The Internet Setup wizard makes it easy for you to manually set up a connection to the <u>Internet</u>. You can use your local area network (LAN) or another <u>Internet service provider</u> to connect.

The information you need to provide to the wizard depends on how you connect. For more information, click a button below.

#### Using a local area network to connect

To use a local area network to connect to the Internet, you need to provide the following information in the Internet Setup wizard.

The Internet protocol (IP) addresses of your main and alternate Domain Name System (DNS) servers.

If you have a Dynamic Host Configuration Protocol (DHCP) installed, the IP addresses are assigned automatically.

The address of the Internet gateway computer (or proxy server) on your local area network.

If you do not know this information, see your network administrator before continuing with the wizard.

Do you want to use Internet mail?

Yes, tell me what I need.

No, I don't want Internet mail.

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#### **Using Internet mail**

You can use Windows Messaging to receive e-mail messages over the Internet. To receive Internet mail, you need to provide the wizard with the following information:

- Your e-mail address.

The name of your Internet mail server. You can get this information from your service provider or, if you are using a local area network to connect, from your network administrator.

The Windows Messaging profile you want to use. You can use an existing profile or create a new one especially for Internet mail.

#### Note

If you want to use a program other than Windows Messaging for Internet mail, you will need to set it up . yourself. For more information, see the documentation that comes with your mail program.

# Turning off Internet mail

If you don't want to use Internet mail, when you see the Internet Mail screen in the wizard, make sure the No, I Don't Want To Use Windows Messaging check box is cleared.

#### Using an Internet service provider to connect

If you already have a point-to-point protocol (PPP) account with an Internet service provider, you can use the wizard to set up access to this account.

The wizard will ask for the following information, which you can obtain from your service provider:

• The name of your service provider. This appears in the Dial-Up Networking folder in My Computer as the name of your connection.

- User name.
- Password.
- The phone number you dial to connect to the Internet.
- Domain Name System (DNS) server address.
- IP address and subnet mask, if any.
- Authentication procedure (whether or not your provider requires a terminal window to log on).

Your service provider must support PPP.

The Internet is a collection of computer networks that connects millions of computers around the world, including the one on your desktop. It is also a vast source of information that is constantly changing and expanding. Since its creation in the 1970s, it has grown exponentially and is now used by millions of people, from those in commercial and educational institutions to individual consumers.

Once you're connected to the Internet, you can access a wealth of information, including pages on the World Wide Web, newsgroups (BBS), news and weather information, software, and games.

An Internet service provider maintains a server that is directly connected to the Internet. To connect your computer to the Internet, you use a modem to dial into this server. In exchange for this service, a provider charges you for the time you spend using the Internet.

You must connect to the Internet through a service provider unless you are working in a company or organization that provides Internet access through a local area network.

An Internet gateway computer acts as a bridge between your local area network and the Internet. On a local area network, you can gain access to the Internet by connecting to this computer.

Profiles enable more than one person to use Windows Messaging to receive e-mail on the same computer. You can also use different profiles for different types of e-mail. For example, you could set up one profile for receiving e-mail over your corporate network and another profile for receiving e-mail over the Internet.

#### Internet Troubleshooter

<u>I can't log in. It keeps prompting me for my login name and password.</u> <u>I can connect to my ISP, but it hangs up right after answering the phone.</u> <u>The terminal window appears, I type my username and password, and then nothing happens.</u>

Dialing doesn't work correctly.

# Make sure the TCP/IP protocol is bound to your Dial-Up Adapter

- 3 Make sure the TCP/IP network protocol is in the list. A protocol has a 4 icon beside it. Click the Dial-Up Adapter, and then click Properties.

- Click the Bindings tab. Make sure the TCP/IP box is selected.

#### Did that fix the problem?

<u>Yes. I was able to log in. Close the troubleshooter.</u> <u>No. TCP/IP is installed and is bound to the Dial-Up Adapter, but I still can't connect. What else could be</u> wrong?

The TCP/IP protocol is not on the list of network components. How do I install it?

#### Make sure you typed your login name and password correctly

Check your login name and password and make sure you have typed them correctly. If the login program for your ISP is case-sensitive, also make sure that your CAPS LOCK key is not on.

Also, some ISPs require you to type a character, such as P, S, or # in front of your login name to indicate the server connection type that you are using. (For example, if your login name is Chris, you might have to type Pchris to indicate a PPP connection, or Schris to indicate a SLIP connection.)

For more information about logging in to your ISP, contact the ISP's administrator.

#### Make sure you have the correct version of Winsock in your Windows folder

- 1 In My Computer, click View, and then click Options.
- 2 Make sure the Show All Files box is selected, and then click OK.
- 3 On the Start menu, click Find.
- 4 Click Named, type **winsock.dll** and then click Find Now.

The correct version should be located in your Windows folder, and should be dated 3/7/96

Did this fix the problem?

#### Try to ping a server by name

While you are connected to your ISP, click here {button ,EF(`PINGNAME.BAT', `SW\_SHOWMINNOACTIVE',1)} to ping a server by looking for its name. The results of the ping attempt will appear in an MS-DOS window.

If the attempt was successful, the results look like this:

REPLY FROM 198.105.232.1: BYTES=32 TIME=324MS TTL=46.

### Was at least one ping attempt successful?

#### Try to ping a server by IP address

While you are connected to your ISP, click here {button ,EF(`PINGNUM.BAT',`',1,`')} to <u>ping</u> a server by looking for its IP address. The results of the ping attempt will appear in an MS-DOS window.

If the attempt was successful, the results look like this:

REPLY FROM 198.105.232.1: BYTES=32 TIME=324MS TTL=46.

### Was at least one ping attempt successful?

Yes, it was successful. What does this mean?
 No, I got a different response. What do I do now?

#### Check the default gateway settings

- 1 Close your connection.
- 2 In the Dial-Up Networking window, click the connection to your ISP.
- 3 On the File menu, click Properties.
- 4 Click Server Type, and then click TCP/IP Settings.
- 5 Select the Use Default Gateway On Remote Network check box.

### Make sure you have specified the correct server type

#### Make sure you're using the correct IP address

- 5 If the Specify An IP Address box is selected, make sure the IP address for your computer is typed correctly. For more information, or if Server Assigned IP Address is not selected, contact your network administrator.

Close the troubleshooter.

A utility that sends a signal to a server to see whether the server is communicating properly with the network. It can contact a server by looking for the server's name (for example, ping ftp.microsoft.com), or by looking for the server's IP address (for example, ping 198.105.232.1). If the signal reaches the server, the server sends a reply acknowledging the signal. The reply from a successful ping looks like this:

REPLY FROM 198.105.232.1: BYTES=32 TIME=324MS TTL=46.

#### Make sure you've specified your Domain Name Server correctly

In order to be able to send mail to, view Web pages on, or connect to other computers over the Internet, you need to specify your domain name server (DNS) address. The DNS address is the IP address of a computer on the Internet that keeps a list of computer names and their IP addresses, so that you can refer to the computers by their names instead of typing the IP address every time.

- 1 In the Dial-Up Networking window, click the connection to your ISP.
- 2 On the File menu in the Dial-Up Networking folder, click Properties.
- 3 Click the Server Types tab, and then click TCP/IP Settings.
- 4 Click Specify Name Server Addresses.
- 5 Make sure the Primary DNS address is set correctly. If the Primary DNS box is blank, click it, and then type the DNS address. If you don't know your DNS address, contact the administrator for your Internet service provider (ISP).

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If the information you received from your ISP administrator does not include any mention of a DNS address, perhaps it is listed under a different name. Other names for DNS address include:

- Name server
- Name server IP address
- Domain server address
- Domain name server

#### Is your Internet program using a proxy server?

If you are accessing the Internet over a LAN, your Internet program may be set up to use a <u>proxy server</u>, then you won't be able to ping IP addresses. If you don't know whether you need to use a proxy server, contact your network administrator.

### To find out whether Internet Explorer is using a proxy server

2 Click the Advanced tab, and look to see whether Use Proxy Server is selected. If it is, make sure the Proxy Server box contains the correct server name. If you don't know the correct server name, contact your network administrator.

### Did this fix the problem?

#### Check the settings for your Internet program

If you are accessing the Internet by using a modem, then you should make sure your Internet program isn't set up to use a proxy server. The following instructions are for Internet Explorer. If you are using a different Internet program, see the documentation for the program.
