## Getting Started:

Getting Started takes a look at the latest PCs, printers and notebooks.

Buying a personal computer (or PC, for short) can be a worrying experience. Even though today's computer is more powerful, sophisticated, and better value than ever before, it still represents a major item of expenditure in most peoples budgets. Knowing how a computer works and what each part of it does makes it easier to cut through the jargon in the adverts and brochures - and you can avoid getting saddled with yesterdays technology.

To get your computer work on to paper, you will need a printer. Choosing the right printer is not just a question of how much you are prepared to pay to get your words and pictures onto paper. Each printer has its strengths and weaknesses. There are only three different types of printer (provided we ignore the expensive or specialist devices that do not belong in the home or office). These are dot-matrix, inkjet and laser printers.

A notebook computer is generally comparable with a desktop model, but only weighs a few pounds, is about the same size as a large book and runs on batteries. In order to run your favourite desktop applications on the move you will need one with similar amounts of RAM, hard disk space and an adequate processor chip.
