Treatment #1

Is there ever! Your computer, the 7600/132, is just about the best computer to upgrade at this time. You have a removable daughtercard with a 132 MHz 604e PowerPC processor, which can be replaced with nearly any type of modern processor you want; even a 400 MHz G3! For round \$399, you can buy a 233 MHz G3 processor card from Sonnet at http://www.sonnettech.com/. Place this into your computer and you'll have approximately twice as much speed as you've got now!

Another way to increase performance of your sound recording software is to

buy more RAM and a faster hard drive (though you may also need to buy a fast SCSI card as well). Buying RAM is easy as pie — just go to any Macintosh vendor and tell them what type of computer you have. However, you might need some help trying to find the fastest hard drive possible. Right now, the best kind of drive to buy is an LVD (Ultra SCSI-2), but those are very expensive. For you, I might recommend a regular SCSI-2 hard drive with at least 7200 RPM and 10ms seek time. Good luck!

I have some bad new for you, Toby. The only way to get PCI slots on your powerbook is to buy a PCI expansion chassis from a company like Magma.

nfortunately, these things run really expensive. The cheapest that I have seen one for is \$799... On the upside however, they work really well and the chassis includes extra space for internal hard drives, which will cut the price off a hard drive by about \$50.

However, for \$799, you could probably outfit yourself with an older 604e. Really, to get Voodoo2 (normally), you need a desktop machine, preferably a G3 minitower. Good luck.

Bandage #3

ell, Jamie, this is one of the most confusing subjects for anyone faced with a computer purchase. However, this dilemma has been eased for Mac users: Apple is currently selling only G3 machines, and comparisons among them can be made fairly well. When you look to figure out the relative speed of a computer, there are two variables: clock speed and processor type. The clock speed, simply put, is the megahertz measurement.

The processor type is the, well, processor type. The PowerPC chip that drives your Macintosh could be one of several types: 601, 603, 603e, 604, 604e, or G3. The 601, 603, and 603e's all have proportional clock speeds. A 604 or 604e at the same clock speed as one of the previous chips runs about 30% faster. Finally a G3 runs about 30% faster than a 604 or 604e. See http://www.MacKiDo.com/Hardware/ for more.

Stick It In Ice #4

Well until a week or two ago, I would have said "No way!," but an innovative company, ForMac, has since announced that they are coming out with a SCSI card for the mysterious Mezzazine slot in the iMac.

he card, called iPowerRaid, should be released before the holidays and will cost around \$300. It will support SCSI-1, SCSI-2, SCSI-3, Fast, Ultra, Wide, etc. A note of caution, however, installing this card will void your warranty... Man, that sucks! If you know French, you can check out this website: http://www.formac.com/francais/pages/stockage/Cipowerraid.HTML.

Another product has also surfaced for using SCSI drives and peripherals with your iMac. The Microtek Xpress USB will only cost about \$80 and will attach to the USB port of your iMac. The one downside, it will only run at the USB speed limit (1.5 MBps). Look for it to start shipping on 04 January 1999.

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
