog box. For more information, click **Related Topics** below.

- If Microsoft Chat is already open, you can click the **Room** menu and then click **Connect** to connect to a chat server.

To change the comic strip font

- 1 Make sure you are in comics mode. (On the **View** menu, **Comic Strip** must be marked.)
- 2 On the **View** menu, click **Options**.
- 3 On the **Comics View** tab, click **Change Font**.
- 4 Click the font and other settings that you want.

To format message text

► In your message, select the text you want to format, and then use one or more of the commands on the

Format menu to add these effects:

- **Color** (choose from the palette)
- **Bold**
- *Italic*
- Underline
- Fixed pitch font
- Symbol font (Σψμβολ. φοντ)

To display rich text on your computer

- 1 Make sure you are in comics mode. (On the **View** menu, **Comic Strip** must be marked.)
- 2 On the **View** menu, click **Options**.
- 3 On the **Comics View** tab, select the **Show rich text formatting** check box.

Notes

- Earlier versions of Microsoft Chat cannot display rich text.
- If the **Show rich text formatting** check box is clear, you can still send formatted text, but you will not see it in your own comic strip.

To chat using text only

- 1 On the **View** menu, click **Plain Text**.
- 2 In the text box at the bottom of the window, type what you want to say, and then click one of the buttons to the right of the text box or press ENTER.

If you click this **Your message appears with your nickname, followed by**



Say The word "says" and your message.



Think The word "thinks" and your message.



Whisper The words "whispers to" and the other person's nickname and your message. The message is sent only to people you have selected in the list of members.



Action Your message displayed in italics.

Play Sound Your message and the name of the sound file. Other chat members must have that sound file on their computers in order to hear it.

To change fonts used in text-only conversations

- 2 On the **Text View** tab, click **Change Font**.

Finding a chat room to join

You can find chat rooms to join on a chat server by looking through the room list for a chat room or by typing the name of a specific chat room. You can even look for a specific person on the server and join them in the room they are in. And when you find a chat room you'd like to return to, you can add it to your Favorites list.

If you don't find anything you like on your current chat server, you can disconnect from it and connect to a different chat server to check out its chat rooms. Or, depending on the chat server, you may be able to start and host your own chat room.

The following are strategies for finding a chat room:

To enter a chat room

- 1 On the **File** menu, click **New Connection**.
- 2 In the **Server** box, type or select the name of the server that contains the chat room you want to enter (for example, **mschat.msn.com**).
- 3 If you know the name of the chat room you want to go to, click **Go to chat room**, and then type the name of the chat room you want to enter. If you type the name of a chat room that does not exist, Microsoft Chat creates a new chat room with that name.

If you want to pick a chat room from the room list, click **Show all available chat rooms**. You may be able to screen out chat rooms that contain inappropriate or offensive names or topics by selecting the **Show only registered rooms** check box. The Internet service provider or system administrator registers the rooms, so whether inappropriate material slips through depends on how closely they monitor names and topics.

Tips

- To find a specific chat room by room name, type a word or a portion of a word in the **Display chat rooms that contain** box, attempting to match all or part of the room name you are looking for. If you also want to search chat room topics, select the **Also search in room topics** check box.
- You can be in more than one chat room at a time as long as the chat rooms are on the same chat server. If you want to participate in a second chat on a different server, you must open another instance of Microsoft Chat.

Hosting your own chat room

If you cannot find a chat room that's just right for you, it's easy to create and host your own. When you host your own chat room, you can decide the topic, control access, and limit the number of members in the chat room. You can even kick out or ban members who are disruptive or offensive.

- You can use the special text %Nickname% and %Room% to personalize your greeting. Microsoft Chat substitutes the person's nickname wherever it finds %Nickname% and your room's name wherever it finds %Room%.

- **Whisper** Inside a word balloon surrounded by a dotted line. The message is sent only to people you've selected in the list of members.
-  **Action** Inside a box across the top of the comic-strip pane. Your message begins with your nickname.
- **Play Sound** Inside a box across the top of the comic-strip pane. It begins with your nickname, followed by your message and the name of the sound file. Other chat members must have that sound file on their computers in order to hear it.

- If you select someone in the list of members before sending a message, Microsoft Chat poses your character to appear to be talking directly to the other character.

Sending and receiving sounds with Chat

You may want to use sound to accent the messages you send. You cannot actually send a sound file, but rather a request to play a sound file, specifically .wav or .mid files, located on the recipient's computer. Conversely, if someone wants to include a sound with their message to you, the sound file must already be located on your computer.

When Windows was installed on your computer, several sound files were also installed. Most Microsoft Chat users will have a similar set of files on their computers also. When you send or receive a request for a sound, Chat is limited to the .wav or .mid files in the folder you have specified.

- Drag the black dot in the center of the emotion wheel around the wheel. The closer to the edge of the wheel you move the dot, the stronger the emotion.

You can choose eight different emotions for your character:

Bored	Scared
Sad	Coy

The pane above the emotion wheel displays your character's current emotion.

Tip

- Not all characters can display the full range of emotions.
- You can also press the TAB key to get to the emotion wheel, and then use the four arrow keys to move the black dot around the wheel.

Freezing an emotion is useful if you want to lock one of several neutral expressions (if your character has more than one), or avoid the default expressions associated with various grammatical structures (click [Related Topics](#)).

Creating rules

You can determine Chat's responses to various events by establishing rules. For example, when a friend joins a chat room, you can make certain things happen—have a sound played on your computer or send your friend a whisper, for example. In fact, you can set up a sequence of rules that follow one another. In this way, you can customize the way that Chat works for you.

To start creating rules, you must first create a rule set, and then you create rules to put in the set:

- 2 On the **Rule Sets** tab or the **Rules** tab, select the box beside the rule sets or rules that you want to activate.
If a rule or rule set is not activated, it will not be processed. The sequence will proceed, ignoring rule sets and rules whose check boxes are cleared.

You can share rule sets with other people by saving them and importing them.

- 4 In **Network or server**, select a server from the list or type in the name of your server or network.
If you are logged onto this server, you will be notified of the person logging onto this server or network.
- 5 Click **Add** to add this person to your notifications list.

- If you clear the check box in the list, you will not be notified when that person logs on.
- To get someone's identity, right-click the person's name in a chat room's user list, and then click **Get Identity**.

If you have been unable to connect using the default port, contact the system operator for the number of an alternative port to use here. (If you still cannot connect, you may be behind a firewall that does not support using this port. Contact your system administrator for more information.)

4 Also in Advanced settings, specify the password or security package required by the chat server.

Most servers allow you to connect without a password or security package. If your chat server requires either of these, contact the chat server's administrator to get them.

To connect to a chat network efficiently

- 1 On the **View** menu, click **Options**.
- 2 On the **Servers** tab, type the name of the network you want to define.
- 3 Click **Add Network** to add it to the drop-down list.
- 4 Type the name of the server you want to add, and click **Add**. Repeat for all the servers you want to include in this network.

This network will now appear in the **Server** list in the **Chat Connection** dialog box. When selected there, an attempt will be made to connect to each of the servers in this network, and you will log on to the first one available.

To stop the playing of a long sound

- Play a short sound by clicking the **Play Sound** button at the bottom of the Microsoft Chat window and selecting a short sound.

To use an IRC command

- Type the IRC command in the text entry box preceded by a forward slash.

Microsoft Chat now supports all IRC commands that experienced chatters use with other chat clients. You do not need to use these commands in Microsoft Chat because we provide most of the same functionality through our user interface. However, if you are familiar with IRC commands and want to use them, we have listed the ones Microsoft Chat currently supports in the IRC Command Reference. IRC Command Reference

Most of the IRC commands you can use in Microsoft Chat are described below. There are three types of IRC commands: those defined by the "RFC 1459" standard, those defined by the extension to the "RFC 1459" called IRCX, and those that are specific to a chat client. If you are not sure about a command's syntax, type the command name in the message window and the error message will provide you with its parameters.

In the table below, certain symbols are not part of the syntax, but signal to you the type of information you need to enter: the bar (|) signifies *or*, angle brackets (< >) signify the nature of the information you must enter, square brackets ([]) signify an optional part of the syntax, and curly brackets ({ }) signify that the entry can be multiple. For example, if the syntax is given as **/Msg <Nickname|room_name>{,< Nickname|room_name >}<message>**, you might enter **/Msg SusanB,JoeC How are you?**

IRCX commands work only on servers that support the extensions. You can find out if the server supports IRCX by typing the command /IRCX. Some of the IRC commands with this extension will have extra parameters, especially the /mode command has additional modes, supported only on IRCX servers.

To do repetitive tasks easily

For repetitive tasks, you can send a whisper to yourself and thereby trigger a rule with its resulting action. For example, a disabled person may regularly want to send a message to everybody in their room without typing it every time. By creating a macro that sends a whisper to yourself, you can trigger a rule that then results in the message being sent.

- 1 Define a macro with the message: **/msg %Nickname% event1**
- 2 Create a rule where the event is "A user in your room sends a whisper to you," the Nickname parameter for the event is %Me%, the Room parameter is %AnyOfMyRooms%, and the Message parameter is event1.
- 3 Choose any repetitive action you want to trigger (for example, "Send a message to a room"), and define its parameters (for example, %EventRoom% and the text of the message you want to easily send.)
- 4 To do this task, select your name in the room's list of members, and press the key combination you specified for the macro.

The result will be the action you specified above.

Specifying a nickname for events

In the Nickname field, you can specify the identity of the user who activates this event. Here's the format you can use for the user's identity: *nickname!username@netaddress*. The user chooses their own *nickname* (though but they can change it after they log on); the user logs onto the chat server using their *username*, which doesn't change while they are logged on, and user logs on from the *netaddress*, which can be either an IP address or a DNS name.

- Nickname can be the exact nickname, or you can use wild cards in it (see below). Not case-sensitive.
- Username can be the exact username, or you can use wild cards in it (see below). Not case-sensitive.
- Netaddress can be the exact DNS name or TCP/IP address, or you can use wildcards in it (see below). Not case-sensitive.

Using wild cards

Using constants

To see the constants available for an event, click on the drop-down list. You can use any of these constants in the Nickname field with the results below (assuming the other parameters for the event are matched).

- **%AnyoneButMe%**: The event will be triggered for all users except yourself.
- **%AnyOne%**: The event will be triggered for all users including yourself.
- **%Me%**: The event will be triggered only by yourself.

Specifying a room for events

In the Room field, you can specify the room name for the selected event.

The room name has to be exact; you cannot use any wild cards in the definition of this parameter and event, with the exception of the event "A new room is created" (see below for details). This field is not case-sensitive.

Using constants

To see the constants available for an event, click on the drop-down list. You can use any of these constants in the Room field with the results below (assuming the other parameters for the event are matched).

- **%AnyOfMyRooms%**: The event will be triggered in all the rooms that you are in.
- **%MyActivatedRoom%**: The event will be triggered only in the room whose window has the focus.
- **%MyInactivatedRooms%**: The event will be triggered in all the rooms that you are not active. A room is considered active if the window for the room has the focus.

Exceptions: The event "A new room is created"

Only for this event can you use wild cards (* and ?) in the room name. Depending on the server, the room name for this event might be case-sensitive.

Within 15 seconds of the first time you log on to the server or define the rule, Microsoft Chat will check to see if there is a match for the room or rooms defined in the room entry box on the network. MS Chat will check again every 2.5 minutes after that. You will not be notified immediately of the creation of the room, only when MS Chat checks the server to see if there is a new room created. If the query returns multiple rooms, the event will trigger multiple actions.

Note

- It is possible that the room that matches the entry in the Room field was created and removed (or removed and recreated) between the times that MS Chat checked the server for room names. You will not be notified about these changes on the server.

Specifying a network or server for events

In the Network field, you can specify the name of the network or server that the user connects to or disconnects from depending on which event has been chosen. This event will be triggered only if you and the user specified in the Nickname field are on the same network at the same time. The network name has to be the exact network name specified in the Connect dialog box. You cannot use any wild cards in defining this parameter.

A Network name field example

irc.msn.com	The event will be triggered only if the server name is <i>irc.msn.com</i> and the rest of the parameters are met.

Using constants

To see the constants available for an event, click on the drop-down list. You can use any of these constants in the Network field with the results below (assuming the other parameters for the event are matched).

- **%Any%**: The event will be triggered when the user connects to or disconnects from any network that you are on at the same time.

Specifying a message for events

In the Message field, you can specify the message that will trigger the event.

The **Advanced** button will appear only when the message field is available. The user can choose to match the case for the whole message or for the whole word or sentence only.

Using constants

To see the constants available for an event, click on the drop-down list. You can use any of these constants in the Message field with the results below (assuming the other parameters for the event are matched).

- **%Any%**: The event will be triggered when any message is sent.

Rule set name

Enter the name of the rule set you want to activate or deactivate, or select it from the drop-down list, which includes all the rule sets you have created. The name you enter does not need to be a rule set you created.

Activate

Select **Yes** to indicate you want to activate the specified rule set, or select **No** to deactivate it.

Nickname

Enter the nickname you want, or select **%EventNickname%** from the list. **%EventNickname%** will be replaced by the nickname of the user who triggered the event.

In a few cases, you'll have the option of selecting **%EventRecipients%**. If you select it, **%EventRecipients%** will be replaced by everyone in the room except yourself and the person who triggered the event.

Network

Enter the network or server name you want, or select it from the list. If you enter **%EventServer%**, you will be connected to the server you were disconnected from.

Message

Specify the message you want. It can include constants if the event that triggered the rule has these constants. Sample message: "Hi, %EventNickname!" The nickname of the user replaces **%EventNickname%** and is displayed in the message box. You can use rich-text formatting in the message.

Macro

Select the name of the macro you want from the list, or enter another macro name. To define a macro, on the **View** menu click **Automation**, and specify your macro.

Highlight format type

Select from four types of highlight formats. Define the format types in the **Set Font** dialog box when you are in text mode.

Room

Enter the exact room name, or select from the list. The items in the list can change depending on the selected action and event. Constants possibly available: **%EventRoom%** (name of the room that triggered the event) and **%MyActivatedRoom%** (name of the room that has the focus).

Reason

Enter your reason for kicking the user out of the room. The whole room will see the message, as well as the user getting kicked. If the event that triggered the rule has constants, you can include them in your reason. For example, "%EventNickname% used a word that is not allowed in %EventRoom%.

Number of beeps

Enter the number of beeps. Only whole numbers are acceptable.

Sound file name

Enter the name of the sound file you want, or select one from the list.

Text file name

Enter the name of the text file you want the lines of text to come from, or select one from the list. The list will show any text files that are in the same directory as Microsoft Chat and any of its subdirectories.

Line number

Enter the line number of the text you want to send, or choose the constants %All% and %Random% from the list. %Random% sends a random line to the room; %All% sends the whole text file.

To enter a range of lines, type **1-4**, for example, to send lines 1 through 4. To send a combination of single lines, separate the line numbers with commas: **1,5,8** sends lines 1, 5, and 8. Combine a range of lines and single lines like this: **1,4-7,11** sends lines 1, 4, 5, 6, 7, and 11. If the line you specify is empty, the line will not be sent.

To define the size of the comic strip

- 1 Make sure you are in comics mode. (On the **View** menu, **Comic Strip** must be marked.)
- 2 On the **View** menu, click **Options**.
- 3 Click the **Comics View** tab.
- 4 In the **Page layout** list, click the number of comic strip panels you want to display across the window.

Customizing Microsoft Windows, Windows NT, and Windows 95

There are many ways you can customize your operating system to make your computer more accessible.

- Beginning with Windows 95, accessibility features are built in to Windows and Windows NT. These features are useful for individuals who have difficulty typing or using a mouse, have moderately impaired vision, or who are deaf or hard-of-hearing. The features can be installed during setup, or you can add them later from your Windows 95 installation disks. Look up "accessibility" in the Windows Help Index for information about installing and using these features.
 - You can also use Control Panel and other built-in features to adjust the appearance and behavior of Windows or Windows NT to suit varying vision and motor abilities. These include adjusting colors and sizes, sound volume, and the behavior of the mouse and keyboard.
 - Many of the features that make Windows 95 more accessible can be added to Windows NT, earlier versions of Microsoft Windows, and MS-DOS, through Access Packs. You can download these files by modem or you can order them on disks from Microsoft.
 - Dvorak keyboard layouts make the most frequently typed characters on a keyboard more accessible if you have difficulty using the standard QWERTY layout. There are three Dvorak layouts: one if you are a two-handed user, one if you type with your left hand only, and one if you type with your right hand only. You do not need to purchase any special equipment to use these features.
- The specific features available, and whether they are built-in or must be obtained separately, depend on which operating system you are using.

For full documentation on the accessibility features available in the operating system you are using, obtain the appropriate application notes listed below. Accessibility features are also documented in the *Microsoft Windows 95 Resource Kit* and the *Microsoft Windows NT Resource Kit*.

- Programs that describe information on the screen in Braille or synthesized speech for people who are blind or have difficulty reading.
- Hardware and software utilities that modify the behavior of the mouse and keyboard.
- Programs that enable users to "type" using a mouse or their voice.
- Word or phrase prediction software that allows one to type more quickly and with fewer keystrokes.
- Alternate input devices, such as single switch or puff-and-sip devices, for those who cannot use a mouse or a keyboard.
