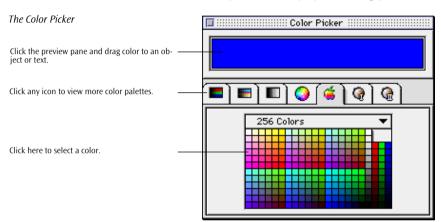
Chapter 9 The Color Picker

This chapter introduces GoLive CyberStudio's Color Picker—the tool you use to add color to your Web pages.

General

The *Color Picker* lets you quickly color text and objects. It does not limit your creativity by restricting you to a basic spectrum of colors.



Coloring Text and Objects

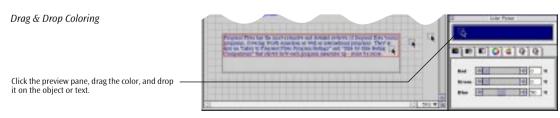
The Color Picker supports drag & drop coloring.



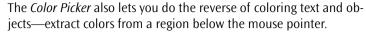
To color a text or an object, proceed as follows:

- **1** Select a color from the tab of your choice. The selected color appears in the preview pane.
- **2** Drag the color from the preview pane of the *Color Picker* and drop it onto the text or object.

The following screenshot illustrates the process of drag & drop coloring.



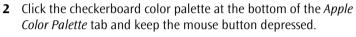
Extracting Text and Object Color



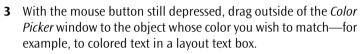
This is useful when you want to match the colors of two objects.

To extract a color from a region on screen, proceed as follows:





The cursor turns into a pipette while on top of the *Apple Color* Palette.



Make sure the preview pane at the top of the *Color Picker* shows the color you want.

- 4 Release the mouse button. The color of the spot below the mouse pointer becomes the current color and appears in the preview pane of the Color Picker window.
- 5 Drag the new color from the preview pane and drop it on the object whose color you want to change so that it matches the first object.



Color Palettes

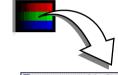
GoLive CyberStudio's *Color Picker* supports a variety of different color spaces.

You can choose colors from the following palettes, arranged on seven specific tabs.

The RGB Tab

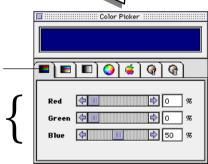
Clicking the RGB tab rider opens the *RGB* tab, which contains three slider controls that let you adjust the percentage of the red, green, and blue portions of the spectrum.

The RGB Tab of the Color Picker



Click this tab to view RGB color options.

Use these sliders to control RGB color.



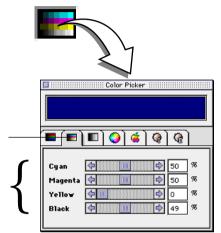
To select a color, click any slider control and drag until you have the percentage you want.

Repeat this adjustment with the two remaining sliders until the color you want is displayed in the preview pane.

The CMYK Tab

Clicking the CMYK tab rider opens the CMYK tab, which contains four slider controls that let you adjust the percentage of the cyan, magenta, yellow, and black portions of the spectrum.

The CMYK Tab of the Color Picker



Click this tab to view CMYK color options.

Use these sliders to control CMYK color.

Drag each slider until the desired color appears in the preview pane.

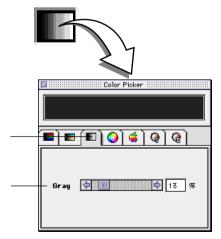
The Grayscale Tab

Clicking the Grayscale tab rider opens the Grayscale tab, which contains a single slider control that lets you adjust the percentage of black to create shades of gray.

The Grayscale Tab of the Color Picker

Click this tab to view grayscale options.

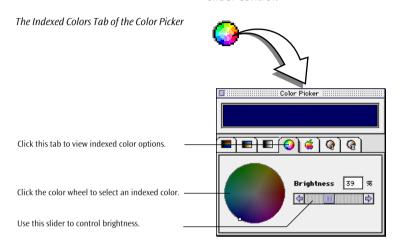
Use this slider to control grayscale.



Drag the slider to obtain the desired shade of gray.

The Indexed Colors Tab

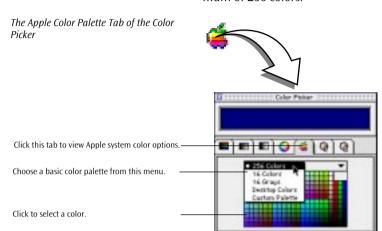
Clicking the Indexed Colors tab rider opens the *Indexed Colors* tab, which contains a color wheel that lets you access the entire color spectrum currently supported by your video hardware, plus a brightness slider control.



To select a color, click a location in the color wheel, then adjust brightness as needed.

The Apple Color Palette Tab

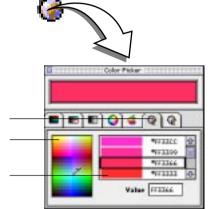
Clicking the Apple Color Palette tab rider opens the Apple Color Palette tab, which contains various fixed system palettes up to a maximum of 256 colors.



The Web Safe Colors Tab

Clicking the Web I tab rider opens the *Web Safe Colors* tab, which contains a palette of the 216 no-dither browser-safe colors.

Click this tab to view Web Colors options.

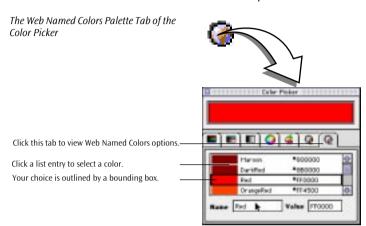
Click a swatch to select a color.

View your choice here.

To select a color, scroll through the list box at the bottom of the window and click the color of your choice. The *Value* text box shows the Red, Green, and Blue, decimal, and hexadecimal value sent to the Web browser.

The Web Named Colors Tab

Clicking the Web II tab rider opens the Web Named Colors tab, which contains a palette of browser-callable colors.



To select a color, scroll through the list box at the bottom of the window and click the color of your choice. The Name and Value text boxes show the clear-text name and the HTML control code sent to the Web browser.
