Microsoft NetMeeting gives people around the world a whole new way of talking, meeting, working, and sharing over the Internet. Using NetMeeting, you can:

Placing calls

You can use NetMeeting to call people at other computers over an intranet or over the Internet. You can reach them if they have NetMeeting or most standards-based conferencing software.

Talking to someone over the Internet

For Internet conversations, you must make sure your computer:

- Contains a sound card and is connected to a microphone and speakers. The sound card can be full-duplex or half-duplex.
- Is connected using the TCP/IP protocol.

Note

- Although several people may be in a meeting, you can use the audio and video features of NetMeeting with only one person at a time.

With a full-duplex sound card, your microphone and speakers can work at the same time.

With a half-duplex sound card, your microphone and speakers can't work at the same time. Your speakers cannot play sound while your microphone is transmitting, nor can your microphone transmit while your speakers play sound.

Seeing the person you are calling

You can use NetMeeting to send a video image of yourself or of an item under discussion. You need either a video-capture card and camera or a camera that supports Video for Windows. You can receive video even if you do not have any video equipment.

Working with others in an application

While using NetMeeting, you can open one of your applications and share it so that other people in the meeting can see it as you work. You can also allow others in the meeting to work in your application (called collaborating).

Using the Whiteboard

When you collaborate in a shared application, only one person can control the cursor at a time. Occasionally, you need a meeting environment in which everyone can work at once. The Whiteboard is the answer—it enables online meeting participants to draw and type simultaneously and see the results.

Checking your SpeedDial list

Your SpeedDial list of friends and associates provides status on which people in the list are currently logged on.

Sending typed messages in Chat

Chat enables online meeting participants to send typed messages to each other in real time. When one person in a meeting runs Chat, it appears on everyone's screen. Since only two people can use audio and video at a time, Chat can be especially useful when several people are in a meeting.

You can put a link in a Web page that lets people who use NetMeeting call you.

You can send a file to all the people in your meeting by just dragging the file onto their names in the **Current Call** list.

Navigating in NetMeeting

Clicking the navigation icons in the left bar changes the NetMeeting screen so that you can do various tasks. This table gives you an overview of navigating in NetMeeting.

To do this

View the selected directory server and double-click a name to place a call.

View the list of contacts you want to have available for quick calling.

See a list of the people you are currently in a call with. Video images are displayed for you and your primary caller (if you have video cameras).

View the names of your callers, your responses to calls (accepted or ignored), and the time each call was received. Call a person in the **History** list by double-clicking the person's name.

Finding someone to call

You typically look on a directory server for people to call. The **Directory** list, however, contains only the people who:

- Are connected to the selected server
- Have chosen to display their names
- Belong to the selected category (such as personal or business)

If the person you want is not listed on the selected server (try refreshing the list first), you can connect to other servers. If a person is not listed on any directory server, you can send e-mail (or telephone) to let him or her know that you want to have a meeting, or you can explore alternative ways to connect, such as by using a computer name or an IP address. If the directory servers are not available for some reason, you can also use the Web Directory.

If you are using NetMeeting over a local area network (LAN), your directory server might not be in the **Server** list. For more information, contact your network administrator.

To view a different directory server

- ▶ At the upper right of the **Directory**, click the server you want in the **Server** list.

Note

- As you view different directory servers, the directory server you are logged on to does not change, as you can see at the right end of the status bar.

To update the directory list

▶ On the toolbar, click the **Refresh** button to display all the people in the selected category who are currently logged on to the directory server.

Tip

- To stop opening or refreshing the directory list, click the **Stop** button on the toolbar.

To browse the Web directory

- ▶ On the **Go** menu, click **Web Directory**.

This connects you to the World Wide Web. The Web Directory contains the same information as the **Directory** in NetMeeting and is useful if you cannot connect to a directory server for some reason.


To narrow down the list of names you see


- At the upper left of the **Directory**, click the group in the **Category** list that you want to display.
- The first group in the list consists of the other people in your category.
- The next four groups narrow down that category in different ways.
- **All** shows you everybody who is logged on to the directory server.
- The remaining groups consist of people who are in categories other than yours.

To arrange the directory lists in Directory and Current Call

▪ In the **Directory** or **Current Call** lists, click the heading of the column you want to arrange either in alphabetic order or according to the following characteristics:

▪  means that the person is in a call. (**Directory** only)

▪  indicates whether that person has a microphone and speakers.

▪  indicates whether that person has a video camera.

▪  indicates whether a person is using a conferencing program, such as NetMeeting, that allows for sharing applications, using the Whiteboard or Chat, and sending files. (**Current Call** only)

To change your directory information

- 1 On the **Call** menu, click **Change My Information**.
- 2 In **My Information**, edit the information about yourself.

Notes

- Please make sure that the information you enter is in keeping with the user category you choose.
- For Help on an item, click  at the top of the dialog box, and then click the item.

To change your category in the directory list

- 1 On the **Call** menu, click **Change My Information**.
- 2 In **My Information**, click **For personal use**, **For business use**, or **For adults-only use**.

Note

- Personal and business users are able to view each other's entries in the directory list. Everyone can see everybody by clicking **All** in the **Category** list in the **Directory**.

To remove your name from the directory

- 1 On the **Tools** menu, click **Options**.
- 2 In **Calling**, select the following check box: **Do not list my name in the directory**.

Note

- Not listing your name is like having an unlisted phone number. Your name does not appear in the directory when you are logged on to the directory server. You can receive calls, but the caller has to know your address to call you.

To log on to or off from a directory server

- On the **Call** menu, click **Log Off From [your directory server]** or **Log On To [your directory server]**.

Note

- By default, you are logged on to a directory server when NetMeeting starts. You can change the default directory server.

To change the default directory server you log on to

- 1 On the **Tools** menu, click **Options**.
- 2 On the **Calling** tab, type or select the directory server name in the **Server name** list.

Note

- You can also view different directory servers without logging on to a different server or changing your default server. In the **Directory**, click a different server in the **Server** list. Notice that as you view different directory servers, the status bar indicates that you are still logged on to the same one.

To place a call

- In the **Directory**, **SpeedDial**, or **History**, double-click the name of the person you want to call.

NetMeeting uses audio, video, and data features by default, although you must have the necessary audio and video hardware to take advantage of this. A person can have an audio or video connection with only one other person at a time. You can switch your audio or video connection from one person to another, and in the same meeting there can be several pairs of people who have audio or video connections.

Placing a call on a local area network

NetMeeting supports two commonly used local area network (LAN) protocols. The procedure for placing a call varies slightly for each. If you're not sure which you use, contact your system administrator.

To place a call by using the TCP/IP protocol

- 1 On the toolbar, click the **Call** button.
- 2 Type the e-mail name a person uses in the directory server, the computer name, or the computer's IP address.
- 3 In the **Call using** list, click the name of the protocol you want to use on your local area network (LAN).

Notes

- In Windows 95, you can find out your computer's IP address by clicking the **Start** button, clicking **Run**, and then typing **winipcfg** in the **Open** box. In Windows NT, you can get your IP address by typing **ipconfig** at the command prompt.
- If the protocol you want does not appear in the **Call using** list, you need to add it to the list of available protocols.

To place a call by using the NetBIOS protocol

1 On the toolbar, click the **Call** button.

2 Type the computer name (not a person's name).

The computer name must be typed correctly because NetBIOS protocols use case-sensitive computer addresses (that is, a lowercase "a" is not the same as an uppercase "A").

3 In the **Call using** list, click the name of the protocol you want to use on your local area network (LAN).

Notes

- A NetBIOS connection sends data only, not audio or video.
- If the protocol you want does not appear in the **Call using** list, you need to add it to the list of available protocols.

To place a call from the Start button

- 1 Click the **Start** button, and then click **Run**.
- 2 Type:

callto:*servername / e-mail address*

For example, if you were calling someone@microsoft.com, who is logged on to ils.microsoft.com, you would type: **callto:ils.microsoft.com/someone@microsoft.com**

Tip

- If the person you are calling is logged on to the same server as you are, you may need to use only his or her e-mail address—for example: callto:someone@microsoft.com

To place a call by using a null-modem cable

- 1 On the toolbar, click the **Call** button.
- 2 In the **Address** list, type the name of the port that the null-modem cable is connected to—for example, COM1.
- 3 In the **Call using** list, click **Null Modem**.
If **Null Modem** does not appear in the **Call using** list, you need to add it to the list of available protocols. For more information, see Related Topics below.
- 4 The computer being called must now place a null-modem call to the caller by following steps 1 through 3.

Important

- The communication port properties (bits per second, data bits, parity, stop bits, and flow control) must be set to the same values on both computers. Flow control is especially important because Windows 95 and Windows NT have different default values for flow control. To learn how to set these values, see Related Topics below.
- The amount of time the second caller has in which to respond is specified in the Communication for Protocol Properties dialog box. On the **Tools** menu, click **Options**; then, on the **Protocols** tab, select the **Null Modem** check box, and then click **Properties**.

To place an automatic call

- 1 On the toolbar, click the **Call** button.
- 2 In the **Address** list, type the e-mail name a person uses in the directory server, the computer name, or the computer's IP address.
- 3 If you want NetMeeting to determine the correct protocol to use, based on the address you entered in the **Address** list, click **Automatic** in the **Call using** list.

Tip

- In Windows 95, you can find out your computer's IP address by clicking the **Start** button, clicking **Run**, and then typing **winipcfg** in the **Open** box. In Windows NT, you can get your IP address by typing **ipconfig** at the command prompt.

To accept a call

- When someone calls you, a dialog box appears near the taskbar. To accept the call, click **Accept**. To reject an incoming call, click **Ignore**.

Notes

- To stay logged on to the directory server, but not be available for calls, click the **Call** menu, and then click **Do Not Disturb**.
- You can also automatically accept calls.

To automatically accept calls

- 1 On the **Tools** menu, click **Options**.
- 2 On the **General** tab, select the **Automatically accept incoming calls** check box.

Tip

- If you want to screen your calls, make sure the check box is not selected. You will be notified of each incoming call.

To send e-mail if your call does not connect

- 1 If your call does not go through, NetMeeting asks whether you want to send an e-mail message instead.
- 2 If you click **Yes**, an e-mail message opens that is addressed to the person you were attempting to call.
- 3 Make sure the message is correctly addressed, type your message, and then send it.

Note

- You will also be prompted to leave an e-mail message if the person you are calling has selected **Do Not Disturb** on the **Call** menu.

To end a call

- At the end of a call, click the **Hang Up** button on the toolbar.
- or
- To discontinue a call before you connect, click the **Call** menu, and then click **Stop Placing Call**.

Note

- When you hang up, others in the meeting are not necessarily disconnected from each other. If two people in the meeting have an audio or video connection, their connection will continue. If someone has called you in the meeting, his or her connection is maintained as long as yours is. When you leave the meeting, or are disconnected from it, that person is disconnected also.

To select the protocols NetMeeting can use

- 1 On the **Tools** menu, click **Options**.
- 2 On the **Protocols** tab, select the check box next to each protocol you want to use.
- 3 If applicable, click the **Properties** button to specify the properties of the protocol you have chosen.

Note

- To set the communication port properties for a null modem cable, select the **Null Modem** check box, click **Properties**, and then click **Com Port Properties**. These properties must be set to the same values on both of the computers involved in a null-modem call.

To manually add names to your SpeedDial list

By default, the names of the people who accept your calls and those whose calls you accept are automatically added to your SpeedDial list. If you want to add more names (or have changed the default setting), you will need to manually add names to your SpeedDial list.

- 1 In **Directory**, **Current Call**, or **History**, click the name you want to add to your list.
- 2 On the **SpeedDial** menu, click **Add SpeedDial**.

Tip


- You can put a SpeedDial someone has sent you in your SpeedDial folder within the NetMeeting folder. This adds it to your SpeedDial list.

To change your SpeedDial settings

- 1 On the **Tools** menu, click **Options**.
- 2 On the **Calling** tab, change the settings as needed.

Notes

- For Help on an item, click  at the top of the dialog box, and then click the item.
- If you click **Never**, names will not be added automatically to the list and you will need to do so manually.

Making it easy for someone to call you

You can make your address handy for your friends and colleagues by:

To send someone a SpeedDial for your computer

- 1 On the **SpeedDial** menu, click **Add SpeedDial**.
- 2 Type your computer's address, and then select the protocol you want people to use to call you.
- 3 Click **Send to mail recipient**. This opens a mail message that includes your computer's address.
- 4 Make sure the message is correctly addressed, type your message, and then send it.

Tips

- To have a SpeedDial to your own computer handy for sending to people, you can click **Save on the desktop** after step 2. Then, to send a message, just right-click the shortcut on the desktop, point to **Send To**, and then click **Mail Recipient**.
- You can put a SpeedDial someone has sent you in your SpeedDial folder within the NetMeeting folder. This adds it to your SpeedDial list.

To create a call link on a Web page

- In the HTML (Hypertext Markup Language) source code for the Web page, use this syntax:
callto:servername/e-mail address
For example, to place a call link on your Web page, you could type text similar to the following:
Call me using Microsoft NetMeeting at
**uls.microsoft.com/
someone@microsoft.com.**

Meeting with people

You can meet with people by:

{button ,JI(``,`CONF_JOIN_MEETING`)} Joining a meeting already underway

{button ,JI(``,`CONF_CONFHOST`)} Hosting a meeting and having people call into it

{button ,JI(``,`CONF_JOIN_NAMED_MEETING`)} Joining a named meeting that is set up on a special server

To join an existing meeting

- Call any participant in the meeting.

Note

- If you call a participant in the meeting, your connection is maintained as long as that person's connection is. When he or she leaves the meeting, or are disconnected from it, you are disconnected also.

To host a meeting

- 1 Notify potential meeting participants of the time of your meeting so they can call you.
- 2 At the meeting time, click the **Call** menu, and then click **Host Meeting**.

Tips

- You could include your SpeedDial when you notify people of the meeting to make it easy for them to call you.
- You can set up the meeting so that you screen callers.

To join a named meeting

- 1 On the toolbar, click the **Call** button.
- 2 Type the network address of the person holding the named meeting.
- 3 In the **Call using** list, click the name of the protocol you want to use.
- 4 Select the **Join the meeting named** check box, and then type the name of the meeting.

Notes

- A named meeting is a service provided by a third party, often a telephone company or a teleconferencing company.
- The names of some conference bridges (servers) are case-sensitive, so when you place the call you may need to type the meeting name using the same capitalization as appears on the bridge.

To remove a caller from a meeting

- In the **Current Call** list, right-click the name of the caller you want to remove from the meeting, and then click **Remove**.

Only the person who initiated the call or meeting can remove a caller from the meeting.


To customize NetMeeting

You can customize NetMeeting in various ways—how it starts, the way it looks when it opens, or whether it displays the quick-access toolbar.

- 1 On the **Tools** menu, click **Options**.
- 2 On the **General** tab, change the settings as needed.

If you need to change your audio, video, or other settings, click the other tabs as needed.

Tip

- For Help on an item, click  at the top of the dialog box, and then click the item.

To see a log of each incoming call

- Click **History**. The name of the caller, your response to the call (accepted or ignored), and the time the call was received all appear in the list.
- To place a call from the **History** list, double-click a name in the list.
- To sort the **History** list by name, status, or date, click a column heading.
- If you want to delete an entry in the **History** list, select it, and then click the **Delete** button on the toolbar. You can delete everything in the list by clicking the **Delete All** button.

To run NetMeeting in the background

- 1 On the **Tools** menu, click **Options**.
- 2 On the **General** tab, select the check box named **Run when Windows starts and notify me of incoming calls**.
- 3 Close NetMeeting.

Closing NetMeeting will not affect your logon status on the directory server, and you will receive NetMeeting calls as before. Accepting an incoming call opens the NetMeeting window automatically.

- 4 To manually open NetMeeting, right-click the NetMeeting icon in the status area of the taskbar and click **Open**.

To send a file to other people in the meeting

- On the **Tools** menu, point to **File Transfer**, and then click **Send File** to send the file to everyone in the meeting.

Tips

- You can also drag the file onto the list of people in **Current Call**.
- To send a file to one person, right-click the name of that person in the **Current Call** list, click **Send File**, and then specify the file.

To specify where to save files sent to you using NetMeeting

By default, NetMeeting saves files that people send you in the Received Files folder within the NetMeeting folder. You can specify a different folder if you want.

- 1 On the **Tools** menu, click **Options**.
- 2 On the **General** tab, click **Change Folder**, and then open the folder where you want NetMeeting to store the files you will be sent.

To find files sent to you

- On the **Tools** menu, click **File Transfer**, and then click **Open Received Files Folder**.
- **Tip**
At the time a file is transferred, a dialog box opens, from which you can open the file.

Working together in an application during a meeting

If you want several people to work with you in your application, you first open an application and then specify that you want to share it. At that point, everyone in the meeting will be able to see the application, but only you will be able to work in it. This is handy for demonstration purposes.

If you then specify that the application can be used for *collaboration*, anyone in the meeting who also specifies that they want to collaborate will be able to work in the shared application.

The work that is done in the application can be saved or printed only from the computer of the person who shared it. For someone else to obtain a copy of the final document after collaborating, the person who shared it must send the file to the people in the meeting.

The following steps give you the details on working together in a shared application:

{button ,JI(`',`CONF_SHARE')} Sharing your application with other people in the meeting

{button ,JI(`',`CONF_COLLABORATE')} Allowing others to work in your shared application

{button ,JI(`',`CONF_GET_CONTROL')} Working in an application shared by someone else

{button ,JI(`',`CONF_STOP_SHARE')} Stopping application sharing

{button ,JI(`',`CONF_FILE_TRANSFER')} Sending a file

To share an application with other people in the meeting

- 1 When you are in a call, start the application you want to share (for example, Notepad).
- 2 On the NetMeeting toolbar, click the **Share** button, and then click the name of the application.

Other people in the meeting can see your application, but cannot work in it.

Notes

- If you want others to be able to work in the application, you each must choose to collaborate.
- To share an application, you can also click the NetMeeting icon in the status area of the taskbar, and then click the **Share** icon on the quick-access toolbar.

Caution

- If you share an Explorer window, such as My Computer or a folder on your computer, you will be sharing *all* such windows you have open. Also, once you have shared such a window, every application you start while you are still in the meeting will automatically be shared with participants in the meeting.

To allow others to work in your shared applications

In order for others to collaborate with you, you must have first shared an application. For more information, see [Related Topics](#) below.

- On the NetMeeting toolbar, click **Collaborate**.

All the people who want to work in the application must also click **Collaborate**. Each participant can take control of the application one at a time by clicking in the window of the shared application.

Notes

- To stop anyone who is currently working in the application you shared, press ESC. This also stops collaboration with everyone in the meeting, but they will be able to watch you work in the application.
- Note that when someone else is in control of a shared application, you will not have the use of your cursor—not only in the shared application, but for any other purpose.
- If a document was created during collaboration and you want everyone to have a copy, you must send the final file to the participants in the meeting.

To work in an application shared by someone else

- On the NetMeeting toolbar, click **Collaborate**.
The person who shared the application must also click **Collaborate**.

Notes

- You can take control of the application by clicking in the window.
- To collaborate, you can also click the NetMeeting icon in the status area of the taskbar, and then click the **Collaborate** icon on the quick-access toolbar.
- If a document results from this collaboration and you want everyone to have a copy, the person who originally shared the application must send the final file to you.

{button ,AL("a-conf-file-transfer")} [Related Topic](#)

To stop sharing an application

- On the NetMeeting toolbar, click the **Share** button, and then click the name of the application you want to stop sharing.

Notes

- You can stop sharing an application only if you were the person who originally shared it with the other people.
- If you are collaborating and someone else is working in the application you have shared, you must press ESC to get control of the cursor so that you can click the **Share** button.

To exchange information via the Clipboard

- When you are in a meeting, anything you cut or copy to the Clipboard can be pasted by anybody in the meeting into applications on their computers. The Clipboard is always shared once you are in a meeting, whether or not you are sharing an application.

Caution

- Do not place items on your Clipboard during a meeting that you do not want available to the meeting participants.

To display the quick-access toolbar

The quick-access toolbar is useful when you want to minimize NetMeeting to allow more room for displaying a shared application, the Whiteboard, or the Chat window on your screen, while still having the necessary NetMeeting commands available.

- In the status area of the taskbar, single-click the **NetMeeting** icon.

To send video to other people

- 1 On the **Tools** menu, click **Options**.
- 2 On the **Video** tab, make sure the **Automatically send video at the start of each call** check box is selected.

Or, if you do not want to send video automatically when a call begins, you can start sending video after you are in a call by clicking the button at the bottom of the My Video window.

Note

- A person can send and receive audio and video with only one other person at a time. You can switch from one person to another, or several pairs of people in a meeting can talk to and see each other at the same time.

{button ,AL("A_CONF_VIDEO_RECEIVE;A_CONF_ADJUST_VIDEO;a-conf-switch-audiovideo;a-conf-preview-video")}

To preview your video image

- Before placing a call, click the button at the bottom of the My Video window to see the image you will send.

The My Video window is in **Current Call**, but may be detached from it.

Note

- If you are previewing when you place or receive a call, video immediately starts being sent.

To receive video from others

- By default, you receive video automatically in NetMeeting. The other person must be sending video for you to receive it.

If you are not automatically receiving video in a call, click the button at the bottom of the Remote Video window. The Remote Video window is in **Current Call**, but can be detached from it.

Notes

- You can change your settings so that you do not receive video automatically in NetMeeting. To do this, click the **Tools** menu, click **Options**, click the **Video** tab, and then clear the **Automatically receive video at the start of each call** check box.
- A person can send and receive audio and video with only one other person at a time. You can switch from one person to another, or several pairs of people in a meeting can talk to and see each other at the same time.



To adjust video properties

- 1 On the **Tools** menu, click **Options**.
- 2 On the **Video** tab, change the settings as necessary.

To adjust video camera properties, you must be previewing the image in the My Video window. Then on the **Video** tab, click the **Source** button. You can see the changes in the My Video window as you make them.

Notes

- If you make changes to video quality, you can see the changes after you click OK.
- For Help on an item, click  at the top of the dialog box, and then click the item.

To detach the video windows

- On the **Tools** menu, point to **Video**, and then click **Detach My Video** or **Detach Remote Video**.
The video windows move out of their place in **Current Call** and change to the size specified on the **Video** tab in the **Options** dialog box.

Tip

- You can also double-click the video window or drag it by the title bar to detach it.

To switch your audio and video connection to someone else

- On the **Tools** menu, point to **Switch Audio and Video**, and then click the name of the person who you want to receive audio and video.

Anyone in the meeting who already has an audio-video connection to someone else will not be available for you to switch to.

To stop sending audio and video

- In **Current Call** on the **Tools** menu, point to **Switch Audio and Video**, and then click the person's name to remove the check mark.

Tip

- You can also stop sending audio and video by right-clicking the person's name in the **Current Call** list, and then clicking **Stop Using Audio and Video**.
- To stop sending video only, click the button at the bottom of the My Video window.

To adjust the speaker volume

- On the **Audio** toolbar, drag the speaker slider.

Tip

- To mute the speakers, clear the speaker check box on the **Audio** toolbar.

- In the **Audio** toolbar, drag the microphone slider.

Tips

- To mute your voice while still hearing other voices, clear the microphone check box on the **Audio** toolbar.

To run the Audio Tuning wizard

- 1 On the **Call** menu, click **Hang Up** to disconnect any NetMeeting calls.
- 2 On the **Tools** menu, click **Audio Tuning Wizard**.
- 3 Follow the instructions on the screen.

Tip

- If you use full-duplex audio and experience poor audio quality, try half-duplex.

To disable full-duplex sound

If your computer has full-duplex sound capabilities, NetMeeting automatically enables full-duplex sound. If you experience poor audio, you may want to disable full-duplex sound.

- 1 On the **Tools** menu, click **Options**.
- 2 On the **Audio** tab, clear the **Enable full duplex audio so I can speak while receiving audio** check box.
Your computer will now be using half-duplex sound.

Note

- If you know that your sound card has full-duplex capabilities, but the **Enable full duplex audio so I can speak while receiving audio** check box is not available, you need to install the full-duplex driver from the manufacturer of your sound card.

To start Chat

- While in **Current Call**, click the **Chat** button on the toolbar.
Everyone in the current meeting can now view and use Chat.

Notes

- If someone is sharing an application in your meeting, it is easier to work with Chat if you are not collaborating with them. This is because you are unable to type information in the Chat window if someone else has taken control of the shared application.
- To chat, you can also click the NetMeeting icon in the status area of the taskbar, and then click the **Chat** icon on the quick-access toolbar.

To send a message in Chat

- In the Chat window, type the message you want to send, and then press ENTER.

Tip

- When several people are in a meeting, you can choose to send a message to only one of them (called a whisper) by clicking that person's name in the **Send to** list before pressing ENTER.

To change the way Chat messages are displayed

- 1 To change the font in which messages appear, click the **Options** menu, click **Font**.
- 2 Click the font, size, and style you want, and then click **OK**.
- 3 On the **Options** menu, click **Chat Format**.
- 4 Click the header information and message format you want.

To start the Whiteboard

- While in **Current Call**, click the **Whiteboard** button on the toolbar.
Everyone in the current meeting can now view and use the Whiteboard.

Tip

- To open the Whiteboard, you can also click the NetMeeting icon in the status area of the taskbar, and then click the **Whiteboard** icon on the quick-access toolbar.

To write text on the Whiteboard

- 1 In the Whiteboard toolbox, click the **Text** tool.
- 2 If you want to specify the color, size, or font of the text, click the **Font Options** button at the bottom of the window, make your changes, and then click **OK**.
- 3 Click the Whiteboard at the point where you want the text to start, and then start typing.
- 4 When you're done, click the mouse outside of the text area, or change tools.

To draw a line on the Whiteboard

- 1 In the Whiteboard toolbox, click the **Draw** or **Line** tool.
- 2 To choose the width or color of the line, click a line width or color on the bottom of the toolbox.
- 3 To draw the line, drag the pointer across the Whiteboard.

To draw a shape on the Whiteboard

- 1 In the Whiteboard toolbox, click one of the shape tools: an ellipse or a rectangle, filled or unfilled.
- 2 To choose a line width or color for the shape, click a line width or color on the bottom of the toolbox.
- 3 To draw the shape, drag the pointer across the Whiteboard.

To delete text or an object on the Whiteboard

- 1 In the Whiteboard toolbox, click the **Eraser** tool.
- 2 Click a block of text or drawn object to delete it.

Tip

- To delete individual letters in a text block, click the **Text** tool in the toolbox, and then click the text. You can press DELETE OR BACKSPACE (if you want, you can select the letters first).

To prevent others from making changes to the Whiteboard document

- On the **Tools** menu in the Whiteboard, click **Lock Contents**.

To highlight text or graphics on the Whiteboard

- 1 In the Whiteboard toolbox, click the **Highlight** tool.
- 2 Drag the pointer over the item you want to highlight.

Notes

- If your monitor uses only 16 colors, the highlighting appears behind text or other graphics.
- You can also use the remote pointer (the hand) to point out text or graphics on the Whiteboard page to other people in the meeting.

To point out text or graphics on the Whiteboard

- 1 In the Whiteboard toolbox, click the **Remote Pointer** tool.
- 2 Drag the hand-shaped remote pointer to the spot you want to point out on the Whiteboard.

- To turn off the remote pointer, click the **Remote Pointer** tool.
- To use the remote pointer on a different Whiteboard page, first turn off the remote pointer. Then go to the page where you want to use it, and turn it back on.

To zoom in or out on the Whiteboard

- On the **View** menu, click **Zoom**.

To copy an area of the screen to the Whiteboard

- 1 In the Whiteboard toolbox, click the **Select Area** tool.
- 2 If the Whiteboard Select Area dialog box appears, click **OK**.
- 3 Click a corner of the area you want to capture, and then drag the pointer diagonally toward the opposite corner.
- 4 Click the Whiteboard.

Tip

- You can also copy a specific window on your desktop.

{button ,AL("A-WB-GRAB-WINDOW")} [Related Topic](#)

To copy a window to the Whiteboard

- 1 In the Whiteboard toolbox, click the **Select Window** tool.
- 2 If the Whiteboard Select Window dialog box appears, click **OK**.
- 3 Click the window you want to copy.
- 4 Click the Whiteboard.

To add pages to the Whiteboard

- To insert a new page in front of the current page, click the **Edit** menu in the Whiteboard, and then click **Insert Page Before**.

To insert a new page after the current page, click the **Edit** menu, and then click **Insert Page After**.

Tip

- You can also add a page after the current page by clicking the button at the lower right of the Whiteboard.

To go to different pages in the Whiteboard

- To move among the pages, click the forward or back arrow at the lower right of the Whiteboard.
To go to the first or last page, click the page number you want beside either the forward or back arrow.
To add another page, click the button on the far right.

To view Whiteboard pages that other people cannot see

- On the **Tools** menu in the Whiteboard, click **Synchronize** to remove the check mark.

Typically, everybody in the meeting views the same Whiteboard page at the same time unless you specifically want to look at or work on something out of view of the meeting participants.

To stop someone from working in an application you have shared

- Press ESC.
This ends collaboration and returns control of the cursor to you.

To create a SpeedDial to your own computer

You can create a SpeedDial to your own computer and save it on the desktop to keep it handy for sending to people.

- 1 Select your own name in the **Directory**, and then on the **SpeedDial** menu, click **Add SpeedDial**.
- 2 Click **Save on the desktop**.

You can right-click the shortcut on the desktop to send it.

To send a file to everyone in a meeting

- Drag the file onto the list of people in the **Current Call** list.

To make room on the screen for a shared application

- When working in an application during a meeting, you can minimize the NetMeeting window, and click the **NetMeeting** icon in the status area of the taskbar to access the commands you need for collaborating and sharing.

To run NetMeeting in the background

- If you don't want the NetMeeting window taking up space on the desktop or in the taskbar, you can close it and run NetMeeting in the background. You will receive incoming calls as before. Accepting an incoming call automatically opens the NetMeeting window.

To work with others in a meeting and not lose control of your cursor

Occasionally, you need a meeting environment in which everyone can work at once. In that case, Whiteboard is the answer. When you collaborate in a shared application, only one person can control the cursor at a time. Not so in the Whiteboard.

- In **Current Call**, click **Whiteboard** on the toolbar.

Remember that you can copy selections into the Whiteboard from another application by clicking the **Tools** menu and then clicking **Select Area**.

To achieve better performance for application sharing

If you are in a large conference or have a slow connection and have an audio-video connection with another person, you can achieve better performance for activities such as application sharing by pausing your video. That way, the person with whom you have an audio-video connection can still see a still picture of you, but the other NetMeeting features can work more effectively.

You can achieve the best application-sharing performance if there is no audio or video connection, and you use Chat to communicate instead.

- To pause video, click the button at the bottom of the My Video window.

To mute your voice while still hearing others' voices

- On the **Audio** toolbar, clear the microphone check box.

This is useful if you want to talk to someone in your office but not have everyone in the meeting overhear you.

To mute your computer's speakers

- On the **Audio** toolbar, clear the speaker check box.

To send a private message in a meeting

- When several people are in a meeting, you can choose to send a Chat message to only one of them (called a whisper) by clicking that person's name in the **Send to** list in Chat before pressing ENTER.

Customizing Microsoft Windows, Windows NT, and Windows 95

There are many ways you can customize your operating system to make your computer more accessible.

- Beginning with Windows 95, accessibility features are built in to Windows and Windows NT. These features are useful for individuals who have difficulty typing or using a mouse, have moderately impaired vision, or who are deaf or hard-of-hearing. The features can be installed during setup, or you can add them later from your Windows 95 installation disks. Look up “accessibility” in the Windows Help Index for information about installing and using these features.
 - You can also use Control Panel and other built-in features to adjust the appearance and behavior of Windows or Windows NT to suit varying vision and motor abilities. These include adjusting colors and sizes, sound volume, and the behavior of the mouse and keyboard.
 - Many of the features that make Windows 95 more accessible can be added to Windows NT, earlier versions of Microsoft Windows, and MS-DOS, through Access Packs. You can download these files by modem or you can order them on disks from Microsoft.
 - Dvorak keyboard layouts make the most frequently typed characters on a keyboard more accessible if you have difficulty using the standard QWERTY layout. There are three Dvorak layouts: one if you are a two-handed user, one if you type with your left hand only, and one if you type with your right hand only. You do not need to purchase any special equipment to use these features.
- The specific features available, and whether they are built-in or must be obtained separately, depend on which operating system you are using.

For full documentation on the accessibility features available in the operating system you are using, obtain the appropriate application notes listed below. Accessibility features are also documented in the *Microsoft Windows 95 Resource Kit* and the *Microsoft Windows NT Resource Kit*.

NetMeeting Troubleshooter

This troubleshooter helps you identify and solve problems with using Microsoft NetMeeting. Just click to answer the questions, and then try the suggested steps to fix the problem.

What's wrong?

- Other people in the meeting say that part or all of my shared application window appears with a crosshatch pattern.
- Another person shared an application, and I can't save or print a file in it.
- NetMeeting connects to the wrong service provider.
- I'm having trouble using the audio features.
- There's a caution symbol on the **ICA** icon in my taskbar.

Connect to the ISP before starting NetMeeting

NetMeeting connects to your Internet service provider (ISP) so that it can connect to the directory server. If you have an account with more than one ISP, and you want NetMeeting to connect to a different one, connect to that ISP before starting NetMeeting.

Note

Specifies whether you will be notified when someone tries to call you by using NetMeeting. If this check box is selected, you will be notified even if NetMeeting is not running.

Specifies whether NetMeeting automatically sets the level of compression based on the speed of the connection.

Click this to designate a different location on your computer for your Received Files folder.

Displays a list of protocols that NetMeeting can use.

Displays the properties of the selected protocol.

Displays information about the selected protocol.

Specifies whether you want the information you have provided to be listed and available to other people on the directory server.

Specifies whether NetMeeting adjusts the sensitivity of your microphone automatically. This is useful if you are using NetMeeting in a location where the background noise increases and decreases often.

Specifies whether you adjust the sensitivity of your microphone yourself.

To increase the sensitivity of your microphone, click this option, and then drag the slider to the right.

To decrease the sensitivity of your microphone, click this option, and then drag the slider to the left.

Specifies whether to modulate microphone volume.

The auto-gain control automatically increases the microphone volume when you speak softly and decreases it when you speak loudly, making it seem as if you are speaking at a constant volume. This works best if you are in a location with very little background noise. Excessive background noise when auto-gain control is enabled may cause the microphone volume to decrease as the background noise increases, even though you are talking at a constant volume.

Click this to specify how the call will be dialed. This is useful if you want to charge the call to a calling card, use your computer from different locations, or add a dialing prefix, country code, or area code automatically.

Specifies the number of times your telephone rings before your modem answers incoming calls.

Specifies whether your modem answers incoming calls.

Displays your current location entry. To edit a location entry, click **Dialing Properties**.

Lists the modems set up to work with your computer.

Click this to display information about your modem.

Moves an item higher in the list.

Click this to return the list of codecs to the order they were in when you installed NetMeeting.

Lists the audio compression codecs available on your computer that NetMeeting can use.

An audio compression codec converts a sound into a form that can be transmitted over the Internet to the computer you are calling. It is recommended that you use the default settings.

Displays an application that someone in your NetMeeting meeting has shared.

The person who has shared this application is using Work-Alone mode. You cannot take control of this application.

Displays an application that someone in your NetMeeting meeting has shared and is allowing you to collaborate in.

You can take control of this application by double-clicking this window.

Click this to set video-capture card properties. This dialog box is provided by your video-capture card manufacturer. If this button is not available, you need to make sure you are previewing a video image in the **My Video** window first. Then you can adjust the image in the window by changing the settings in this dialog box.


Click this to set video-capture card properties. This dialog box is available only if the **Source** dialog box provided by the video-capture card manufacturer is incomplete or missing. These settings are rarely needed.


Specifies the size of the video image you are sending.


Specifies the amount of compression used and the frame rate in the image received.


High uses less compression and fewer frames. The video quality will be higher, but the motion will be slower (you may lose frames).


Low uses more compression and more frames. The video motion will be faster, but the quality of the picture will be lower.

Provides a place for you to enter the highest number of the entries you want to allow in your SpeedDial list.

Provides a space for you to type the required password to attend the selected meeting. To get the password, contact the meeting organizer.

Specifies how long NetMeeting waits for you to answer an incoming call.

Specifies the port that the null-modem cable is connected to.
